Fire Dept. Wins Prize Money in Badger Tourney

Members of the Kewaskum fire department won \$32 in prize money in the annual Badger Firemen's association tournament which was held Saturday evening and Sunday in conjunction with the annual firemen's picnic at Newburg.

In the contests held at 7 p. m. Saturday at the Newburg park Kewaskum took fifth in the relay hose contest. Germantown was first, West Bend second, Barton third and Saukville fourth. The relay bucket contest also was won by Germantown with Barton taking second, Kewaskum third, Waubeka fourth and Random Lake fifth. West Bend took top honors in the four man hose contest with Random Lake placing second and Barton third. Mequon, Germantown, Waubeka, Kewaskum and Saukville were all disqualified in the event, but shared in the prize money after awards were made to the winners.

In the annual Badger Firemen's parade held at 12:30 p. m. Sunday the local firemen did not win a place, although they had 16 men participating. Judging was based on the number of men participating, appearance and apparatus in the parade. Winners and the order in which they finished included West Bend, Cedarburg, Thiensville, Slinger, Mequon, Germantown and Saukville.

Kewaskum was the hard luck entry in the tourney, otherwise they would have won considerable more money. The local team did well in the first event, the relay bucket contest, finishing third. Members of the team were Leroy Keller, Jr., Augie Bilgo, Bob Staehler, Des Smith, Lee Honeck, Donald Sell, Lee Fellenz, Harry Koch and Bill Harbeck. The team in the relay hose contest, consisting of Keller, Bilgo, Staehler and Smith, had good time and should have placed better than fifth. They were the first contestants to participate and a coupling turned on too far caused them to lose valuable time. The coupling should have been checked by officials before the race. The same team also had fast time in the four man hose contest but was disqualified for not having a spanner fastened properly on a ladder. One more fireman in the parade Sunday also would have won a prize for Kewaskum. They had 16 entered and the prizes ranged down to 17.

Washington county departments gave a very good account of themselves in the tournament. A record crowd attended the two day picnic despite cool weather.

Reynolds of Taxpayers Alliance Will Speak to Kiwanians on Sales Tax

"Why Talk About the Sales Tax?" will be the subject of a talk to be given Monday evening, June 10, before the Kewaskum Kiwanis club. The group will meet at 6:30 p. m. in Jeanne's Dining Room, Light-house Lanes, to hear John P. Reynolds, assistant director of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance.

Reynolds will discuss major characteristics of the sales tax and arguments for and against its use in



Wisconsin. Also included in his talk will be an analysis of reports issued by the Committee on Revenue Sources and the Division of Industrial Development. A consideration of spending recommendations under the executive budget recently passed by the legislature, and especially their effect on future Wisconsin tax policy, will conclude the presentation.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Reynolds holds a master's degree in governmental management from the University of Denver. He served as research director of the Municipal League of Toledo, Ohio, before coming to the

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Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance in 1947. Reynolds is an accomplished speaker and has appeared frequently throughout the state talking on current topics of government.

Family Enjoys Outdoor Supper In Backyard on Summer Evenings

How cool and refreshing the backyard or park is after a stifling hot day. Why not enjoy supper outdoors more often!

Kabobs are the perfect food for the outdoor meal. Here's how to make the kabobs in the photo. Form balls of seasoned ground beef centering them with small chunks of sharp Cheddar cheese. Wrap each ball with a half-slice of bacon. Alternate these on skewers with mushroom caps, small onions or onion wedges, and tomato wedges.

Grill the kabobs from 10 to 15 minutes. Baste the vegetables

with butter while cooking. This gives extra good flavor to each bite.

If you want the meat to be rare, slip the morsels rather close together on the skewer. For well-done meat, separate the pieces slightly.

Make the meat balls about one and a half inches in diameter. If they are too large, they won't be cooked through by the time the other food on the skewer is done. Start thinly sliced potatoes fry-

ing in butter in the skillet on the grill before cooking the kabobs. The potatoes will take about 20-30 minutes to cook over a moderate heat.

To round out the menu, munch on relishes of green onions, celery, carrot sticks, and radishes. Serve herb butter French bread to go with the kabobs.

Pour fat mugs of milk when you're ready to eat. Leave the milk in the refrigerator until the last possible moment so it will be served icy cold.

Dessert is simple—a cheese tray accompanied by fresh fruit. On the tray pictured here are four different cheeses. The small triangles are Cheddar, the larger, Camembert. The squares are Blue cheese, while Swiss is cut into finger shapes.

HERB BUTTERED FRENCH BREAD

5-6 servings.

1 long loaf or 2 small loaves of French bread

½ cup softened butter

1 teaspoon lemon juice

½ teaspoon prepared mustard

¼ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

½ teaspoon sweet basil

½ teaspoon garlic salt

Combine seasoning with softened butter and mix well. Make diagonal cuts ½ to ¾ inch apart almost through the French bread. Spread herb butter on top and between the slices of bread. Place loaf on aluminum foil and wrap loosely. Place on grill for 10 minutes, turning often. Or, wrap in foil and heat in a 400 degree oven for 10 minutes.
