86 Attend Disaster Nursing Institute

KEWASKUM, FIFTEEN OTHER COMMUNITIES REPRESENTED AT WEST BEND MEETING

When 86 nurses, doctors, civic, Civil Defense, and Red Cross chapter officials representing 16 communities gathered at the Wisconsin Electric Power company, West Bend, on Thursday, April 10, for a two session disaster nursing institute, no one anticipated that shortly after midnight the village of Jackson would be the scene of a 20 car train wreck. Luckily, no one was hurt and disaster action was not needed.

"It can happen here! The need for planned preparedness and mutual aid is a necessity," emphasized Harold Schatz, chapter disaster chairman, and Joseph Huber, chapter vice chairman, when they welcomed the assemblage for the afternoon and evening sessions respectively.

In her discussion, Miss Lillian McKinnon, Red Cross nursing field representative for Wisconsin, pointed out that only the physicians and hospitals are directly responsible for the actual medical and surgical treatment when a disaster occurs. Those two groups have a pre-disaster arrangement worked out in detail for the immediate handling of casualties.

To show how the Red Cross chapter assists, she explained charts showing the organization, various aspects and responsibilities of the subcommittee on medical and nursing aid. A second chart showed the medical and nursing problems in various disasters in their order of operational needs as fires, explosions, tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and wrecks of public transportation. Additional charts explained the care of infants, chronically ill and aged, isolation of suspected cases of communicable diseases, at term pregnancies, accidents, acute illness sanitation including water supply and sewage disposal in mass shelters when the need arises for temporary establishment.

In summarizing Miss McKinnon listed the following Red Cross services, co-ordinated with the efforts of local public health officials, physicians, dentists, nurses, and hospitals that may be required:

Providing medical and nursing care in Red Cross shelters.

Establishing and staffing first aid stations, infirmaries, and emergency medical and hospital supplies including whole blood and blood derivatives.

Augmenting local resources for transporting the ill and the injured.

Providing additional nursing personnel where needed for adequate care of patients.

Assisting hospitals and physicians with plans for the care of disaster patients.

Communities represented included Fond du Lac Campbellsport, Kewaskum, Jackson, Lake Geneva, Mequon, Slinger, Milwaukee, Racine, Sheboygan, Hartford, Beaver Dam, Port Washington, Waukesha, Watertown and West Bend.

Among the civic officials in attendance were Mayor Walter J. Schmidt, Assistant Chief of Police
