Opening of Kewaskum's New Bonne Belle Motel on Sunday

Open House for Public to Be Held From 2 to 5 P. M.

DESMOND SMITHS OWNERS OF ONE STORY, SIX-UNIT MODERN BUILDING

Mr. and Mrs. Desmond Smith of Kewaskum will hold the opening of their new Bonne Belle Motel, located just south of the village on Hwy. 45, this Sunday, July 8. Open house will be held from 2 to 5 p. m. and the public is invited to inspect this beautiful motel building.

Kewaskum's latest business addition is a modern, six-unit, one story motel with accompanying office and residence, situated on the west side of Hwy. 45 immediately south of the Kewaskum hill. Desmond and Valeria Smith and their family will occupy the residence portion of the motel, having moved there from their home in the village.

The motel was built on property purchased by the Smiths which has 475 feet of frontage and runs 150 feet in depth. Construction work was started early in the spring. The living quarters are on the south end of the building. Next to these is an office and a utility room is located at the rear of the office. The structure has a basement under the office and utility room only.

The north part of the building houses the six motel units, each of which is 18 feet by 18 feet in size. The entire building measures 152 feet in length. The residence portion extends 42 feet farther back than the motel units which are 18 feet in depth.

Each unit contains a bath and shower and modern conveniences, including carpeted floors and TV and radio sets in each room. All beds are full size with three units containing two beds and the remaining three having a single bed.

The entire front of the up-to-date motel and residence is of red-wood construction, while the rear wall is built of concrete block. A decorative exposed cedar decking roof completes the building. There is ample land and the motel has been planned so that more units can be added in a continuous line at the north end of the building should the Smiths find it necessary to increase the number of motel units.

All of the work on the building, where possible, was done by local contractors. The general contractor was Bunkelman Builders, plumbing and heating by Marvin Johann, electrical work by Schmidt Electric, furnishings by Miller's, drapes by Campbell's of West Bend, ceramic tile and floor covering by Bunkelman Floor Covering, wood trimming by Herbert Justman, lumber and materials by Ebenreiter Lumber Co. of Sheboygan, and plans by Earl Galbraith.

Autos Collide in Three Mishaps During Week

In a mishap which occurred at 1:35 p. m. Friday at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave., a large tank trailer driven by Clayton H. Ten Pas, Plymouth, collided with a 1959 Packard sedan driven by Donald J. Stetz, 3932 N. 30th st., Milwaukee. The tractor and trailer was making a wide left turn onto Fond du Lac ave. when it sideswiped the Stetz car which pulled up to the left of the trailer, also to make a left turn. The right side of the car was damaged.

In a crash at 10:10 p. m. Sunday on Elm st. an auto driven by Thomas E. Kuster, 919 E. Lyon st., Milwaukee, backed into a car parked at the curb which was owned by Ronald A. Diels, R. 5, West Bend. Diels claims he had his vehicle parked at the curb in front of 121 Elm st. and when he came out to get into the vehicle he noticed that it had been struck. The party who backed into his auto was gone but was arrested 24 hours later. Kuster had backed out of a driveway and into the Diels car across the street. He was charged with failing to stop and report an accident and was fined \$50.00 and costs in court here Tuesday. The left door and side of Diels' machine were damaged.

An auto driven by George E. Baumann, 17, R. 1, Plymouth, collided with the rear of an auto operated by Thomas R. Kroos, 24, West Bend, at about 7:27 p. m. Sunday on Hwy. 144 about .2 of a mile south of Hwy. 28. The accident occurred when Andrew Berres, 49, R. 1, Kewaskum, slowed his vehicle to observe a car standing in his oats field on the left side of Hwy. 144 as Berres drove south. Kroos braked sharply and avoided the Berres vehicle, but Baumann was unable to stop in time and his vehicle collided with the Kroos auto. Both cars incurred about \$100 in damage.

It's annual Kewaskum firemen's picnic time again and this year's event will be held in the village park on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 7 and 8. The picnic and parade will be among the best ever held and everyone is urged to take in the affair.

A special, crowd pleasing attraction on Saturday evening will be music by the popular Mel's Clown Band, which will mingle among the people and provide much laughter and entertainment. All of the many refreshment, concession and amusement stands will be open early in the evening and continue to operate until a late hour.

As usual Sunday's festivities will start off with the monster parade promptly at 12:30 p. m. Kewaskum's parade is always one of the main attractions of the event and this year it is sure to be the best and most colorful in years. Letters have been sent out to all businessmen, urging them to enter floats, and many of them have indicated that they will have entries in the parade, which will include a large number of beautiful ones. Approximately \$135.00 in prize money will be given for the best floats and children's specialties in the parade, with a fat \$50.00 first prize going to the top float.

The parade will be highlighted by three bands and a drum and bugle corps, including the Elm City Rebels, Sheboygan Junior drum and bugle corps, Cedarburg Civic band, Germantown High school band and Kewaskum High school band. Other units, together with the numerous floats, which will march in the parade will be visiting firemen and Legion groups, drill teams, children's specialties such as decorated floats, bikes, trikes, buggies and wagons, clubs and organizations, comedy groups, and many others. Worthwhile cash prizes will be given for the best floats and children's entries, also free tickets good in the park to all children's entries.

Water fights will again be held at 6:30 p. m. Sunday with several teams from neighboring fire departments battling it out for cash money. The winners of the first two fights will face each other in a third match for the championship.

There will be rides for the children and concession, refreshments and amusement stands open continuously. A variety of fun games and entertainment has been arranged. Mr. Stodola praised the most excellent work that has been accomplished by the club members of the Kewaskum area. Junior leaders present were Mariel Seefeldt and Ann Schaefer. David Schaefer, who is president of the Junior Leaders 4-H Council of Washington county was also honored. Our local general leader, Mrs. Wilmer Bunkelman, who was at the meeting, said Kewaskum now has over 40 members.

Mariel has been a 4-H member of the Kewaskum club for six years, is president of the local club and treasurer of the Washington County Junior Leader 4-H Council. Ann Schaefer has been in 4-H seven years and this year attended State 4-H Club Week in Madison. David Schaefer is vice-president of the local 4-H club and has been a member for 10 years. He has been selected as one of five in Washington county to attend the citizenship short course to be held the last week in July at Washington, D. C.

125 Attend 27th Annual Red Cross Meeting at Wayne

Members of the Civil Air Patrol enacted the theme of the 27th annual Red Cross meeting of the West Bend chapter, "In Time of Disaster Be Prepared" at the Salem United Church of Christ, Wednesday evening, June 27, when they attended in a body following a simulated disaster. Approximately 125 persons attended the session at which the town of Wayne was the host precinct.

Frank Cook, who had been a victim of falling debris, had a head injury. An open head bandage was used. Terry Vore, in trying to rescue Frank broke his collar bone. His injury carried a broken collar bone bandage. In giving assistance, Tom Rutz fell and broke his left arm which he carried in one arm sling. In clearing away the debris, Tom Schuster injured his left hand. It was bandaged with the open hand bandage.

Other members of the Patrol attending were Lieut. Col. Estelle Hildgendorf, Capt. Edward Cook and Squadron Chaplain E. A. Jacobson.

In furthering the thoughts on disaster the meeting featured Kenneth O'Connor, Red Cross field representative and state relations officer, Madison, in a talk on "When Disaster Strikes." Other highlights included historical events of the town of Wayne by Mrs. Edwin Gerlach, outdoor exhibit by the Kohlsville Fire Department, musical entertainment, special citations, financial and service reports, group singing, and an invitation for the 1963 meeting from the town of Jackson, extended by Mrs. Norman Oelhafen, board member.

O'Connor, who has an outstanding record in disaster, was introduced by Harold Schaefer, chapter disaster chairman. Part of his discussion centered on Hurricane Carla in which he participated as a member of the National Staff. He impressed his audience that in a disaster of that immensity, the Red Cross is part of the total recovery effort and that every community and nearly every individual from the effected families themselves to the businesses and industries, unions, churches, schools, colleges, clubs and associations, institutions, newspapers, radio and television stations, banks, medical societies, police and fire forces, Civil Defense, are a part of that twentieth century life picture.

SPOONER HATCHERY

Muskies by the thousands; That's the story in the world's most extensive muskellunge hatchery, located at Spooner in the northwestern corner of the state.

Generally speaking the young "tigers" are already "out on their own" by the time most of the tourists visit the beautiful hatchery grounds with its extensive array of ponds created from back waters of the Yellow river. However, the show ponds are specially stocked, not only with prize muskies but with all other species of Wisconsin game fish.

The Spooner hatchery is readily accessible on U. S. Highways 53, 63 and State Highway 70. There are excellent picnicking sites available and visitors can stretch their legs strolling through the interesting and beautiful hatchery grounds, and then imbued with the fishing fever may try their luck in the Yellow river which flows past the picnic area.

Forest Ranger Station

The hatchery also raises thousands of walleyed pike, and personnel are ready and willing to explain the hatchery processes to interested visitors. Also adjacent to the hatchery are the Northwest Area Conservation Department headquarters, and the district ranger station. Let the kids climb the tower.

In addition to the conservation department facilities, there are some 300 lakes within a 25 mile radius of interest to the outdoor-

minded motorist. Float trips on the famous Namekagon river and the Yellow river as well provide an excellent opportunity to "get away from it all" in the back country—if you have time. Just driving along these lakes and rivers is considered a highlight by many people who visit the area.

One of the highlights during the summer season is the annual Heart of the North Championship Rodeo held at Spooner. Dates this year are Saturday and Sunday, July 7 and 8. The event annually attracts many of the nation's top cowboys, the champions and near champions.

Agricultural Experiment Station

Another place of interest is the agricultural experiment station, a mile east of the city on Highway 70. A branch of the University of Wisconsin College of Agriculture, the station has added considerably to the economy of the north by the development of hybrid seed corn suitable to the shorter growing season. Visitors are welcome and a vivid example of the results of scientific farming are to be found in the various experimental plots.

Unique in the area also is the Museum of Wood-Carving, located on Highways 53-63 south of the city, featuring thousands of carvings by Joe Barta. His life-size depictions of "The Last Supper" and other biblical scenes draw visitors from all corners of the globe. Like many other places up north, there are many things for visitors to see and do for the whole family.



Burial Services Here For Pat Muckerheide



CORRECTING SLICE

Adjust grip so that at least three knuckles of left hand are visible as you sight down shaft. Use a square or closed stance. Sweep club head back low, with right elbow close to body. Don't break your wrists until hands are at waist level. Maintain a firm grip with left hand.


