

Nearly 10,000 Persons Attend Turkey Shoot; 435 Turkeys Are Won

SHOOT IS MOST SUCCESSFUL IN TEN YEAR HISTORY OF KIWANIS EVENT

The tenth annual Turkey Shoot, a community project sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch last Sunday was the outstanding success in the ten year history of this popular event.

Thousands of people—estimated between 8,000 and 10,000—visited the grounds during the day. Nearly 4,000 participated in the Turkey Shoot event alone. A total of 435 turkeys, both live and frozen, were won by those who participated. In addition to the popular Turkey Shoot firing line, the activity was brisk at all other events including the crossbow, trap shooting, deer target, the sausage shoot, pistol range, and the trout pond. The food stands served bratwurst, hot dogs and hot beef sandwiches to over 3,500 people. Countless thousands of cups of chili, coffee and bottles of soda water were sold.

The Kiwanis Club sincerely thanks all who joined them for helping to make the Turkey Shoot an outstanding success.

The profits from this and previous Turkey Shoots are used for the club's work with the young people of the community which includes the Little League and Babe Ruth baseball programs, Camp Wawbeek, Boys State and Girls State activities, swimming beach and playground equipment at the village park, playground equipment at the grade school, tennis courts at the high school and many other projects too numerous to list.

Without the help of many, many people who are not Kiwanians it would be impossible for the Kiwanis Club to sponsor a program of this size. The club wishes to publicly acknowledge and thank the dozens of people whose assistance, both before and during the day of the shoot, made the success possible.

GOP Plans 'Rally Day' Meetings in County

SECOND OF FIVE TOURS IN OCTOBER TO BE HELD IN KEWASKUM OCT. 9

At a special executive committee meeting of the Washington County Republican Party held last Monday evening the committee planned a series of five Republican Day Rally meetings throughout the county. Richard Larson, county GOP chairman, announced that the meetings would be patterned after the "old style" Town Hall Meetings with a 15-20 minute major policy speech by a state or congressional candidate and then a question-answer period where Washington county citizens can question, discuss and criticize county, state and national policies and programs.

The first meeting will be in Hartford at the Eagles hall on Oct. 2 at 8:00 p. m. Every Tuesday thereafter a meeting will be held in turn at Kewaskum on Oct. 9, Newburg Oct. 16, Jackson Oct. 23, and Germantown Oct. 30.

County officials and other GOP supporters will travel throughout the county in a GOP caravan the afternoon of the meetings and visit as many centers and areas as possible. The day will wind up with the Rally Meetings outlined above and the meetings will be followed by refreshments where folks can meet their county candidates personally.

Larson urged voters interested in the issues of the 1962 campaign to plan to attend the meeting nearest their home. "It is an opportunity to make your voice and opinions heard," he said.

Congressman William K. Van Felt has promised to attend several of the meetings and Philip G. Kuehn, GOP candidate for governor will attend one of the sessions. The entire program is being supervised by the precinct committeemen in the respective communities: John Disher, George Smith, Raymond Klink, Edward Bethke and Elgardt H. Maahs in Hartford; William Kuhn and Tom Weigle in

Germantown; Alfred Seefeldt and Paul Albrecht in Kewaskum; Joseph Klinka, Ira Oelhafen, and Norbert Dettman in Newburg, and O. P. Butzke in Jackson.

NO DEER KILLED OR REGISTERED IN COUNTY

The opening of the 1962 bow and arrow season for deer in Washington county found about one-half as many hunters in the woods as a year ago. The favorite spot was the Theresa Public Hunting Grounds, where about thirty hunters pursued the sport. The woods and marshes were very wet from the rain on Friday evening, and those without the proper gear were soon back to their cars to dry out. By 9:00 a. m. most of them were through hunting. As of this writing there were no deer killed or registered in Washington county.

Reports are coming in of raccoon that act in a peculiar manner in the Jackson and Rockfield area. Most of them are animals of the year. They do not seem to be vicious, but yawn and act as if they are very sleepy. They do not seem to be afraid of humans. I would suggest that people refrain from handling them until we can find out more about this possible sickness.

The set line season closes on Sept. 30. Therefore, it is necessary that all set lines be removed from the water not later than one-half hour after sundown on that day.

RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE BOARD ACCEPTING PETITION FOR ANNEXATION

WHEREAS, a petition for direct annexation of the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, was filed with the Village Clerk on

August 6, 1962.

The North 200 feet of the East 165 feet of the West 363 feet of the SE ¼ of the SW ¼ of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East.

TOGETHER WITH an Easement for right-of-way purposes over and along the S. 40 feet of the N. 240 feet of the W. 363 feet of the SE¼ of the SW¼ of said Section 9; and the use of the right-of-way described in Right-of-Way Easement recorded in Vol. 352 of Records on page 179, Washington County Records, as Doc. No. 257579. It being understood, however, that the right-of-way easements herein granted are not exclusive, but are to be used in common with any other persons or corporations that now have or might hereafter acquire ownership of any of the real estate in the aforementioned ¼-¼ section. Named Semifinalist in Merit Scholarship Test

Principal Clifford Mr. Rose of Kewaskum Community High school announced Thursday, Sept. 27, that one of the school's students had been named a semifinalist in the 1962-63 Merit Scholarship competition.

He said he became a semifinalist through his outstanding performance on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, the first step in the eighth annual Merit program. The student cited for his high achievement is Russell Kumrow, son of Mrs. Anna Kumrow, R. 1, Kewaskum.

He is among approximately 11,000 seniors throughout the country who attained semifinalist status. Each semifinalist now moves a step closer to winning a four-year Merit Scholarship to the college of his choice.

The qualifying examination, a test of educational development, was given in more than 16,000 high schools last March. The semifinalist group is composed of the highest scoring students in each state and in United States territories.

The semifinalists will take another rigorous examination, the three-hour scholastic aptitude test of the College Entrance Examination Board, to be given in testing centers throughout the country on Dec. 1, 1962.

Students whose scores on the second test substantiate their per-

formance on the qualifying test and who are endorsed by their high schools will become finalists in the competition. All finalists receive a Certificate of Merit in recognition of their outstanding performance in the program.

As Finalists, the students will be eligible for scholarship awards sponsored by NMSC and about 150 business corporations, foundations, unions, professional associations, and individuals.





Quarterback Gordon Rock paced the drives in his team's win over the Indians. Rock passed to Terry Willis for 17 yards in the first quarter, sneaked over for the Orioles' third touchdown in the fourth quarter, and scored two extra points. Home base of the Peachey band is Burnett and Don and the group have been a featured attraction at most of the leading ballrooms in the midwest.



SHEEPSHEAD TOURNAMENTS TO BE HELD EVERY TUESDAY


