Farm Census Takers Have Training Course, Start Canvass Today

ALFRED H. SEEFELDT, CREW LEADER FOR LOCAL AREA CONDUCTS SESSION

Census takers for the local area in the 1959 Census of Agriculture have been appointed and will begin an intensive training course on Nov. 4 in preparation for the start of the field canvass on Friday, Nov. 5, it was announced this week by Crew Leader Alfred H. Seefeldt of Kewaskum.

The training session is held at West Bend, and is conducted by the crew leader who recently attended a five day census training course.

The training course covers the use of the census questionnaire, census definitions, interviewing and map reading. Emphasis is placed on the importance of locating every farm and obtaining complete and accurate information. The census takers conduct some actual interviews as part of the training.

Halloween Vandalism Reported in Village

Chief of Police Roland Pledl reported that Halloween passed quietly until an early hour Sunday morning when several acts of vandalism were committed in the village by a group of five minors, ages 16 and 17, and one youth, age 18.

The vandalism included: leaving the air out of the tires of three cars parked on North ave., leaving the air out of four tires of a car parked on Forest ave., damaging the top and tearing out ignition wires on a convertible parked on Third st., tearing out ignition wires on a car parked on First and School st., jacking up a car with building blocks and tearing out ignition wires on Park View Dr., moving bleacher seats from high school athletic field into the street, blocking traffic, and tearing down real estate signs in the village. The total property damage was estimated at \$57.25.

After receiving complaints via telephone calls from residents who were aroused from their sleep and saw the acts of vandalism being committed in front of their homes, Chief Pledl "laid in the weeds" and a short time later apprehended the youths who were still on the prowl.

No other serious acts of vandalism were reported in Washington county over the Halloween week end according to Sheriff Al Schmidt.

Farmer Killed When Tractor Falls on Him

Joseph Ruplinger, Sr., 65, lifelong farm resident of the town of Wayne, was accidentally killed at about 4 p. m. on Tuesday, Nov. 3, near his home when a tractor he was driving fell on him. Mr. Ruplinger was plowing near the edge of a field when he was thrown from the tractor into a ditch. The tractor tipped over and landed on top of him, fatally injuring the man.

The mishap occurred as Ruplinger came to the end of a row in the field and turned the tractor. The machine apparently went over the edge of the field and onto a steep bank along a road, causing it to tip. After rolling over the operator, the tractor continued to roll down the bank and came to rest on its wheels. Ruplinger was found by a neighbor, Mrs. Paul Schmitt, who noticed the tractor had stopped running and became curious. She was working in a neighboring field and went to investigate when she saw the abandoned tractor. She found Ruplinger lying on the bank. A Theresa doctor was called and pronounced the man dead.

Mr. Ruplinger was born on Dec. 7, 1893, in the town of Wayne, a son of the late John and Barbara Ruplinger. His marriage to the former Alma Welland took place on Oct. 21, 1919, at St. Killian.

Surviving are the widow, six children, Elmer, Joseph Jr., Harold and Raymond, all of the town of Wayne, Loraine (Mrs. Alphonse Weyer) of Theresa, and Orville of Oakfield; nine grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. Martin Schmidt and Mrs. Rosina Flasch, both of West Bend, and a brother, Killian Ruplinger of Campbellsport. Two sisters, Mrs. Alvina Flasch and Mrs. Arthur Mathwig, and one brother, Arthur Ruplinger, preceded him in death.

Mr. Ruplinger was a member of the Holy Name society of St. Killian's church, St. Killian.

The body is in state at Miller's Funeral home since 2 p. m. Thursday. Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Friday at St. Killian's church, the Rev. John B. Reichel officiating. Burial will be in the parish cemetery.

Geo. F. Brandt conducted an auction for Simon Hoering in Town Ashford.




MAIL CURTAILMENT ON VETERAN'S DAY







It All Began With An Acorn

Even a tremendous enterprise like Wisconsin's dairy industry had to start small.

To a pioneer mother in a wilderness cabin goes the credit for launching Wisconsin's first cheese factory — the first of some 2,000.

Back in 1840, Armine Pickett came to Wisconsin, settled in Jefferson County. He had a few cows and he had done some dairy farming back in Ohio, but how to produce butter and cheese on a profitable scale without more cows was a problem.

His wife, Ann, had the solution. "Between our neighbors and ourselves we have 20 cows," she said.

"Let's pool our milk, and I'll make it into cheese right here in our kitchen."

The idea made a hit with the Pickett's settler friends, and so "America's dairyland" was born in a Lake Mills cabin.

Like the dairy industry, any enterprise has to start small. You don't get an oak tree without first planting an acorn. So let's get going on community development around here, even if we have to begin on a small scale. And let's not scoff at small factories that want our help in locating in our community. The plant that employs 6 today can employ 60 tomorrow.

The recent session of the Legislature passed a law relative to when deer hunting licenses may be sold. This law has now been signed by the Governor and is in effect.

Previously, the sale of all deer hunting licenses was stopped at midnight the day preceeding the opening of the deer hunting season. Now licenses may be sold throughout the season; however, any licenses sold after the opening of a deer hunting season are not good until the next succeeding season.

For example: all persons who wish to hunt deer during the season beginning Nov. 14 must have purchased their deer hunting license prior to that date. This license is valid in all later seasons. A deer license issued on or after Nov. 14 is not a valid license to hunt deer during the season of Nov. 14 to 20 inclusive, however, such a license is valid to hunt deer in all open areas during the period from Nov. 21 through 29 inclusive. Deer hunting licenses issued on or after Nov. 21 are valid only for the special bow and arrow season that opens Dec. 5. Anyone wishing to hunt

deer during the special bow and arrow season that opens Dec. 5 must have purchased their license prior to that date.

The sale of deer hunting party permits shall close on Nov. 20 and none will be issued after that date.
