"DRUG TRUST" LOSE CASE

GOVERNMENT WINS A COMPLETE VICTORY IN ACTION AGAINST THE MEDICINE COMBINE.

NO MORE "BLACK LISTS."

Drug Associations Cannot Discriminate Against Dealers Who Cut Rates—Must Sell to All.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 9.—

The so-called "Drug Trust" was perpetually enjoined yesterday from its operations by the entering of a decree in the United States circuit court for the district of Indiana on the complaint of the United States government, filed by Joseph B. Keating, United States district attorney.

Breaks Up Trust.

The defendants, ninety-two in number, who are the members, officers, directors, agents and proprietors of the National Association of Retail Druggists, the National Wholesale Druggists' association, Tripartite Proprietors' Blacklist Manufacturers' "Drug Combinations" and "Wholesale Contract Proprietors," and Charles C. Bombaugh, are enjoined from conspiring to restrain trade in drugs, fix prices by agreement, blacklist retailers who cut prices, or to engage in any other act in restraint of trade.

Issued "Black Lists."

Charles C. Bombaugh was charged in the bill of complaint with being engaged in printing and circulating lists of names of druggists throughout the country who sold proprietary articles and who refused to sell to those who were on the alleged combination.

Can't Refuse to Sell Drugs.

It was further charged that those accused of cutting prices, and those who refused to sell to those on the list, were unable to purchase any kind of drugs from the members of the several associations, who were perpetually enjoined.

What the Decree Provides.

The decree provides that the defendants are perpetually enjoined from doing any act, in pursuance of or for the purpose of carrying out the combination, conspiracy and restraint of trade, and from maintaining or enforcing the same, or from aiding or abetting in the same, or from refusing to maintain prices, and from securing or aiding in securing the adoption of any such schedule of prices, or from maintaining or enforcing the same, or from aiding or abetting in the same, or from refusing to maintain prices, and from securing or aiding in securing the adoption of any such schedule of prices, or from maintaining or enforcing the same, or from aiding or abetting in the same.

All Contracts Void.
