Firemen's Tournament.

The annual tournament of the Washington, Ozaukee County and North Milwaukee Firemen's Association held here last Sunday was a grand success.

The first companies to arrive were North Milwaukee, Cedarburg, West Bend and Barton, who came on the 8:50 a. m. train.

After the reception of firemen was over the contests started. The first on the program was the hose cart race which resulted as follows:

Kewaskum first prize, \$7, time 3:45 seconds; Cedarburg second, \$5, time 4:30 seconds; North Milwaukee third, \$3, time 5:15 seconds.

The wetting contest was held at the mill square which was witnessed by a great crowd and was very interesting.

John Kohn received first prize of \$5 and Albert Oppenorth second prize of \$3 in the contest.

At 1 p. m. the companies gathered at the village hall and formed up for the grand parade as follows:

Hartford Band, Hartford Fire Department, West Bend City Band, West Bend Fire Department, North Milwaukee Band, North Milwaukee Fire Department, Cedarburg Fire Department, Barton Fire Department, Schlesinger-ville Fire Department, Kewaskum Band, Kewaskum Fire Department.

The line of march was from the village hall on Main street, east to West street, north to Wilhelmina street, west to Railroad street, to Malt House street, to Fond du Lac avenue, south to Main street, east to South Side Park.

At the park Prof. J. F. Cavanaugh, principal of our public school, gave an address of welcome which contained much of interest to the public in general as well as to the firemen.

The attendance at the park in the afternoon was one of the largest ever assembled there. The crowd was a very social one, spending their time in innumerable pastimes and listening to the select music rendered by the West Bend and Hartford bands.
