Tense Situation Is Relieved by Wise Suggestions of Minister Bowen—President Castro Accedes.

Caracas, Jan. 19.—The situation here which was rendered tense because it was said, President Castro contemplated giving Minister Bowen his passport, was relieved when he was induced to make overtures to Mr. Bowen.

The latter suggested that Castro settle the difficulties with the foreign powers by proposing to submit all disputes to arbitration; to make a permanent arbitration treaty; to pay the fixed sum of \$100,000 bolivars yearly instead of the 30 per cent of the customs revenues and to continue, after paying off the German and British bondholders, Castro accepted these ideas, except that he would not consent to arbitrate any but American disputed claims.

The proposed settlement, it is believed, might involve the Monroe doctrine.

Record Potato Crop.

The season's potato crop of the United States is the largest ever known. As the United States are not exporters of potatoes, but for the last few years have frequently imported enough to make up for the deficiency in the supply here, the 288,700,000 bushels of this year's crop will provide three and a half bushels for every man, woman and child in the United States—which is a little more than the ordinary consumption.

Maine is the champion potato state, with a yield of 200 bushels to the acre, and New Hampshire next with 145. Iowa holds the record among the Western States in potatoes, as in corn, with 118 bushels to the acre. New York has the largest acreage, with Michigan second, but New York's yield per acre is only 86, less than the average of the United States and much lower than the yield of the states situated further north.
