RESOLUTION APPROVING ASSESSOR'S PLAT OF VILLAGE ADOPTED

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in adjourned meeting with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present.

The following ordinance was introduced by Trustee Merwin:

ORDINANCE NO. 58-4

AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE NAMES OF STREETS, HEREINAFTER MENTIONED, IN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That South Street shall hereafter be known as Roseland Drive.

Section 2. That Park Street shall hereafter be known as Prospect Street.

Section 3. That West Water Street shall hereafter be known as Park View Drive.

Section 4. That East Water Street shall hereafter be known as River View Drive.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.



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

3 eggs, beaten	1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 cup cream, scalded	dash of pepper

Prepare pie crust in pie plate and chill in refrigerator. Beat the eggs well, add seasonings—slowly add the cream and milk which have been scalded together. Distribute chopped bacon and grated Swiss cheese evenly over the bottom of the pie shell. Pour egg and milk mixture over the cheese. Bake in preheated 400° oven for 10 minutes and then turn the temperature to 300° and bake for about 30 minutes. The pie is done when a silver knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Allow to stand 5-10 minutes before serving.
