### Horicon Upsets Chevs, 60-44, to Tie for First

**HARTFORD TO PROVIDE NEXT TEST IN GAME HERE ON SUNDAY NIGHT**

A new and much stronger Horicon team ended the victory string of Kewaskum's perennial Land o' Lakes champions there Sunday night in a one-sided 60-44 upset. The win gave Horicon a tie for first place with the Chevs and Cedarburg, all of whom have 3-1 records. It was Horicon's first victory over the Chevs since 1951, a space of six years. The winners, much improved this season by the return of big center Del Schmidt from the service and a star newcomer in R. Taylor, high school coach, were hot shots Sunday on their home court. On the other hand Kewaskum was very cold in their shooting and this, with very weak rebounding, provided their downfall. The tall Horicon cagers were able to snare rebounds off of both boards. With the rest of the Chevs off in their shooting, all Horicon had to do was cover John Tessar and they had it made. The team really misses big George Hanrahan this year. He was a big help on rebounds and opponents couldn't guard him and Tessar both.

It wasn't the defeat which surprised because Horicon was a good team Sunday but it was the margin of 16 points by which they did it. Horicon led by one point at the end of the quarter, by five at halftime and by eight at the end of the third period as they gradually pulled away. Then they poured it on in the last quarter with Kewaskum using substitutes freely. Horicon will be a tough team to beat out this year.

Kewaskum's 44 point total was the team's lowest score that we can remember. They used to run up that many points last year in the first half. The Chevs made over 100 points in several games last season but haven't come close to that figure yet. Of course, there are four players missing from last year's team.

Tessar was held to 16 points, his lowest total in a long time. Frank Krueger with 10 and Don Melsenheimer with 8 points did next best. Taylor, who hit from all angles, starred for the winners and took scoring honors with 28 points. The other newcomer, Schmidt, chipped

in 11. This Sunday night the Chevs are in for more trouble when Hartford comes here to do battle. Hartford, with a 2-2 record, always proves tough, especially against Kewaskum and the locals will have to play better ball than they have been to win.

## Meister Enters Circuit Post Race

FIRST CANDIDATE IN RACE FOR NEWLY CREATED POST

County Judge Milton L. Meister of Washington county this week announced his candidacy for the new-

ly created twenty-fifth judicial circuit which consists of Washington

and Ozaukee counties. The twenty-fifth circuit was created by the state legislature because of the heavy amount of work carried by the 13th judicial district which now exists and which is comprised of Dodge, Ozaukee and Washington counties.

The new judicial circuit will become operative in January, 1960 upon the retirement of the present Judge William C. O'Connell.

The election for the judge of the new twenty-fifth circuit will be held on April 1, 1958 and nomination papers must be filed on or before Jan. 28, 1958. Judge Meister is presently circulating his nomination papers to conform with the filing deadline.

Born at Slinger in Washington county, Judge Meister was graduated from Slinger high school and later attended the University of Wisconsin where he graduated from the law school in 1931.

Since his graduation from the state university, Judge Meister has been active in the practice of law for more than 26 years including eight years as district attorney of Washington county and more than

five years as county and circuit judge. Judge Meister also serves as juvenile judge of Washington county and has been commended for his keen interest in juvenile affairs.

Judge Meister also served as judge of the 13th judicial circuit when he was appointed to fill the vacancy created when the late Judge Edward J. Gehl was elected to the state supreme court.

A resident of the town of West Bend, Judge Meister is 49, married and the father of two children. He has been active in many civic affairs including the Red Cross, PTA and Boy Scouts.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present except Trustee Tessar.

DEBT RETIREMENT & INT., \$18,543.75 at the rate of \$2.5324 per thousand.

TOTAL TAX LEVY, \$164,758.75 at the rate of \$22.50 per thousand.
