Senate. The Legislature began its session in earnest on the evening of the 15th. The preliminary measures introduced by the Senate were bills offered by Senator Mills. One of these was a resolution providing for the state oil inspector and his deputies and also for important changes in the matter of the appointment of a joint committee of the two houses to act on the repeal of the present taxation system.

A bill radically changing the laws regarding marriage was introduced in the Senate on the 15th by Senator Stout. It provides for the appointment of local boards of persons who shall consider all applications for license to marry and forbids any public agent to receive any fee for procuring a license to marry.
