## High School to Offer Course in Landscaping

A course in landscaping will be offered at the Kewaskum Community High school agriculture room for those people in the area who are interested. The course is divided into three sessions.

The first meeting will be Monday, March 26, and will feature fundamentals of soil management. The second meeting will be Monday, April 2, when insects and diseases will be discussed. The third and final meeting will be Monday, April 9, featuring principles of landscaping. Included in this program will be a flannel-graph showing principles of plant location on a lawn, a look at patios and shrubs and their habitat. All three meetings will begin at 8:00 P. M.

The program is sponsored by the University of Wisconsin Extension office of Washington county with the cooperation of the vocational-agricultural department of the Kewaskum Community High school. Speakers for the program are Jane Williamson, county home agent; Maurice Hovland, County agent, and R. J. Esser, local vo-ag instructor.

Further information on this course can be obtained by contacting R. J. Esser at the high school or Maurice Hovland at the county agent's office in West Bend. Circulars on the course are available at local business places and from the high school F.F.A. members. There will not be any fee for this course.

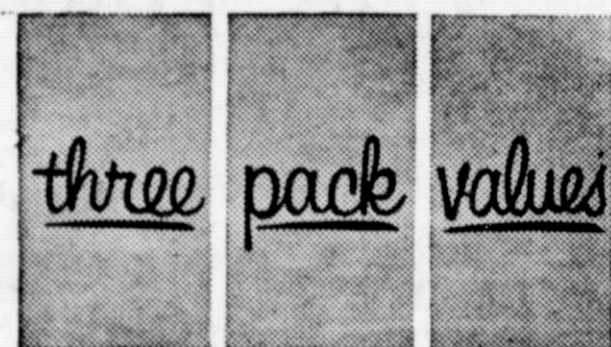

### Salvation Army Fund Drive Underway Here

Due to the resignation of M. Rosenheimer, who has served as treasurer for The Salvation Army service unit for many years, Burns R. Nelthorpe has accepted appointment of treasurer, it was announced by Colonel Marlon M. Cohn, divisional commander of The Salvation Army in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. L. N. Peterson will continue as chairman. The other members of the Kewaskum service unit for The Salvation Army are: Charles Miller, Clifford Rose, J. D. Reigle and Mrs. William Guenther.

The purpose of the local committee is to render immediate emergency assistance to individuals temporarily in need of the necessities of life. This includes food, clothing, fuel, optical and dental care, aid to transients, etc. This assistance is given regardless of race or creed, and is applied where there is no other funds available. These services are paid for from the money retained locally from the annual appeal. Many such services have been rendered in this community. 90% of all moneys raised in Wisconsin is used within the state.

In addition to meeting local needs that are not met by other agencies, the net work of The Army's institutions are made available to the local citizens of the county. These are in part: Homes for the aged; social service centers for the rehabilitation of drug addicts and alcoholics and the man that is down and out; home and hospitals for the care of unwed mothers and their babies; emergency disaster service; missing persons bureau; camping programs for youth and adults; aid to the men and women in the armed forces, and aid to the homeless. In all The Salvation Army renders 107 services to humanity.

A house to house campaign for funds is being conducted in Kewaskum and vicinity under the direction of the chairman, L. N. Peterson. The solicitation will be made by local people during March 15 through 31. A part of the money raised will be retained in Kewaskum for use here. The money will be turned in to the treasurer, Burns R. Nelthorpe, at the Bank of Kewaskum. When one of your neighbors calls won't you give generously? Checks should be made payable to The Salvation Army.

## Play Beaver Dam Here Sunday for First Half Crown

The Kewaskum Chevrolets downed Cedarburg in their final Land o' Lakes game here Saturday night, 83-69, to sew up a tie for the second half title with Menomonee Falls. Each finished with 6-1 records. The Chevs split with the Peavers in two meetings this season. At full strength, Beaver Dam has an outstanding team, including former college stars. They will be hard to beat and Kewaskum will have to be at its best to turn the trick. This is the most important game of the season that fans have been looking forward to and a good crowd should come out to see it. It should be a dandy.

If Kewaskum loses they still have a chance to be grand champions. On the following week end they will play Menomonee Falls for the second half crown. A win in this one would give them another crack at Beaver Dam. If the Chevs win both playoffs, it will be all over.
