Light and Power Off 5½ Hours Here During Storms Friday Night

A series of severe electrical storms which swept over the Kewaskum area Friday night and early Saturday resulted in minor damage and caused most sections of the village to be without light and power for approximately five and one-half hours.

The storms swept in from the southwest, the first arriving Friday night at about 9:30 and several others followed at intervals of a half hour to an hour apart. The storms brought heavy rains and severe flashes of lightning and thunder. The most serious storm struck about 12:30 a. m. and a bolt of lightning which struck somewhere in the southeast area of the village knocked out the power and light.

Wisconsin Electric Power Co. crews worked throughout the night trying to find the source of the power failure without success until about 6 a. m. Saturday when light and power was restored. Night police officer Marriner Frank and Armin Oppermann, village superintendent of public works, remained on duty all night assisting electric crews and keeping check on the village water supply and utilities.

All of the street lights except some on Fond du Lac ave. were out and most homes were without light and power. Electric clocks, including the Holy Trinity church clock, stopped at 12:30 a. m. Numerous residents woke up late Saturday morning because their electric alarm clocks failed to go off. Some plants working nights were without power and other business places locked up for lack of light. The water supply in the water tower dropped to a low level and if the power had not been restored when it finally was around 6 a. m. the battery unit would have had to been put into use to replenish the supply. Many refrigerators defrosted, heating units stalled and other inconveniences resulted.

Although trees suffered at least slight damage, there were no reports of major damage or flooding and there were no emergency calls to police or fire departments despite the severe electrical storms. However, many farm fields were under water Saturday morning. Some hail accompanied the rain in other county areas.

National Guard Call To Duty Will Affect Many Local Members

LOCAL PLANTS TO BE HIT BY CALL TO ACTIVE DUTY EFFECTIVE OCT. 15

Following the recent announcement that Wisconsin's 32nd National Guard Division would be called into active duty, effective Oct. 15, with mobilization at Fort Lewis, Wash., the impact began to be felt in Kewaskum and surrounding area.

Members of the two units at West Bend were left with little time to arrange their personal and numerous business affairs. The two units are the 32nd Aviation Co. and the 432nd Transportation detachment, aircraft maintenance. Over 200 members of the West Bend units are affected.

Many of the members of the West Bend units are residents of Kewaskum and surrounding areas. Local plants will be hit by the call to active duty, especially Regal Ware, Inc. and Fairmont Foods. It is reported that both plants will lose a number of men. One or more local teachers will also be included.

The local units are expected to have few extreme hardship cases that would apply for exemption. Maj. Gen. Ralph Olson, state adjutant general, said "we will take each case as it arises, but in fairness to our country, we must be very strict and allow only a few exceptional discharges."

More information regarding orders for the West Bend units was announced at a drill held at the West Bend airport last week. A tremendous amount of paper work is still involved, as well as preparations to move the men, weapons, planes, helicopters and other equipment to Washington.

Dick Zaring Receives Master's Degree at UW

Richard E. Zaring, Sr., Kewaskum, was among the 997 students who received their undergraduate and graduate degrees this fall as the result of their final scholastic work during the 1961 summer sessions of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, it was announced this week by the state university registrar's office.

Richard received the master of science degree in education.

The list of summer degree recipients was announced as all student scholastic records for the summer and the early autumn were completed and compiled.

This brings the total number of degrees awarded by the state university during 1961 to 4,506 and the total number of degrees granted by UW during its 113-year history to 132,599. A total of 2,381 degrees were conferred at the university's regular annual commencement last June.

Of the total 997 degrees awarded this fall, 307 were bachelor degrees and 690 were higher degrees. Of the higher degrees, 146 were doctorates, maintaining Wisconsin's high place among the nation's universities in the number of doctor of philosophy degrees conferred.

Raise Driver License Fees; Bill Introduced By Elmer Schowalter

Driver license fees were increased in a bill signed by Gov. Nelson to finance an expanded program of driver training in Wisconsin vocational and high schools.

The bill, signed Sept. 21, appropriates \$1 million annually in state aids for driver training. A school may receive \$25 for each pupil who completes an approved course.

The fee for new licenses will be increased from \$2 to \$2.50 effective Nov. 1. The fee for renewals will increase from \$1 to \$2 and instruction permits from \$1 to \$1.50.

The bill was introduced in the legislature by Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter of Jackson (Washington county). It was supported by the Wisconsin Council of Safety and the American Automobile association. Gov. Nelson had urged such legislation in his message to the legislature.

In a letter to the Statesman, Assemblyman Schowalter writes that he is happy and proud to have been able to be helpful in passage of this bill. He feels sure that it will make for better drivers and save lives and much suffering through automobile accidents, adding that it costs "us drivers" 50 cents per year more for safer highway travel.

Mr. Schowalter also states that he is pleased to report that he has been re-appointed to the committee to visit state institutions. This committee of three senators and four assemblymen is to visit all state institutions. Reports in writing are then to be given to the next legislature on needs and conditions of all the welfare and penal institutions.

He adds that his former visits as a member of the committee in 1959-60 (he visited all institutions) have shown that the personnel and help is helpful and kind to the inmates. At Green Bay he found and visited a distant relative, a young man from Milwaukee, who spoke of good care and rehabilitation help.

Mr. Schowalter's aim is to be helpful to the unfortunate inmates and sad welfare cases seen. Any county residents who have kin at any institution or need home help should feel free to contact him personally.
