Holy Trinity Catholic Church to Celebrate Centennial on Sept. 30

Archbishop Wm. E. Cousins to Preside And Preach Sermon

DINNER AND RECEPTION TO FOLLOW MASS; CENTENNIAL BOOKLETS AVAILABLE

Holy Trinity Catholic parish in Kewaskum will celebrate the 100th anniversary of its founding at a solemn mass on Sunday, Sept. 30, at 11 a. m. Archbishop William E. Cousins will preside in cappa magna and preach the sermon.

Priest-sons of the parish will be the major officers of the mass. They are: Fr. Roman Stoffel, pastor of St. Cloud parish, St. Cloud, celebrant; Fr. William J. Mayer, U. S. Army chaplain, deacon, and Fr. Aloysius J. Fellenz, pastor of St. John the Evangelist, Spring Green, subdeacon. Fr. John T. Budde, pastor of Holy Trinity, will be master of ceremonies.

Chaplains to the archbishop will be Fr. Oswald Ullrich, pastor of Immaculate Conception, West Bend, and Fr. Matthew J. Urban, pastor of St. Michael's, St. Michaels.

Seminarians from the parish will serve as acolytes and thurifer. They are: Jerome Campbell, St. Lawrence seminary, Mt. Calvary; Alan Weinert, St. Joseph's college, Edgerton, and William Key, De Sales Preparatory seminary.

Following the mass a dinner for parishioners and guests, including priest-sons and sister-daughters of the parish and visiting priests will take place at Kewaskum Community High school. A reception for guests will be held after the dinner in the parish hall where refreshments will be served. All who have not yet purchased dinner tickets are asked to do so by this Sunday, Sept. 23.

On the Sunday of the centennial there will be an extra mass read to allow everyone sufficient time to clear for the 11 a. m. solemn high mass. The other masses will be at 6:00, 7:30 and 9:00 a. m.

Attractive 20-page centennial booklets have been printed which, in addition to the dedication, forward and introduction, contain information on the parish officers, consultants, school teachers and officers of the societies, a history of the parish, priest-sons of the parish, seminarians, sister-daughters of the parish, junior novices, names of centennial club (\$100) members and patron list of centennial contributors, and other information, together with photos of the pope, archbishop, pastor, former pastors, parish buildings, officers, laying of the cornerstone in 1905, church sanctuary, priest-sons of the parish and sister-daughters of the parish.

Founded in 1862

Holy Trinity parish considers 1862 as the founding date of the congregation. A reliable history of Washington county states that the first Catholic church was built in 1862 at Kewaskum. The German

publication of the History of the Catholic Church in Wisconsin gives the date as 1861. The first baptismal register of Holy Trinity parish records its first baptism in 1865. But it has a note on that from 1863 to 1865 the baptisms are recorded at Immaculate Conception, Barton, and prior to 1863 at St. Bridget's church, town of Wayne.

Prior to the year of 1861 there was no Catholic Church in Kewaskum, the faithful traveled to neighboring parishes to attend mass and other religious services. The first land was donated to Bishop Henni for the use of Holy Trinity Society by Andreas Miller. In 1861 Mathias Altenhofen donated two lots on Main St. in the village. A church was erected big enough to suit their needs. The parish had no permanent pastor but it was a mission of Immaculate Conception parish in Barton from 1861 to 1868. Services were held by resident pastors of that parish. The new church was dedicated to the Holy Trinity by Bishop Henni in 1863. Kewaskum became an independent parish in 1861, with Rev. John Mueller, the first resident pastor. At the same time St. Michael's parish was assigned to Kewaskum as its mission.

Records indicate that the first marriage took place in April of 1865 (Francis Boehm to Katherine Beringer). The first baptism (of George Cupfer, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Cupfer) also took place in that year. The first burial in the parish cemetery on June 6, 1866 was that of Therese Altenhofen, wife of the man who donated the land for the first church.

Rev. Mueller was transferred from the parish in 1869 and was succeeded by Fr. M. Ruckengruber, who stayed only eight months. The next several pastors follow in rapid succession (1869-1871). Fr. Henry Boers stayed only 3 months and was followed by Rev. Schmitz. He, however, remained only 2 months and was succeeded by Nicolas

Mrs. Eldon Meinecke Critically Hurt in Fall Out of Window

Mrs. Eldon (Mae) Meinecke, 46, of 1267 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum, was critically injured Saturday evening when she tripped on the top of a stairway leading to her second story apartment and fell through a window just above floor level 15 feet to the concrete below. She crashed through the window pane at about 7 p. m.

According to police, Mrs. Meinecke was apparently walking up the flight of stairs to her apartment above Bunkelman's Floor Covering at the intersection of Fond du Lac ave. and Main st. when she stumbled on a top stair. She plunged through the 2½ ft. by 2½ ft. window which is set one foot off the floor at the top of the stairway. She fell between two buildings, the one in which her apartment is located and Yoost's Meat Market. There is only two feet of space between the buildings.

A passer-by heard the crash of the glass breaking and her fall. He found Mrs. Meinecke lying on the narrow concrete walk between the buildings and summoned the Kewaskum ambulance. The injured woman was taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where her condition was reported as critical earlier in the week.

Mrs. Meinecke suffered severe head and body injuries.

Kiwanis to Sponsor Annual Live Turkey Shoot This Sunday

CIVIL WAR PERFORMANCES, TROUT FISHING CONTEST AMONG ATTRACTIONS

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its tenth annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 23, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 6 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: Large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another popular attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches. Additional prizes are offered for those catching the largest fish.

Other events include trap and deer target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. An authentic cross-bow direct from Switzerland will be used in a target event. Here's an opportunity for Robin-hood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

A group of men who have made a study of the Civil War will perform throughout the day. Their authentic uniforms and firearms as well as the mock battles and skirmishes will stir the patriot's heart.

This year Kewaskum Kiwanians will support New Eyes for the Needy, Inc. Through the collection and distribution of old or discarded eye glasses, this non-profit volunteer charity has helped nearly 250,000 people in this country and abroad to better sight. If you have a pair of glasses that are not being used, bring them to the ticket office at the Turkey Shoot. They could help a needy person enjoy a fuller life.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club with all profits going to their youth and community benefit funds.

Stehle, who left after five months. Fr. N. Moes then followed and also stayed for 5 months. Rev. B. Edelmann became pastor in 1871 and remained until 1877 when he returned to his homeland, Switzerland. Following him as pastor was Rev. J. Grome who remained for seventeen years. It was during his term that St. Bridget's congregation was added as a mission to Kewaskum and remains so to the present day. During his pastorate the parish began a period of progress and wide expansion of its facilities. The old church was enlarged to accommodate the growing membership at a cost of \$1,000. In order that their children may be educated a new school was built around 1880 at a cost of \$3,000. Two sisters of St. Agnes Convent in Fond du Lac came to staff the school and faithfully continued to carry on that work right down to the present day. Around 1885 the congregation replaced the old rectory with the present building at a cost of about \$3,000. In the summer of 1895, Fr. Grome was transferred to St. Joseph's Parish, Milwaukee, and was replaced by Fr. Philip Vogt. He stayed at the parish forty-six years, serving up to his sudden death on Sept. 17, 1941. During these years the parish made great progress both materially and spiritually. The congregation steadily grew in numbers. In 1905 the church was rebuilt and refurnished. Mr. Philip Vogt, the father of the pastor, donated five lots. The cost of the rebuilding was \$23,000, when the building was completed the parish had no debt. The cornerstone was laid on June 18, 1905. The bells in the tower were blessed on November 30, 1905. On March 27, 1906 was the Solemn Consecration of the Church. His Grace, Most Rev. S. G. Messmer, D. D., designated the Fourth Sunday in Lent to be observed annually by the Holy Trinity Congregation as the Anniversary of the Consecration of the Church.

In 1925 the old convent was enlarged and modernized at a cost of \$6,000. Four years later depression struck and there was a standstill as far as material progress. It became so bad that it was sometimes difficult to meet expenses and the properties began to deteriorate.

When the depression lifted there was much to be done. The congregation responded quickly and the necessary repairs were made. Plans were made to provide for a parish hall and the church basement seemed well suited for this purpose, but it needed to be completely refitted. This was done in 1946 and a modern kitchen was incorporated in the plans. This all was accomplished at a cost of \$18,000.

Replacing Father Vogt in 1941 was Rev. F. C. LaBuwi. By this time the school enrollment had again outgrown the facilities. The St. Bridget's mission school was no longer in operation after 1951 so the school children had to come to Kewaskum to finish their elementary education. This accounts for part of the increased enrollment. The ground breaking ceremonies took place on May 21, 1950. In the late summer of the following year the new building was completed and dedicated by Bishop Atkielski, just in time for use in September. A bigger school meant a larger faculty and the convent had to be enlarged again. The total cost amounted to about \$100,000.

In commemoration of his 25th anniversary of priesthood, Rev. F. C. LaBuwi celebrated a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving on April 22, 1956. The Mass was followed by a Jubilee dinner attended by members of the congregation. Father received donations from each society and gave a heart-warming speech.

Shortly after the church was remodeled Fr. LaBuwi received orders from the Bishop that he was to be transferred to St. Mary's Church, Racine. The transfer went into effect in June of 1958. Fr. LaBuwi was replaced by our present pastor, Rev. J. T. Budde. Since January 1, 1958 the parish has re-

tired its bonded debt of \$35,000 and by January 1, 1962 has also set aside over \$29,000 in a building fund to meet the needs of a growing parish.

The growth of the community corresponded with the growth of the parish. At the beginning of the parish there were only a few families and it grew along with the community. From 1940 to 1950 the community increased by about 34%. The congregation also experienced a similar growth. In 1950 the count stood at 193 families. Today it numbers about one thousand people.

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

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Crown First Golf Champs at Hon-E-Kor Club



The first year's club and class champions of the Hon-E-Kor Country club at Kewaskum were crowned Saturday with the men's tournament finals which were completed on that afternoon.

Elimination championship play in the tournament had been going on the past several weeks with 96 golfers originally participating in the meet, 16 in each class. The club championship match was 36 holes while the other classes were 18 hole matches.

BOW AND ARROW SEASON FOR DEER OPENS SEPT. 22

The bow and arrow season for deer will open in all counties of the state at 6:14 a. m. Saturday, Sept. 22. Washington county as usual will have an ever increasing number of hunters, some local, but the majority from Milwaukee county. The hunters seem to concentrate at the Theresa public hunting grounds, the Wayne swamp, as well as the Town of Jackson and the Rockfield swamp area.

It is not necessary that the bow and arrow hunter wear red clothing, however, he or she must wear a back tag and have in possession at all times while hunting, a current deer tag. Bows must be unstrung or enclosed within a carry-

ing case when transported in a vehicle. Hunting at night is prohibited. Deer must be registered within twenty-four hours in the county of kill or any adjoining county. Any deer showing evidence of gunshot wounds will be subject to confiscation.





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
