Natural Gas Service Is Approved for Kewaskum

Facilities to Cost \$230,000, Granted Exclusive Franchise

Milwaukee Gas Light Company has received approval from the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin to distribute and sell natural gas in the Village of Kewaskum.

An exclusive franchise to serve the community had been granted the utility by Kewaskum's Village Board.

Commenting on the approval, Milwaukee Gas Light Company President S. Lloyd Nemeier said, "The decision is a timely one. It allows us sufficient time to bring natural gas service to Kewaskum residents for the 1961-62 heating season. We will now be able to construct our distribution system in advance of the village's road re-surfacing program. This will result in a minimum of inconvenience to village residents."

Plans for the construction of the system have already been completed. The utility will now let out the construction contract for bids. Work is expected to get underway as soon as the bids are submitted and reviewed.

Present plans indicate that natural gas will reach Kewaskum through a transmission main which will meet Michigan Wisconsin Pipe Line facilities at the eastern limits of the village. Milwaukee Gas Light Company will construct its line from the junction of State Highway 28 and County Trunk Highway HH into Kewaskum. The transmission line will also serve the towns of Kewaskum and Farmington.

First year construction plans include installation of 5,200 feet of 6-inch pipe and 5,800 feet of 4-inch pipe. This initial distribution system would then be expanded with smaller pipe to serve properties not directly adjacent to the initial system.

Basic facilities to serve the Village of Kewaskum are expected to cost approximately \$230,000.

Firemen, Legion to Hold Annual Picnic In Park July 8-9

BEAUTIFUL PARADE, FREE ENTERTAINMENT, WATER FIGHTS FEATURES

A most enjoyable time is being planned for everyone at Kewaskum's annual Firemen-Legion picnic to be held in the village park on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 8 and 9. This year's event will be one of the best and biggest in years.

All of the amusement and refreshment stands will open early Saturday evening and will continue to operate until a late hour. A special attraction will be a square dancing exhibition to start the festivities. Les Schneider and his orchestra will provide music throughout the remainder of the evening.

The main feature on Sunday will be the huge parade which will open the day's activities at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The committees in charge of the affair have lined up one of the finest parades ever held here. The parade will include such outstanding musical organizations as the famous Hartford Legion band, Sheboygan Falls Drum and Bugle Corps, Kewaskum High school band and others. Letters have been sent out to all local businessmen asking them to enter floats and the parade is expected to have a very large number of beautiful entries. Other units in the parade will include visiting fire departments and Legion groups, drill teams, children's specialties, organizations, 4-H clubs, comedy groups and numerous others. It should be a real dandy. Cash prizes will be awarded for the best floats and kiddies' entries and free tickets good in the park will be given all youngsters who enter the parade.

Free entertainment acts Sunday afternoon and evening will feature Suzie the Chimp, and Tershay and Connie. Suzi is one of the most versatile chimps in the business for she does a large repertoire of stunts and tricks, and is worked over by a very beautiful young lady who has terrific patience with animals, which it took to teach Suzi all the difficult stunts. Firemen Win \$18 in Parade at Cedarburg

The Kewaskum firemen won \$18 for participating in the 14th annual Festival of Music and Badger Firemen's association tournament parade held at Cedarburg Sunday. The local firemen entered a large unit in the parade, consisting of 20 marching firemen, the department's old Model T fire engine and the Kewaskum High school band. The band received \$50 for participating in the parade. The local firemen's representation took up about half a block in the line of march and received much applause along the way.

A crowd estimated at more than 35,000 persons packed Cedarburg's streets for the long and most colorful parade. More than 30 musical organizations—bands, juniors bands and drum and bugle corps from several states, and firemen from the 20 member departments of the association—participated in the huge hour and one-half parade. The bands and drum and bugle corps competed for more than \$3,000 in prizes at the firemen's fairgrounds park.

The annual firemen's contests scheduled for Saturday night were called off because of rain, so Kewaskum firemen were not able to compete or win any prize money in the various events.




