New 'Wunder Berg' Ski Hill Here Opens



Ski Hill Promotes Kewaskum As Resort And Recreation Area

SKI TRAILS, CHALET READY FOR OPENING; FOUNTAIN OF ARTIFICIAL SNOW TO ASSURE GOOD SKIING

Kewaskum's new "Wunder Berg" ski hill, located one mile south of the village, will officially open this Saturday, Dec. 23, it was announced this week. It will be open daily through the holidays from 9 a. m. There will also be some night skiing later.

The transformation of "Becker's hill" to a fun center of skiing, where hundreds of winter sports enthusiasts will be gliding down one of four trails, has been completed. The hill is situated west of Hwy. 45 and is visible from the highway.

The opening of the ski hill greatly enhances and adds more glamour to Kewaskum, gateway to the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine forest, as a recreation and resort area. It is only about a mile, too, from the newly completed Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country club. Other recreational facilities for which Kewaskum is noted include a beautiful park, bathing beach, ice skating rink, lighted football, baseball and softball field, tennis courts (next year), beautiful theatre, spacious new gymnasium, and excellent fishing, hunting, camping, water skiing, boating, tobogganing and hiking areas, etc.

The above photo, taken several weeks ago, before the recent heavy snows blanketed the ground,

shows workers clearing brush only half way up the huge ski hill. They are Henry Werner, University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee, student; John Pelkey and David Weber, both juniors at Marquette university high school, who are among youths employed at the hill week ends. Weber will also be a member of the resort's ski patrol. Since the photo was taken work on the chalet in the background, the ski, tow, trails, lighting, etc. has been practically completed.

A fountain of snow made from a reservoir of water will assure good skiing this winter at the resort, a project described to Kewaskum Kiwanis members last spring by the two proprietors and owners, Jack Christiansen and Dr. James Hugh Casey, both of Milwaukee. The Statesman published a news item on the coming ski hill, released by Dr. Casey, at that time.

The four trails, the longest over 2,000 feet, were cleared of obstructing trees in readiness for the skiers by Milwaukee youths helping on the project and others. Excavators, carpenters, erectors, electric and telephone company crews and other workmen have been busy on the project in recent months. Bill Claybaugh of West Bend will reportedly assume duties as head of the ski patrol.

Work on the twin-triangular shaped chalet, sitting at the bottom of the 201-foot hill, is nearly completed and affords a view of all four trails. The chalet will include a restaurant, warming lounge and a store for the renting and purchase of ski equipment. Because of the snow making equipment, the resort expects to be

Following is a letter extending holiday greetings, submitted by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Eberle, received from their nephew, Chaplain (Major) William Mayer, who has been with the U. S. Army in Germany for the past several years. Chaplain Mayer, a Kewaskum native, is a brother of Mrs. Robert Ours of this village and Carl Mayer of West Bend and a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mayer of here. An identical letter was sent to other relatives in the area. The letter reads:

Celestial Six
Babenhausen,
Hessen, Germany

Greetings from the land of Schnitzel and good beer!

Another year has become history. Last year at this time I thought that I had spent my last Christmas in Germany, but I was asked to extend another year. To that extension, the army has added another six months which brings my rotation date to 23 November 1962. Please excuse this mimeographed note but it was just impossible to write all of you individual notes this year. Here is a short summary of 1961.

With the passing of another year it leaves me with a few more gray hair and makes me another year older. I have been here so long the burgermeister (mayor) of Babenhausen was not surprised when I asked him for my free wood. This goes to people who live in a town for four years. The army decided to promote me to major on 21 July 1961. Hunting has been good; shot a birkhahn (black grouse) down in Austria in April. I managed to convince the engin-

ers that my chapel looked more like a "den of thieves than the house of God" and they finished painting the inside of it in November. There have been many opportunities to enjoy the beautiful countryside (manuevers and field exercises are frequent). I had the opportunity to visit Berlin before the wall was built. My impression: it is a modern city, a wonderful place to visit for a few days. The trip by military train told the difference between the East and the West. My dog Blade, a German shepherd, has grown strong as an ox; he is now two and a half years old and thinks that he owns the yard around my house. This spring I planted tulips and he would continue to dig them up as I planted them. We became great friends!

Here is hoping and praying that all of you will have a very happy and blessed Christmas. May the Christ Child not only bring His peace to you and yours but to the entire world. God bless you.

leading from a large 187,000-gallon reservoir of water and can be pumped up the hill and mixed with air to make snow.

The beginner's hill will be equipped with a ski tow to take amateurs up a 500-foot incline. The longer novice run nearby will take advanced skiers down a curved trail along the beginner's hill and ending at a flat expanse in the chalet area. Two intermediate runs will face northeast and zig-zag through pine trees to the foot of the chalet. A T-bar will take skiers to the crest of the hill. Winninghoff and Bradley of West Bend erected the chalet. Two large A frames turn the roof into two triangular shaped pinnacles. There is a 55-foot sun deck along the front of the structure.

Development of a third run down the south side of the hill to be used exclusively for the expert, is being planned. Christiansen said that John Kronsobel, Milwaukee,

who will hold examinations for ski instructors at Cable this year, will be among the instructors available at the Kewaskum hill this winter. The school will have national certification.

Although three of the trails are scaled intermediate, Christiansen said, this was based solely on state rather than national averages. Also planned is the development of a ski trail which will wind through much of the 47-acre plot. Water from the reservoir will be pumped in from a 250-foot deep well and run to the top. The well will also furnish water for the chalet.

The ski hill is believed to be the second highest hill in Washington county.





Chevs Beat West Bend For 4th in Row, 65-60, Share First in Lakes

The Kewaskum Chevrolets won their fourth straight game Saturday night at West Bend, defeating the Lithias, 65-60, to maintain their first place tie with Beaver Dam in the Land o' Lakes loop. Both have 4-0 records.



