Fire Dept. Called To Aid in Search For Missing Girl

The Kewaskum fire department was called out shortly after 1 p. m. Sunday to aid in the search for Pamela, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Strutz of Omro, who was reported missing in a large wooded area and marsh just south of the junction of Hwy. 28 and Kettle Moraine Drive, about two miles east of Kewaskum.

Mr. and Mrs. Strutz and family were visiting with the Harry Cundy family, whose address is R. 2, Kewaskum. Pamela had wandered off into the woods with a group of children. Smaller than the rest, she lagged behind to rest and became lost in the strange surroundings. When the other children returned without Pamela a search was begun for her by the families and neighbors.

After searching for some time without success, the police were notified and two county traffic officers arrived at the scene to join the hunt. Later they summoned the fire department to aid in the search. The little girl had already been missing about one and one-half hours when the fire department was called. Because of the large area to be combed and in an effort to find the tot in the shortest possible time, the firemen immediately asked for volunteers from the many persons who had followed the fire equipment and ambulance to the scene to join in the hunt.

Many of the firemen were at the turkey shoot at the Bar-N Ranch. Kewaskum police placed a call there and all available firemen present were ordered over the loud speaking system to report for duty at once at the location where the girl was missing. Several carloads of firemen bringing along a number of local Boy Scouts who were working at the turkey shoot, raced to the scene to join in the search. By the time they arrived Pamela had already been found.

She was found unharmed in less than a half hour after the search by firemen and volunteers began. The little girl was discovered by Mrs. Jean Backus, who with her husband Howard, were among the volunteers who aided in the search. Two firemen were working the area with them. Pamela was found resting under a tree on a hillside in the wooded area not far from the edge of the woods. Blasts on the equipment truck and ambulance sirens informed the searchers that the hunt was over and they could return from the woods and swamp, which was filled with water.

Before beginning the search, firemen asked for the girl's name so they could call out to her and also what color clothes she was wearing so they would know what to look for. She was wearing a red jacket, white T shirt and jeans.

Mrs. Strutz was informed that her daughter had been found safe, but seeing searchers coming out of the woods without Pamela, she believed something had happened to her. At the same time Mr. and

High School in First Cross Country Meet, Tips Port Washington

On Tuesday of this week Kewaskum High school opened its first cross country running season with a dual meet at Port Washington. Twenty-two runners ran a course of 2.1 miles. The first five men to finish on each team scored the number of points equal to the place in which they finished. Thus Kewaskum, the team with the LOWEST total score won the meet.

Kewaskum runners came in 1st, 3rd, 5th, 6th and 7th for a total of 22. Runners from Port scored 2nd, 4th, 8th, 9th and 10th for a total score of 33.

Assuring the win for Kewaskum were: Dennis Vetter, 1st in 11:25.2 for the 2.1 miles; Bill Koepke, 3rd; Russell Wampler, 5th; Allan Koepke, 6th, and Allan Rinzel, 7th.

Although at this time the final schedule is not complete, there will be meets on Tuesday, Sept. 26, at 4:00 p. m. at West Bend and a home meet with Berlin on Thursday, Oct. 5, at 4:15 p. m. at the Hon-E-Kor Golf course.

Participating in cross country running for the first time this year is Kewaskum High school, which now has a total enrollment that has grown to 455 students, by far the largest in the history of the school.

6,000 to 8,000 Attend Turkey Shoot Sunday; 340 Birds Bagged

The 9th annual Kewaskum Kiwanis club live turkey shoot held at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday drew the largest attendance and was the most successful ever held. An estimated 6,000 to 8,000 persons attended throughout the day and the large total of 340 turkeys were bagged by marksmen, 269 of them on the rifle range.

Warm, sunny, ideal weather was a big factor in swelling the attendance. For those who didn't claim a bird or fire from the rifle range, turkeys, other poultry and prizes were won in other events, such as cross bow shooting, trap and deer range firing, other target shooting and trout fishing contests. The largest trout caught measured 18 1/4 inches and was caught by Jack Wichgers, 712A E. Russell ave, Milwaukee. He received a set of Regal stainless steel as a prize.

Bratwurst, hot beef and hot dog sandwiches were sold in large quantities as were refreshments. The grounds were crowded as early as 9 a. m. by shooters to try their luck. At most times throughout the day shooters had to stand in line to wait their turn to get at the range. Free entertainment was provided by the Wanbuli Indian dancers. The thousands of men, women and children who attended came from all over the state.

All profits of the shoot go to the Kiwanis club's youth and community benefit funds.

Many a turkey that would have seen Monday morning wound up in a freezer instead. The shoot keeps growing each year. There were 33 firing lanes in operation this year. The event has grown to such proportions the club is unable to handle it alone. About 100 volunteers from the village, including wives, other service clubs, auxiliary police, scouts and others chipped in to help.





Indians Bow to Random Lake in Opener, 24-12

The Kewaskum Indians opened 1961 season football action in the Scenic Moraine conference at Random Lake last Friday night and were upset, two dozen to one dozen, 24-12.

Quarterback Gary Hamm of the Rams was mainly responsible for the setback. He hit his target three times on touchdown passes in the first half to power the Random Lake scoring surge. Two of the tosses were to End Roger Schulz for 30 and six yards and the other sailed 42 yards into the arms of Gary Hoffman.

Fullback Bob Shommer bulled two yards for the Rams' final touchdown in the third period. Lauren Zoulter accounted for both of Kewaskum's touchdowns on runs of 17 yards and five yards. Both teams missed all of the extra point tries.

In other opening battles title favorite Pewaukee scored two first half touchdowns and made them hold up for a 12-7 victory over defending champion North Fondy, Germantown trounced Campbellsport, 21-7, and Grafton walked over Slinger, 28-6.

This Friday night the Indians are in for more trouble when they host Pewaukee's powerhouse, picked by conference coaches as the team to beat for the title. This will be the opening home game and Kewaskum will also be at home the next Friday, Sept. 29, entertaining North Fondy.
