Peace Church to Dedicate New Addition This Sunday

Two Special Services, Open House Planned

Special services of dedication and thanksgiving are planned for Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, on Sunday, Jan. 29. The church school will meet at the usual hour of 9:00 a. m. The dedication service will be held at 10:15 a. m. The Rev. Robert C. Stanger, D. D., president of Elmhurst college, Elmhurst, Ill., and former vice president of the Evangelical and Reformed church, will be the guest speaker. The Rev. Paul C. Kehle, D. D., Waukesha, president of South Wisconsin Synod will also participate in the service. The three church choirs will provide special music.

A service of thanksgiving will be held at 2:30 p. m. with Dr. Stanger, Arthur Waterman, the architect of Fort Atkinson, and others participating. This service will be followed with "open house" and refreshments and fellowship in the church parlors. The friends of Peace church are invited to these services.

In 1958 the congregation took the first step in this development program when it purchased a lot facing Main street and in the rear of the church. This lot is used for parking. Early in 1959 the Eberle property which joins the church property and extends from Main street to First street was purchased. This purchase included the tavern, bowling alleys and other buildings. In October of 1959 a building fund visitation was conducted to finance the program.

The addition is a two story 46 by 68 feet structure above ground level and attached to form an L with the church proper. The first floor is planned for the nursery, kindergarten, primary and lower junior children. The upper floor includes facilities for the upper juniors, youth and adults for education, fellowship and visual education. The upper floor also includes the choir room, church office and pastor's study. A new hot water heating system was installed for the entire building and the church parlors have been redecorated. The purchase of land, building and furnishings, heating system and redecorating involves an investment of over \$107,000.00. The membership of the congregation is 440 communicant members and 150 children, or 590 souls.

The planning and building committee consists of L. N. Peterson, chairman; Robert Kroncke, Sr., Dr. Charles Ogi, Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer, Mrs. Joseph Schwind, Clifford Stautz, Homer Schaub, Wilmer Prost, and Gottlieb Walz. Peterson and Wayland Tessar are co-chairmen of finance committee.

1st Annual Beautena Royal Show and Sale Held at Rosenheimer's

400 BUYERS, OTHERS FROM
FOUR COUNTIES ATTEND.
SALE BRINGS \$3,600

The first annual Beautena Royal Show and Sale was held Saturday, Jan. 21, at Rosenheimer's implement shop in Kewaskum.

About 400 buyers and interested persons from four counties, including Sheboygan, Ozaukee, Fond du Lac and Washington, attended. Because it was the first show and sale of its kind held in the state, officials came from all over Wisconsin to learn how the affair was conducted. Ralston Purina Co. officials from St. Louis, Minneapolis, Fond du Lac and Madison also attended.

Purebred Holstein heifers, raised by breeders in the four counties, financed by Purina dealers, and sponsored mainly by 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, were shown and sold at auction. All calves were in place by 9 a. m. The showmanship contest began at 10 a. m., the judging of calves took place at 10:30, and the auction sale got under way at 1 p. m.

The sale of 18 heifers brought in a total of \$3,600, an average of \$200 per animal. The highest price paid was \$300 and the lowest \$110. Proceeds of the sale went to the 4-H club or FFA chapter showing the calves and about \$2,400 was turned over to the 17 sponsoring clubs.

The heifer, Beautena (grade), No. 15 on the program, was adjudged the grand champion and won the showmanship award. This animal was bred by Elmer Becker of Hartford, financed by the Hartford Elevator, and sponsored by the Eager Beavers 4-H club of Slinger.

Names of the heifers, the breeder, dealer and sponsor, and the price they brought are listed below. Names of the purchasers were not made available, although several of the animals were sold to farmers in this community.



In commemoration of their golden wedding day the celebrants were the recipients of many lovely gifts, flowers, plants, cards and money along with congratulatory messages.


FAMILY HOLY HOUR PLANNED FOR FEB. 5



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
