



Must Not Sell Stale Eggs.

When you buy fresh eggs now the merchant or farmer is supposed to give you what you think you are getting and if they do not do so, all you have to do is to lodge a complaint against the vender and the government food inspectors will do the rest. One of these government inspectors recently waited around a store in an Iowa town, and when a farmer brought in some eggs he said he wanted some fresh eggs and took the lot. Several of them proved to be rotten and the farmer was assessed \$120 by Uncle Sam under the pure food law. If the merchant had taken the eggs and disposed of them to his customers he would have been liable to the same fine.

Find Cure for Poison Ivy.

The agronomy department of the college of agriculture at the University of Wisconsin, after continual experimenting, has finally found a remedy which it declares will prove effective against poison ivy. The remedy is a 40 per cent solution of iron sulphite and sulphuric acid and is easily made. Various requests for information on how to destroy the plant were received last spring, and the experimental force made a thorough study during the summer with good results.


