Richard E. Lache, 51, of Kewaskum, an auto body mechanic at Honeck Chevrolet, Inc., passed away unexpectedly of a heart attack while at work at the Honeck garage on Wednesday afternoon, Mar. 7.

He was born Jan. 26, 1911, in Breslau, Germany, a son of the late William and Emma Zimmer Lache, and came to this country with his family only several years ago, on Jan. 28, 1957, taking up his residence in Kewaskum. His marriage to Ida Arlt took place on July 15, 1933, in Breslau and she survives him.

The deceased is further survived by one daughter, Eva-Lotte (Mrs. Gunther Uhlig) of Kewaskum; one son, Peter Lache, of West Bend; a son-in-law, a daughter-in-law, four grandchildren, three sisters, Mrs. Helen Zimmermann, Mrs. Martha Scheidler and Mrs. Irmgard Wothe, all residing somewhere in the old country and whose whereabouts are unknown; three brothers-in-law and three sisters-in-law.

The Snows Come to Kewaskum



Just to prove to some of our fortunate friends down in Florida that we weren't kidding about the many heavy snow storms of this winter, the above photos offer a couple of examples.

Those are our two grandsons, Tommy and Todd Timblin, atop the mountain of snow at the left. That picture took a lot more patience to take than it might appear. Tommy, 4, didn't have so



much trouble getting up the huge pile of snow but everytime he sat down for the photo he slid down on his butt to the bottom again. It didn't make too much difference though, because it took little Todd, 2, all that while to climb to the top of the pile one time. Note the size of the snowpile in comparison to the trucks in the right background.

The photo on the right shows a station wagon parked in the driveway almost buried by a natural covering of drifted snow. And both of the above photos were taken BEFORE the last three snow storms of the past week. We could have found some much bigger piles and some much bigger drifts all around but these are the only pictures we had available.

New Snow Storm Adds Several More Inches

STORM SUNDAY IS THIRD IN EIGHT DAYS, CAUSES MUCH DRIFTING

Another snow storm, the third in eight days, hit this area on Sunday, adding from 2 to 4 inches of new snow to the deep drifts already blanketing the ground (makes us wonder what the ground underneath looks like, not having seen it for several months).

The storm, which began Sunday morning and continued throughout the day, was accompanied by 20 to 30 mile-an-hour winds, causing considerable drifting, blinding motorists, paralyzing traffic, postponing many events, and bringing out the overworked plowing crews again. Winds swept across open fields with ferocity, piling the new snow and loose, granular snow from earlier storms into drifts. With the mountainous piles already lining the roads it doesn't take much snow or much wind to fill the highways level to the tops of the drifts again. County crews had to give up on some roads since drifts began to fill in only minutes after plows had made their rounds. Anything else we might mention would just be repeating ourselves from previous storms, so enough said on that.

On the brighter side of the picture was the warmer weather on Tuesday and Wednesday which began to melt the snow. The weather was in the 30's and the snowbanks settled several inches. It seemed wonderful to see water standing in the streets and running down the gutters for the first time in months. There was very little thawing this winter.

Getting back to the gloomy side, from three to six more inches of snow was predicted for Thursday and Friday of this week and it



BIRDS NEED HELP

Due to the deep snow and continued cold weather the pheasant and Hungarian partridge will need assistance from man until the snow starts to melt. We have saved a large number of birds by feeding this winter, and it would be a shame to lose our breeding stock with less than two months left to nesting time. Anyone who might know of birds that need feed, please contact me.

It is illegal to have a spear in possession during daylight hours, on any of the inland waters or shores of inland waters of Washington. Ozaukee or Fond du Lac counties from March 2 to April 20 inclusive. It is also illegal to fish in any manner except with hook and line within 200 feet of any fishway, lock or dam. This means that it is illegal to take fish by hand near a dam.

COUNTY'S SHARE OF STATE HOUSING LOAN FOR VETS AMOUNTS TO \$51,507.00

Washington county's slice of the \$4,769,200 state housing loan melon amounts to \$51,507, John R. Moses, director of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs told the local county veteran's service officer this week.

This money is now available and veterans interested in getting a loan should contact LeRoy Schaefer, courthouse, West Bend. Moses also said that from the experience of the past four months since the last allocation there should be enough money for all veterans eligible for loans. No county has run out of funds allocated since November 1, 1961. In Washington county 4 housing loans amounting to \$14,000 have been made.

Every four months housing funds remaining in each county are turned back to the department and reallocated. In this way funds do not lie idle in some counties while other counties run short of money. Previously when these funds were reallocated only once a year several counties would be out of funds for some time before the new allocation.
