## Two Kewaskum Students Get Degrees at U.W. Congregation Honors

Two students from Kewaskum were among the 2,500 students who were candidates for degrees at the University of Wisconsin's annual commencement this year, held in the Wisconsin stadium Monday (June 8) at the university.

The candidates and their degrees were: Mark D. Rosenheimer, bachelor of science; and Richard L. Wesenberg, 1538 River View Dr., bachelor of science, medical science.

The graduation ceremony highlighted a week end of intensive commencement-reunion activity on Wisconsin's campus Friday through

Monday, June 8. A reception by President and Mrs. Conrad Elvehjem in honor of the graduates, their parents, and alumni was held Sunday evening, and Sunday afternoon the All-University Honors Convocation cited 400 students for their achievements during their UW careers. Members of 12 classes graduating from the UW over the years from 1904 to 1954, holding reunions this year, were among the thousands who attended Wisconsin's colorful commencement.

## Rev. Gerhard Kaniess At Farewell Reception

DELIVERS FAREWELL SERMON JUNE 14, TO BE INSTALLED AT WAUTOMA JUNE 21.

A farewell reception in honor of Pastor and Mrs. Gerhard Kaniess of St. Lucas Lutheran church was given in the church parlors Sunday afternoon by the Ladies' Guild and Ladies' Aid of the parish. Rev. Kaniess has accepted a call to Peace Lutheran church in Wautoma after serving as pastor of St. Lucas congregation in Kewaskum the past 31 years.

Rev. Kaniess, who has been a resident of the area about 50 years, and Mrs. Kaniess were presented with a purse from the congregation and various gifts from the different organizations at the reception. He will deliver his farewell sermon on Sunday, June 14, and will be installed as pastor at Wautoma on the following Sunday, June 21. No successor has been retained as yet by the congregation. Rev. and Mrs. Kaniess will leave for Wautoma on Tuesday, June 6.

Rev. Kaniess is a son of the late Rev. and Mrs. Gustav Kaniess of the town of Scott. His father served as pastor of Immanuel Lutheran church in that township for many years. After graduating from Concordia seminary, St. Louis, Mo. in June, 1928, Pastor Kaniess was installed and ordained in Kewaskum on Aug. 5, 1928.

During the reverend's 31 years as pastor here the church and parsonage were remodeled and renovated, a new pipe organ was installed in the church, and chimes were added in memory of the boys who died in World War II.

In 1953 the congregation celebrated Rev. Kaniess' 25th anniversary of installation and ordination and his wedding anniversary. In 1952 the congregation held festive services in honor of the 75th anniversary of St. Lucas church.

Mrs. Kaniess has been church organist and junior and senior choir director since 1938.

Rev. and Mrs. Kaniess have four children. They are Gerhard, Jr., a teacher at Fox Valley Lutheran High school, Appleton; Judy (Mrs. Roger Groeschel) and Jeanette (Mrs. Wally Cudnoske) of Kewaskum, and Irene, a student at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., where she is working for a degree.

## 120 Railroad Laborers To Camp Here, Police Chief Issues Warning

On or about June 23, the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad will have a railroad camp of about 17 cars in Kewaskum on the siding at the Rosenheimer malt house. There will be about 120 laborers in the camp. The men will be working during the day replacing railroad ties and tracks. The railroad authorities stated that the camp will be here ten days to two weeks.

The local police department objected to having the camp in Kewaskum because of the reputation of these railroad camps. Two years ago this camp was in Rockfield (Washington county) and at that time there were three knife cutting affairs and one fatal accident.

During the time the camp is in Kewaskum there will be a police officer on duty at all times.

The police department is asking our citizens to assist them by carrying out the following suggestions:

1. Keep your doors locked—especially at night.
  2. Report any suspicious person or drunk in your neighborhood day or night.
  3. Be sure to notify your police dept. if you are going on vacation.
  4. Keep your boy or girl under 16 years of age off the street after 9 p. m.
  5. Teen-agers and adults, keep away from the railroad camp.
  6. Instruct your children to refuse money or candy from these men.
  7. Do not leave the key in your car.
- Keep your police dept. informed of any unusual activities.
- The police dept. will try very hard to do their duty—will you do yours?

## Deaths

### MSGR. PETER K. FLASCH

Funeral services for the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Peter K. Flasch, 78, a native of St. Killian, who was founder and pastor of St. Catherine's church, 5101 W. Center st., Milwaukee, was held at 10:30 a. m. Friday, June 5, at the church. Burial was in Holy Cross cemetery.

Msgr. Flasch died in his sleep at the rectory Tuesday morning. He had been suffering from a heart ailment. Born Jan. 12, 1881, at St. St. Killian, he was one of six children. Following his father's death, Msgr. Flasch and the family moved to Milwaukee, where he attended St. Augustine's school.

As a youth Msgr. Flasch worked at Gimbels and the Schwaab Stamp & Seal Co. before entering the seminary of St. Francis in 1896. He was ordained there June 10, 1906, by Bishop Fox of Green Bay, who officiated in the absence of Milwaukee's Archbishop Messmer.

Fr. Flasch was first assigned as curate at St. Michael's parish, Milwaukee. A year later he was transferred to St. Anthony's and in 1910 he was made pastor of St. Rose's parish in Fredonia. Fr. Flasch was assigned to build a new parish at the St. Catherine site in Milwaukee in 1922, which was completed in 1929. A convent was added in 1931, a rectory was built in 1936 and the permanent church was dedicated in 1950. The next year Fr. Flasch was elevated to the monsignori as a domestic prelate by the late Pope Pius XII. Under his leadership, St. Catherine's parish grew from 100 to 1,500 families.

A requiem mass was said at the church at 10 a. m. Thursday and was attended by the grade school children. The office of the dead was read at 10:30 a. m. Friday. Archbishop Cousins read the requiem mass at 11 a. m. Friday.

William Klabuhn 53, died Sunday, June 7, at 10:30 a. m. at his home in the town of Auburn following a lingering illness.

He was born Jan. 13, 1906, in the town of Auburn, a son of William and Anna Lietzke Klabuhn. On Aug. 18, 1937, he was married to Ella Bergman.



## Historymobile Coming To Kewaskum Saturday

RESIDENTS INVITED TO "MEET MR. LINCOLN" EXHIBITION

Residents of Kewaskum and vicinity are invited to "Meet Mr. Lincoln" when the Historymobile comes to town on Saturday, June 13.

The Historymobile will be parked at the lumber yard on Main street from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. There is no admission charge.

The "Meet Mr. Lincoln" exhibition is a special tribute to the 16th president during this year which marks the 150th anniversary of his birth. The exhibit was created by the staff of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, which operates the Historymobile, with the cooperation and financial support of the Wisconsin Lincoln Sesquicentennial committee and other donors.

Dioramas, or three-dimensional scenes in miniature, are a special feature of this year's Historymobile exhibit. Modeled by a society staff artist, the dioramas portray three early phases in the life of Lincoln: his birth in a log cabin on Nolin Creek, Kentucky; his early manhood in Illinois, where he is shown

as a rail splitter; and a scene from his flatboating days on the Mississippi River.

Lincoln made several trips to Wisconsin before he became president and special case exhibits in the Historymobile depict his service in the Black Hawk War, which brought him to this state, and his appearance at the Wisconsin State Fair in 1859, one hundred years ago.

Among special items on display are a handsome, oil portrait of Lincoln by an unknown artist; the Lincoln White House china; family portraits; and historical documents and materials related to the period.

Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Tschudy, New Glarus, are the Historymobile curators and will be on hand when school groups and adults visit the exhibit to "Meet Mr. Lincoln."

## Wonderful Strawberry Dessert

Strawberries come in with a bang once the season starts. California and our southern states' berries are at their height during May and the bountiful season for northern berries is June, right up until the fourth of July. Once this wonderful red harvest starts, it's wise to use delicious strawberries as frequently as possible. The season during which they can be bought cheaply is relatively short.

One of the handsomest and most delicious ways of using them is in the Strawberry Cream Roll we picture. It's made with a simple sponge cake batter baked in a thin sheet; cooled, then spread with whipped cream and sliced strawberries and rolled up in a beautiful, big roll. Serve it in generous slices and you'll agree it's wonderful.

### Strawberry Cream Roll

4 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
5 tablespoons water  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup sifted cake flour or all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon double-action baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 pint cream, whipped and slightly sweetened  
1 pint strawberries, sliced and slightly sweetened

Use an electric mixer or rotary egg beater. Beat eggs until thick and lemon colored. Gradually beat in sugar. Beat



the water and vanilla in all at once. Sift together dry ingredients and add all at once, folding them in by hand. Pour immediately into 15 x 10 inch jelly roll pan that has been lightly buttered.

To make jelly roll pan: Use a 24 inch piece of 18 inch wide heavy duty aluminum foil. Fold in half to make sheet 12 x 18 inches. Turn up the edges 1 inch on all sides and miter corners for firmness. If you're an old jelly roll hand, you'll appreciate the cake this foil pan produces, since it is soft and rolls easily.

Bake the cake in a moderate oven (375°F.) for 12-15 minutes or until a very light brown. (Do not overbake.) Turn out on a large sheet of foil which has been heavily sprinkled with granulated sugar. If you've made your own foil pan, unfold corners and peel foil off cake. Trim off side crusts if they are hard. Roll up immediately and let stand uncovered until cool.

When cool, unroll and spread with the cream and strawberries. Roll up again, then chill in refrigerator about 1 hour before serving. Cover with foil during chilling.
