Kewaskum Cross Country Team Wins State Crown

Natural Gas Turned On in Kewaskum, Joins Other Improvements

140 CUSTOMERS ALREADY SIGNED FOR GAS SERVICE; BILL PAYMENT STATION TO BE ESTABLISHED

Another important step in the history of Kewaskum took place on Nov. 1, when natural gas began flowing into the homes and business places of Kewaskum.

Natural gas has now joined such other recent improvements in Kewaskum as new schools, streets, municipal and business buildings and recreation centers in bringing a better life to Kewaskum residents.

"Natural gas represents the inauguration of one more service to the people of Kewaskum," said Kewaskum Village President James D. Reigle. "The arrival of natural gas in Kewaskum is sure to have a definite effect on this community. The whole local economy received a shot in the arm with the natural gas construction work that began here this summer."

"The work and cooperation of Gas company construction crews," the village president continued, "in Kewaskum has been marvelous. As rapidly as they cut through an area, they had it filled in again. All in all, they were a fine group of men."

Gas Company District Manager Frank D. Sprtel expressed satisfaction with both the pace of construction and the natural gas acceptance in Kewaskum. Approximately 30,000 feet of natural gas main has been constructed since work began in July. Another 11,000 feet of service piping has been run from the gas main to the buildings of individual customers.

"For our first year in Kewaskum, we feel our progress has been very good," said Sprtel. "We already have 140 customers slated for service this fall, and feel certain that as the benefits of natural gas for heating, water heating, cooking, and clothes drying become better known, our customers total is sure to rise steadily."

Work still underway in Kewaskum includes the conversion of present appliances to natural gas, meter installations at some residences and interior house piping. New applications for service will continue to be accepted by the Gas company, Sprtel said. Applications received this fall will be filled as long as weather permits construction work to continue.

The inauguration of natural gas service in Kewaskum brings the total number of communities in the West Bend district to 12. Already served by Milwaukee Gas Light company are West Bend, Slinger, Hartford, Jackson, Cedarburg, Grafton, Saukville, Port Washington, Knellsville, Polk, and Ackerville. Kewaskum residents

Harriers Win State Championship in 1st Year of Competition

AMAZING ACHIEVEMENT IS ATTAINED BY RUNNERS; WIN TROPHY, MEDALS; BOYS PARADED

Kewaskum Community High school's crack cross country team attained an amazing achievement and wrote a one-year success story by capturing the state small-school championship in the first year it competed in the state cross country meet Saturday morning at the Hartford Country club.

Coach John Lutz' seven man team of runners put Kewaskum on the map by placing first among nine schools in contention for the state championship. All of the runners from the nine schools had previously been winners in sectional meets throughout the state. Kewaskum won out over Ripon, Clintonville, Amherst, Weyauwega, Albany, Winter, Oak Creek and Monroe.

Kewaskum's first year team was not expected to make a showing among the more experienced squads. Ripon was favored to repeat its win over Kewaskum at the sectional at Berlin the week before. As it happened, Kewaskum scored a tight 58 points to Ripon's second place 66 and easily took first place and the state title. Behind Kewaskum and Ripon were Clintonville 93, Amherst 97, Weyauwega 100, Albany 129, Winter 141, Oak Creek 172 and Monroe 221. (Readers are again reminded that in cross country competition the lowest score wins).

Individual runners who finished in the first five at each sectional meet also ran, but were not calculated in the team tabulations. Hence, although Dennis Vetter of Kewaskum finished second to Ralph Treder of Berlin, he took first place in the team score. Other Kewaskum runners to place were Bill Koepke 5th, Russ Wampler 8th, Allen Koepke 13th and Allen Rinzel 31st.

The top ten in the state meet were as follows: Ralph Treder, Berlin; 2. Dennis Vetter, Kewaskum; 3. Dennis Carey, Amherst; 4. Ron Behm, Weyauwega; 5. Glen Brewer, Albany; 6. Bill Koepke, Kewaskum; 7. Tom Celinton, Amherst; 8. John Maug, Ripon; 9. Russ Wampler, Kewaskum; 10. Robert Jartz, Clintonville. Time: 11:00 .4.

The finals were run in wet, windy weather at the Country club, and there was some concern about Dennis Vetter, who ran with a chest cold. Despite this, he took an early lead but lost it to Treder (individual runner from Berlin) after the mile and could not regain it. Treder took first as an individual runner but since he did not represent a team, his score did not affect the team standings.

Jack-o-Lantern Causes Blaze at Honeck Home

A jack-o-lantern which had been placed in the window in the spirit of Halloween for the benefit of "trick or treat" children and UNICEF workers was blamed for a fire at the Kilian A. Honeck home at 1212 Roseland dr. Monday evening. Many other residences in the village displayed lighted jack-o-lanterns or "pumpkin faces" in their windows or on the lawns that evening.

The fire department was summoned to the Honeck home at 7:15 p. m. The jack-o-lantern apparently got too close to window drapes and the flame ignited them. Mrs. Honeck was in the kitchen preparing lunch for UNICEF workers and her daughter Beth was playing the piano in the parlor when the fire started, but neither was aware of it until two neighbors pounded on the front door.

The two neighbors, Oscar Hirsig and Clyde Brehm, were busy making trips to their own front doors to answer "trick or treat" de-

mands when they noticed the drapes burning at the Honeck home. While awaiting more "trick or treaters," Hirsig said he was looking out of his window when he noticed the drapes ablaze in the Honeck house across the street.

The fire destroyed the drapes, damaged a table, lamp shade and the rug, charred the window frames and woodwork, and caused several windows to break under the intense heat. The blaze was under control when firemen arrived but because some plaster had been broken out it was feared the flames might have got between the walls. There was also damage from smoke and water but no immediate estimate of the loss was available. The fire was confined to the area around the window. The loss is covered by insurance.

During the past 109 years, the utility has grown from a small, one-man venture franchised to light the main street of a small town to a service organization which daily brings the modern way of life in the form of natural gas to more than 272,000 customers.

From a handful of pioneer employees laboring over service mains covering only a seven mile stretch of downtown area, the company has gradually expanded in all directions, until today it has become a statewide operation.

The elimination of heating restrictions in the fall of 1956, because of the completion of the American Louisiana pipe line, made possible a rapid expansion in the number of customers. The utility serves a total of 260,000 residential customers, 11,500 commercial customers and 1,430 industrial customers.

These customers, until the com-

pany's statewide expansion, were concentrated for the most part in the city of Milwaukee. The entire service area has a population in excess of 1,000,000 persons. The potential industrial load is very promising.

Not only is the company increasing its total number of customers year by year, but existing customers as well as new ones are using more and more gas as the variety of uses for natural gas becomes more widespread. Milwaukee Gas Light Company's maximum day sendout during its history occurred on Jan. 24, 1961 in the amount of 306,648 Mcf.

Today, approximately 1,500 employees handle the problems and cope with the vast work load which the rapidly growing utility faces in its day to day operations. Focal point for this activity is the Milwaukee Gas Light Company office building, located only a block or two from the lakefront on the city's main thoroughfare, Wisconsin ave. Because of its location, it can be seen by Milwaukeeans for miles in all directions.

Of granite and brick, the structure is 20 stories high and is purely American in style. The shading of the bricks is dark at the base, gradually growing lighter as it approaches the top to give the appearance of a gigantic gas flame.

The utility's top executives, under the direction of President S. Lloyd Nemeyer, have their offices

in this building. They are E. Gordon Black, vice president and treasurer; Lloyd J. Klein, vice president and controller; Nicholas J. Lesselyoung, vice president, secretary and general counsel; Bruce A. McCandless, vice president - sales; Ernest F. Semrad, vice president - operations; and Ned A. Vahldieck, vice president - chief engineer.

Taking advantage of the building's height, its proximity to the lakefront and its distance from other high buildings in the city, the company, in 1956, had a towering weather flame installed on top of the building. The giant flame, in three colors—red for warm, blue for no change, and gold for cold—can be seen over a 25-mile area. The top of the flame is 24 stories above the street and is 21 feet high and 9 feet wide.

In addition to drawing the attention of weather-curious viewers, the weather flame has become an aid to mariners. Many ship captains have reported using the towering beacon as a navigation aid while crossing Lake Michigan.

While general office procedures are handled at the main office building, other Gas company facilities are being built throughout the city and state. North and south service centers are presently being constructed in Milwaukee to better handle such duties as servicing of equipment, meter repairs and material storage.

New district office buildings are being built or leased in such

communities as Marshfield, Shavano, Columbus, Sun Prairie and New London. The company is also constructing a new office at West Bend.

Completion of the Canadian pipe line gave Wisconsin direct access to the three greatest natural gas deposits on the continent. Gas serving Wisconsin comes from Canada, Texas-Oklahoma area, the Louisiana Gulf Coast, and the huge storage fields of west-central Michigan. This multi-source supply provides the state with one of the most versatile and flexible natural gas supply systems in the nation.

How long will America's gas supply last? Producers continue to discover greater gas reserves each year. More, even, than the increasing amounts of gas used, so that as production of gas increases, estimated recoverable reserves of natural gas increase even more.

Proven U. S. natural gas reserves reached 263.7 trillion cubic feet at the end of 1960. Estimates place the total future natural gas supply at some 1,200 trillion cubic feet in this country, plus huge reserves just beginning to be tapped in Mexico and Canada.

In establishing a rate schedule, gas companies constantly seek to keep rates as low as possible, yet still provide high grade service.

Kewaskum Is Latest Community to Be Served By Milwaukee Gas Light Company

Milwaukee Gas Light Company's efforts to bring the benefits of natural gas to a growing number of Wisconsin communities were accelerated in 1961. Kewaskum, along with Marshall and Manawa, was one of three state communities which began to feel the impact of natural gas construction in 1961.

This acceleration assumed a two-phase pattern. Approximately \$5 million was spent by the utility to expand its distribution facilities in the 29 Wisconsin communities it is presently serving outside the Milwaukee area. During this same period, Milwaukee Gas Light Company asked the authorization of the Public Service Commission to serve 37 other state towns and cities in 1962-1963.

Total cost of serving towns included under these most recent filings is estimated at close to \$14 million. Since local labor and materials will be used whenever possible,

the flow of money into these new communities represents a major economic boost. The ability of natural gas to attract and retain industry is also expected to have an important economic impact on these areas.

In an August, 1961, filing, the company proposes to bring service to 37 western Wisconsin communities and two military establishments. The project involves the construction of 275 miles of pipe line laid by the supplier, Northern Natural Gas Company, and another 372 miles of transmission and distribution lines by Milwaukee Gas Light Company.

The area to be served would be the portion of western Wisconsin extending south from Rice Lake to Shullsburg. In addition to the necessary distribution systems the company would construct a transmission line that would run from Sparta to Reedsburg, Wis.

None of the communities listed in the filing has natural gas service at the present time, although Tomah and Sparta are served by propane-air gas distribution systems. Both communities are operating as districts of Milwaukee Gas Light Company's Western Division.

This filing is the most recent development in the company's expansion program, which began in 1960. Key to this program was the arrival of Canadian gas to Wisconsin in 1960.


Flowing from huge wells in Alberta, the Canadian gas crossed the border at Emerson, Manitoba, and was transported to Marshfield, Wis. In anticipation of the availability of Canadian natural gas the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin authorized Milwaukee Gas Light Company to purchase the assets and facilities of three smaller companies. These properties are now being operated as local divisions of the Gas company.

While the transmission line from Canada to Wisconsin was being constructed, the Gas company began its building program in the newly acquired areas. More than \$10 million was spent for the acquisitions, improvement, and development of these new properties. New service facilities, gate stations, offices and distribution systems were built in preparation for the arrival of natural gas.




