## Holy Trinity School To Open Sept. 5 With Enrollment of 244

DECREASE IN ENROLLMENT EXPECTED; SAME STAFF OF SISTERS BACK

Holy Trinity Catholic school will open next Wednesday, Sept. 5, with an expected enrollment of 244 pupils, a slight decrease over last year when 252 pupils registered on opening day. The school term will open with a high mass in the church at 8 a. m. On opening day there will be only a half day of school, with classes being dismissed at noon.

A staff of five Sisters of St. Agnes and one lay teacher will instruct the eight grades. The teaching staff will be the same as last school term, with all of the sisters and same lay teacher returning. They are Sr. M. Brian, Sr. M. Stella Marie, Sr. Charitas, Sr. Mary Ellen and Sr. Audrey and Mrs. Caroline Fellenz. Sr. M. Angelica, the domestic sister, is also the same.

Grades to be taught by the sisters and lay teacher are as follows: Grade 1—Sr. M. Brian; grades 2 & 3—Sr. Stella Marie; grades 3 and 4—Mrs. Fellenz; grades 4 and 5—Sr. Mary Ellen; grades 6 and 7—Sr. Charitas, grades 7 and 8—Sr. Audrey.

## Cyclist, 8, Struck By Auto Here Thursday

CUDNOHOSKE BOY ESCAPES WITH BRUISED LEG; DRIVER HELD

David Cudnohoske, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Cudnohoske, 218 North ave., Kewaskum, escaped with a bruised right leg when the bicycle he was riding was struck by an auto shortly after 1 p. m. on Thursday on Fond du Lac ave. about 60 feet south of the intersection with Main st.

According to witnesses the boy was walking his bicycle in front of the Ramthun Hardware store, strolled out between two parked cars, leaped onto his bike and drove out onto the highway into the path of the oncoming northbound auto. The driver of the car, Matt Zukas, 72, of 153 E. 115th st., Chicago, Ill., who was traveling at a slow rate of speed, immediately slammed on his brakes in an effort to avoid striking the youth. David, when he saw the vehicle was going to strike him, jumped off his bicycle and was only barely touched by the car. Only a fender of the bike was damaged. David was taken to a local physician's office.

The driver was not held as a result of the mishap but it was discovered by Chief of Police Roland Pledl that he was driving without a license, which had been revoked in the state of Illinois in 1961. Zukas was arrested and held on \$150 bond. He was fined \$100.00 and costs in court Friday morning.

Between 250 and 300 persons from the Kewaskum area attended a pre-dial community instruction program held at the Kewaskum Community High school gymnasium on Wednesday evening, conducted by personnel from the General Telephone Company of Wisconsin.

The program explained the operation of the new dial equipment through movies, slides, demonstrations and talks. A number of informative displays were also on exhibit. The program was cut short and not presented in its entirety because of the heat on a very warm evening. Robert Burger, district manager of Plymouth served as master of ceremonies for the program. Miss Armstrong, Plymouth, talked on dialing tips and Bill Chappell presented the slide program.

A question and answer period followed the program, which was concluded with the serving of doughnuts, coffee, chocolate milk and milk in the school cafeteria. Kewaskum is scheduled for conversion to dial on Sept. 19.

Preceding the public pre-dial program, officials of the telephone company, invited village and township officials, and the editor of the Statesman made a tour through the company's new building housing the dial equipment. They met at the building, located between Main and First sts., at 5:30 p. m. where Mr. Burger and other officials showed the group the building and pointed out the various dial equipment and its functions and purposes. ## WADE HOUSE

Have you ever seen an "ox-cage?" Or a spring wound fly chaser. Or a huge wooden mangle which can be weighted down with rocks for the ironing of sheets and blankets? Or glass blown windows, peacock spatterware, and large wall pictures made out of chicken feathers?

These are a few of the items on display in the old Wade House at Greenbush, about 30 miles west of Sheboygan. Wade House was a stage-coach inn that flourished more than 100 years ago as a popular stopping off place on the wooden plank road between Fond du Lac and Sheboygan.

Today the inn is completely restored and operated by the Wisconsin State Historical Society. Your family membership in the society, \$7.50 a year, permits free admission to this historic site plus free admission to other state historical sites such as Villa Louis at Prairie du Chien and the Circus World Museum at Baraboo. Otherwise there is an admission charge.

### Visit in September

Again, we might suggest visiting Wade House in September and October when there are less visi-

tors and you can take more time viewing the many historic items on display. For example, on the third floor of the inn are many items including a copy of the New York Herald Tribune of April 15, 1865, describing the assassination of President Lincoln.

Original hand-blown glass window panes over 100 years old, an old Franklin stove, several settings of peacock spatterware, a walking doll over 90 years old, a Civil War rosewood piano that still plays, and wall paper copied from the original in Scotland are some of the features of this restored inn.

One of the most popular places of the old inn was the tap room where travelers signed up for a night's lodging which included room and board plus feed for your animals, all for \$1 a night! The bargain was sealed with a "shot" of wiskey. And what a shot glass!

The spring-wound fly chaser had long spokes that circled like a merry-go-round to keep flies away from the table. The huge wooden mangle looked like a coffin, and when filled with rocks, could be rolled back and forth on rollers for the ironing of large flat pieces. The ox-cage—located in the barn with many other interesting items—was used to shoe oxen because ox-

en couldn't stand on three legs. Take your time when you visit the Wade House—and ask lots of questions.

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## 25 Years Ago

Aug. 27, 1937

An order for the removal of all slot machines in Washington county was issued Tuesday by Dist. Atty Milton L. Meister and placed in the hands of Sheriff Leo Burg following the hijacking of a privately owned machine from the Dugout tavern in West Bend. The sheriff and his deputies swung in to action immediately and before midnight every slot machine in the county had either been seized or hidden by the owners. Local officers removed the machines in the village and hauled them to the county jail, where warrants were issued and fines assessed.

Anthony, small son of Mr. and Mrs. George Strohmeier, town of Wayne, had a narrow escape from serious injury when he was struck by an auto in front of the Rex garage. While crossing the street with his father the lad ran ahead and was struck by the car, knocking him to the pavement. The front wheels were only inches from his head when the car halted. Gerhard Reinders, the driver, rushed the boy to a physician's office, where it was found he suffered only cuts and bruises.

Mr. and Mrs. Simon Stoffel, farm residents of the town of Kewaskum for many years, moved to Milwaukee to reside. They have three daughters and one son living in that city. Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Stoffel and family, who resided on West Water st. in the village, took over the farm which Nick, also a son, has been operating.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Brandstetter and daughter of West Bend moved to Kewaskum and are occupying the upper rooms of the former's mother, Mrs. C. Brandstetter. Mr. Brandstetter is a painter.

While returning from Beechwood at about 1 a. m. Saturday in his auto, Orville Kocher, Kewaskum, clipped off a high tension electric pole in front of the Traugott Stenschke home in the village when his steering apparatus became faulty on the rough road. As the pole contained a transformer the entire electric power and light was shut off with a flash. Ed. "Mush" Bauer, Campbellsport, a Fond du Lac county deputy sheriff, who was in the village while on duty watching for the persons who robbed a tavern in Dundee earlier, notified the electric company. It took two hours to restore service. Kocher's car was dented but he

was not injured.

### SPORTSMEN'S LICENSE EXPIRED AUGUST 31

Fishing slow, fishing pressure light. Heavy rains Friday evening raised and discolored local waters. Fishing should pick up this week end.

Game clubs in this area have released many of their hand raised pheasants. Some of the clubs released only the hens and will release the cocks just before the season, thus insuring their members a chance of some shooting. Many of these birds have a plastic white, green or red band on the leg to identify them from wild birds. However, the man who travels the back roads early in the morning and shoots birds from a car with a .22-rifle or pellet gun, cares not if the victim is cock or hen. Sportsman keep your eyes open. Report these violations.

Sunday evening about 8:30 p. m. a doe and her buck fawn were killed on US 141 at the Jay Road. No one was injured. The car, own-

ed by a Sheboygan resident, was towed to a garage.

Sportsmen's licenses expire Aug. 31 each year.

We know there are many of you who bought a sportsmen's license last year for the first time; therefore, we wish to call your attention—they expire Aug. 31.

Some of you have had a regular fishing license in the past which did not expire until Dec. 31, so it would be possible for you to fail to renew your license at this time and you might find yourself in an embarrassing position.

1962-63 sportsmen's licenses are now available at conservation department headquarters and county clerks and their deputies.

The price is still \$10.00. A sportsmen's license includes: resident small game, resident big game, resident fishing and resident trapping privileges—so it is a real bargain! The license is good from Sept. 1, 1962 through Aug. 31, 1963.

Be sure you renew your sportsmen's license before you go fishing after Aug. 31.

The driver education program is a fully accredited and highly recommended course consisting of 20 hours of classroom instruction and 8 hours of practice driving instruction in a dual control car. The classes meet from 7:30 - 9:30 on Wednesday evenings in room 266 for ten weeks and the behind-the-wheel driving schedule is arranged with the individual learner for one hour per week for eight weeks. Classroom instruction covers a variety of subjects including the following: securing the instruction permit personal fitness for driving, knowing your car, driving maneuvers, good practices in traffic, driving on expressways, skillful driving under adverse conditions, traffic laws, car purchase and insurance protection, and automobile economy.

The behind-the-wheel instruction is offered in a 1962 dual control, automatic shift car. The actual driving instruction includes starting and stopping on a hill, turning, backing, signalling, parallel and angle parking, driving in traffic, and driving on the open highway.

All persons interested in enrolling in the driver education program are asked to register before Sept. 14 in order to assure themselves of receiving the instruction at the time they wish.





## GOP Brat Fry Draws Large Crowd

In spite of many competing events, the annual GOP bratwurst "fry" and rally held at Regner City Park in West Bend Saturday evening scored well in a popularity "vote" with more than 350 citizens in attendance. Apparently the "special committee for good weather" consisting of Mike Kratzer, "fry" chairman, and the popular assemblyman, Elmer Schowalter, accomplished their jokingly assigned mission of producing first-rate conditions for the event.

Enjoying the festive atmosphere was Jack Olson of Wisconsin Dells, candidate for lt. governor. Arriving by plane from speaking assignments in northern Wisconsin, Olson was accompanied on a downtown hand shaking tour and a visit to the radio station WBKV by Mrs. Robert Claus, GOP county vice-chairman. As keynote speaker at the "fry" Olson emphasized that a low general sales tax would bring in much money from the large tourist group. "Raise the money necessary and we can do it without hurting any one group or the business which is keeping the people employed" the speaker said. Olson detailed plans to consult with labor groups in regard to a favorable tax situation. In closing he pointed out that Wisconsin needed the help of all its people in solving fiscal problems.

An unexpected surprise was the arrival of Rep. William K. Van Pelt Sixth District congressman who took time from his busy schedule to greet old friends at the rally. He brought greetings from Senator Alexander Wiley who regretted that he could not attend the gathering because of urgent Senate debates. Mr. Van Pelt added that he joined with the senior senator in assuring the "home-folks" that the first duty of an elected official is to "represent." Congressman Van Pelt went on to warn against spending programs which would be administered at the sole discretion of the President. One such proposal in regard to "food stamps" would involve 900 million dollars of the taxpayer's money. In regard to the defeat of the "Medicare" bill Mr. Van Pelt pointed out the vote against the bill of 12 committee heads (Democrats) who declared it to be unsound. The applause for Senator Wiley's message and the

Van Pelt speech was enthusiastic. Following Mr. Van Pelt was Jim Smyth of Sheboygan, also a candidate for congressman. He praised Washington county Republicans for giving all candidates a chance to speak and affording the voters a "choice in the primary." In the speaker's own words, "the applause was something less than deafening."

Republican candidate for state's attorney general Bob Marotz, described this year's campaign as "delightful." The speaker noted the increase of interest in government, statewide, "the people are thinking about the issues, particularly responsibility." He declared that the attorney general office should never be used for politically partisan purposes.

On hand to greet old friends were Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter and State Senator Frank Panzer. Many very young Republicans were present to enjoy all the "bratwurst you can eat" with relish and enthusiasm. Also on hand was John Kurtz, oldest GOP party member who had celebrated his 90th birthday the day before. Gay accordion music was provided by Miss Arlene Merzdorf of Waubesa. Outstanding symbol of the county organization's dedication was chairman Dick Larson who managed to "dish out" food and introduce speakers at what seemed to be the same time.
