Weekly Crop Bulletin. (For week ending Monday, June 12, 1905.) The weather conditions for the past ten days have been characterized by heavy and continuous rains in nearly all portions of the state.

The area covered by the excessive rains comprises probably more than one-half of the state. It is difficult to form any estimate of the ultimate effect of the rains upon the crop situation.

Winter wheat and rye made satisfactory progress during the week except in those districts where the excessive rains occurred. Rye is well headed and the growth of straw is heavy.

On uplands, the growth of wheat and spring rye suffered considerably from the heavy rains and cool weather generally, except in the southwestern counties, where the conditions were more favorable.

The continued wet weather has interfered materially with the cultivation of corn, especially in the southern section, where the crop is well advanced. The fields are becoming very weedy and even with dry weather it will be several days before this work can be commenced.


