Outdoor Fish Fry, Dance Features Of Celebration

FLOWER SHOP WILL PRESENT QUEEN WITH CROWN, ROSES, COURT WITH CORSAGES

Balloting ended at the close of the business day on Wednesday, Oct. 2, in the Miss Kewaskum contest for the street opening celebration to be held next Friday and Saturday, Oct. 11 and 12. The ballots were counted the same night by members of the committee. Over 7,000 votes were cast in the contest.

The five highest girls in the combination of booster button sales and ballot votes will serve as the representative court from which the queen will be chosen by judges. The five who placed highest in the contest in the order named are as follows:

Added to the large list of valuable prizes published in our last issue, which were donated by local businessmen for the queen and her court, another prize has been received this week from the Kewaskum Floral Shop. The floral shop will present the queen with one dozen roses and a beautiful floral crown plus corsages for all members of her court and Miss Wisconsin.

Street opening festivities will begin next Friday at 5 p. m. with a big outdoor community fish fry. Boneless perch, potato salad, cole slaw and rye bread. There will be continuous serving from 5 o'clock

until 11 p. m. Roving clown bands will mingle in the business places and on the street all evening. All refreshment stands will be in operation.

At 9 p. m. Friday the semi-finals of the Miss Kewaskum contest will be held. The winner will be announced Saturday by Miss Wisconsin. Immediately following this will be staged a professional square dancing exhibition, with Gordon Frise of Plymouth as caller. Public square dancing will follow. And fish will still be available.

Saturday's festivities will start out at 1 p. m. with a kiddie parade and prizes will be awarded. This will be followed by a pet show under the direction of Ned Sengpiel. Pets will be judged by Sengpiel, Dr. Ogi and Orv Behnke on the qualifications of most unusual pet, best groomed and most obedient. Anyone interested in entering their pets should register with Sengpiel before next Thursday. Next in line will be kiddies' games and again prizes for the winners.

At 3 p. m. the crowning of Miss Kewaskum will be held with the presentation of prizes by Miss Wisconsin. After this professional acts will be put on, including a magician and show by Mel's Circus Clown Band. The magician will return for another performance. Refreshment stands will be open continuously through the supper hour.

At 7 p. m. songs will be rendered by the West Bend Barber Shop chorus and quartets. They will be attired in Gay 90's costumes.

At 7:30 p. m. the ribbon cutting ceremony will take place with state, county and village officials participating. Miss Kewaskum will cut the ribbon to open the new street. This will again be followed by professional acts and additional selections by the barber shoppers. The celebration will then be topped off with a gala street dance with music by Mel's band. Band members will discard their clown uniform for dignified clothes for the dance and will offer a variety of music.

Local merchants will hold a three day sale on Thursday, Friday and Saturday to mark the opening of Kewaskum's entirely new Fond du Lac ave.

Everyone plan to attend and have the time of your life next weekend in Kewaskum.

Freed on Bond to Await Sentencing At West Bend 24th

Nick Tarantino, 27, 727 E. Michigan st., Milwaukee, pleaded guilty to a charge of attempted burglary of the L. Rosenheimer department store in Kewaskum when he appeared before Circuit Judge William C. O'Connell at the court house in West Bend to face trial in the case on Wednesday morning.

He was not expected to plead guilty. The court ordered a pre-sentence investigation of the case by the State Department of Public Welfare with a report to be made to the court at 10 a. m. on Thursday, Oct. 24. Bond for Tarantino was continued at \$5,000 and he was released until the time of his appearance in court on the 24th.

Tarantino and two others, Frank Aliota, 25, 408 N. Jefferson st. and Salvatore (Sam) DiMaggio, 40, 1536 N. Franklin place, both of Milwaukee, are all facing charges of attempted burglary in the break-in at the Rosenheimer store last Feb. 17.

Aliota is free on bond pending his appearance in court at West Bend for the attempted burglary and DiMaggio is serving time in the state prison at Waupun on another charge on which he was recently sentenced in Milwaukee. Both Aliota and DiMaggio will be brought to court in West Bend to stand trial for the Kewaskum burglary attempt.

Tarantino was arrested here on the night of the break-in when he was found hiding behind a garage on Railroad st. about a block from the store after Chief of Police Roland Pledl and sheriff's department deputies surprised the burglars while they were inside the Rosenheimer store. The three fled the building with Chief Pledl firing on the fleeing trio. Tarantino was apprehended the same night while the other two were picked up later in Milwaukee.

Jurors called in to sit on the Tarantino trial were dismissed by the court following the surprise plea of guilty. Aliota and DiMaggio will probably be brought up for trial after the sentencing of Tarantino Oct. 24.



The combined annual meeting of the Slinger, West Bend-Germantown and Hartford locals of the Pure Milk Products Cooperative was held at Roth's hall, Slinger, on Monday, Sept. 30, at 8 p. m.

Elected to the new Slinger local board were John Hembel, president; Arthur Breit, vice-president; Arnold Rosenthal, secretary-treasurer and member of the advisory board; Russell Lepienand, Alvin Straub, Campbellsport, directors.

Delegates to the convention named were Hembel, Straub and Lepien, with Wilfred Powell and Wilbert Gitter, Campbellsport, alternates.

The new West Bend-Germantown board consists of Ira Oelhafen, president; Ed Gutchenritter, vice-president and member of the advisory board; Louis Basler, secretary-treasurer; Alan Peil, John Kopp and Walter Klug, directors.

Convention delegates are Oelhafen, Basler, Peil and Gutchenritter; alternates Kopp and Klug.

Information, Care of Asian Flu Given By Red Cross Chapter

Mrs. W. P. Sauer, Red Cross home nursing chairman for the West Bend chapter, has just received the supplementary teaching material for the Asian flu for the instructions of the home care of the sick and injured course, Mrs. Harold Fischer, R. N., Mrs. William Nielsen, R. N., West Bend, and Mrs. Roland Pledl, R. N. Kewaskum.

For the many chapter residents who have taken the 12 hour course, the instructors would like to pass on the following specific information for the care of Asian flu patients:

If an epidemic of Asian flu hits our community, it is estimated that there may be as many as one out of every five persons ill at the same time. The hospitals may be overcrowded and probably only complicated cases can be admitted. All others of necessity will be cared for at home. Therefore, it is important that at least one member of the family know how to give the nursing care needed.

While at the present time the disease has resulted in few fatalities, and is usually uncomplicated, the patient will feel very ill for a few days.

SYMPTOMS

Sudden onset with fever up to 103 - 104 degrees. Headache, muscular soreness, discomfort, and sometimes sore throat or cough.

LENGTH OF DISEASE

Three to five days with a period of 10 days to 2 weeks when a patient feels weak.

TREATMENT

Call a physician, report the illness, and be guided by his instructions. The nursing care of the patient with Asian flu is the same as care given to anyone with a communicable disease. The following suggestions for care are important: Keep patient in bed while he has fever. Give plenty of fluids while fever lasts. (Minimum of 1 quart per day). Soft diet. Keep people with colds, sore throats, or other suspected communicable disease away from patient. A cooling bath or cold compress to head may make patient more comfortable. Avoid chilling the patient. If not contraindicated by history of non-tolerance, an analgesic such as aspirin may be given. (Ask doctor for specific drug and the dosages for various age groups in the family. Allow 2 to 3 days following fever before resuming regular activities.

PRECAUTIONS

The very young, the very old, and those with chronic illnesses such as heart disease or tuberculosis should avoid exposure to the disease and be under the care of a physician immediately at the onset of symptoms.

VACCINATION

When vaccine becomes available, one dose will usually immunize people against the disease. Protection usually begins within a week to 10 days following inoculation. Priority of people for vaccination will be determined locally. This will enable the community to cope with

the epidemic should it reach serious proportions.

Within the family the aged, the chronically ill, and pregnant women will probably have priority for immunization. The doctor may not recommend vaccination for children under 6 years of age, or, to lessen the severity of the reaction, he may give several small doses rather than one. Older children and adults have little reaction to the vaccine. Vaccination is contra-indicated if people are allergic to eggs.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS

Good nursing care, soft diet, prevention of the spread of the disease to other members of the family and to the home nurse through the techniques of handwashing, safe disposal of waste, and separation of the patient from the rest of the family should be emphasized. (It is suggested that this article be clipped for future reference).

Anyone who wishes to take the full 12 hour home care of the sick and injured course, call the Red Cross headquarters, Fed. 4-5687, or the instructors listed above.

The American Cancer Society says that at present rates, 46 per cent of breast cancer patients are being saved. But 81 per cent are saved when the disease is diagnosed and treated in time.




