In the Chicago municipal election on Tuesday last, Mayor Harrison defeated the Republican candidate, Judge Elbridge Haney, by nearly 30,000 votes, gaining about 20,000 over the vote he received two years ago. Thus Carter H. Harrison will next week commence his third term as mayor of Chicago.

The aldermanic contest in five wards resulted in the Republicans carrying three and the Democrats two wards, which gives each party 23 votes in the Common council.
