Mrs. Arthur Eichstedt, 65, nee Lydia Holschen, of the town of Kewaskum passed away early Tuesday, Sept. 1, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, following an illness of several months with carcinoma.

She was born June 4, 1894 at Frohna, Mo. At the age of 16 years she came to Milwaukee and had been a resident of the Kewaskum area since her marriage to Arthur Eichstedt on Apr. 1, 1916.

Her husband survives, together with eight children, Henry of Milwaukee, Lester of Plymouth, Violet (Mrs. Arnold Steger) of R. 1, Theresa, Oliver, Verna (Mrs. Russell Krueger), Byron and Lorena (Mrs. Al Wagner), all of Kewaskum, and Ruth (Mrs. Sam Levin) of Crystal Lake, Ill. Herb Velsler, 6323 Greenfield ave. West Allis, suffered a broken leg and possible chest injuries at about 2 p. m. Saturday when his car struck one driven by Donald C. Backhaus, 30, of Barton. The accident happened on the Kewaskum hill on Hwy. 45, about a half mile south of the village in front of the Christ Backhaus driveway.

Backhaus said he had his directional signals on and was also making hand signals when his auto was struck by the Velsler auto from behind. The Velsler vehicle skidded 45 feet before the impact.

An auto driven by Richard G. Johann, 18, R. 2, Kewaskum, skidded off a town road about a half mile south of Cheeseville shortly before noon Saturday. Johann said he came over the crest of a hill and saw another car approaching slowly before pulling into the roadway from a driveway. 




