## 2nd Victim of Sept. 29 Crash, Mrs. Lehman Rosenheimer Dies

### Local Woman, 40, Succumbs of Injuries on Wed.

A two car collision which occurred on Saturday, Sept. 29, at the intersection of County Trunk Hwy. B and a town road approximately two miles southwest of Kewaskum claimed its second victim on Wednesday morning of this week when Mrs. Lehman L. Rosenheimer, 40, of 1233 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, passed away at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, of injuries suffered in the crash.

The first victim of the mishap to lose his life was William Luecke, 63, of West Bend, driver of the auto which collided with one driven by Lehman L. Rosenheimer, 48, Kewaskum, husband of the latest victim. Luecke died early Monday, Oct. 1, of injuries sustained two days before in the crash. A passenger in Luecke's car, William Lutz, 22, West Bend, was also injured in the mishap.

Lehman Rosenheimer is still confined at St. Joseph's hospital with injuries suffered in the collision. He was also critically injured and is expected to be hospitalized for some time.

Mrs. Rosenheimer, who died at approximately 8:20 a. m. Wednesday, Oct. 10, suffered internal injuries, a fractured right leg, severe lacerations of the right knee, a fractured wrist, facial lacerations of the left forehead and multiple contusions over her entire body. The Rosenheimers have four small children, two boys and two girls.

Mr. and Mrs. Rosenheimer are widely known in Kewaskum, Washington county and surrounding areas. Lehman, together with Henry Rosenheimer, operates the L. Rosenheimer Department store, implement business and mill in Kewaskum. The Lehman Rosenheimers also maintain a summer residence at Big Cedar lake.

Mrs. Rosenheimer, nee Charline L. Juergens, was born at Milwaukee on Sept. 27, 1922. She attended Lawrence college, Appleton, and Milwaukee Downer college. Her marriage to Mr. Rosenheimer took place on Sept. 23, 1950 at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Milwaukee. They had resided in Kewaskum since that time.

Surviving, along with her husband, are four children, Julie, 11, Heide, 9, Robert, 6, and Lay, 2; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Henry Juergens, 1625 N. 51st st., Milwaukee; two brothers, Carl of Milwaukee, and Richard of Delmar, Calif.; and other relatives and a host of friends.

Mrs. Rosenheimer was a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Delta Gamma sorority and the American Association of University Women.

Private funeral services were conducted at Miller's Funeral Home at 2 p. m. Friday, Oct. 12, with the Rev. C. F. Hammen officiating. Burial was made in the

## GOP Rally Day Meeting Here Is Well Attended

REP. VAN PELT IS SPEAKER, TOURS VILLAGE WITH COUNTY CANDIDATES

The second in a series of county-wide GOP Rally Day meetings was held at 8 p. m. Tuesday at Dei's Opera House in Kewaskum and was well attended.

Tuesday night's session here climaxed a day of campaigning by county candidates, accompanied by Rep. William K. Van Pelt and State Senator Frank Panzer, in this village and other parts of the county. Van Pelt was also the main speaker for the evening rally at the Opera House.

Following the congressman's talk an open discussion was held on current issues with Van Pelt, Panzer and county officials participating.

Republican Congressman Van Pelt, seeking his seventh term in Congress, told a Washington county audience in Kewaskum Tuesday night that the Democrat controlled 87th Congress dangerously undermined the basic safeguards of the Constitution.

"It was not exactly the 'do nothing' Congress that some have called the session", he said. "It did many things to advance the 'welfare state' in America and gave substantial aid to the Kennedy administration's efforts to take over the direction of the lives of our citizens," he asserted.

Van Pelt said the "ultra liberals" in Congress passed numerous bills "giving unprecedented power" to President Kennedy citing the Trade Expansion bill as one example. This bill gives the President power to eliminate protective tariffs which the Congressman predicted will flood the American markets with the products of low-wage nations in competition with long established American businesses.

Congressman Van Pelt called on Wisconsin conservatives to elect Republicans to office "as the only means of curbing the administration's wasteful expenditure of billions of dollars on dangerous social welfare experiments."

Other Rally Day gatherings are scheduled for Oct. 16 at Newburg, Oct. 23 at Jackson, and Oct. 30 at Germantown.

Raymond B. Casper, 57, of 127 Main st., a prominent Kewaskum merchant, passed away on Sunday, Oct. 7, at Deaconess hospital, Milwaukee, following an illness of five days. He had suffered a stroke on Oct. 2 and was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. Later he was transferred to Deaconess hospital, where he underwent surgery.

Mr. Casper, with his wife Stachia, owned the Fair Variety Store business and Stachia's Apparel in Kewaskum. They operated the Fair Variety Store for almost ten years and later opened Stachia's Apparel, ladies' clothing store, which business they have also conducted the past several years. Since entering into business here, they have continuously improved and enlarged their stores and stock and have greatly added to the village's shopping facilities.

Born March 19, 1905, in the town of West Bend, he was a son of Mrs. Bertha Casper and the late S. N. Casper. He spent most of his life in Kewaskum but for several years lived in Milwaukee, California and Sheboygan.

Mr. Casper and the former Stachia Van Horn were married Sept. 20, 1947. ## STRUEBING IN TASK FORCE TO RECOVER ASTRONAUT SCHIRRA

PROJECT MERCURY (FHTNC)—Ralph F. Struebing, fireman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilmer C. Struebing of R. 2, Kewaskum, is serving aboard the destroyer USS Bordelon, a unit of the recovery force which the navy and marine corps assigned to the Atlantic Ocean area for the third manned orbital flight into space.

The organization of ships and air units, Task Force 140, was on station in the Atlantic to locate and recover Astronaut Walter M. Schirra, should his flight have been terminated there.

A similar organization, Task Force 130, was on station in the Pacific Ocean, where the landing took place.

The force in the Atlantic is commanded by Rear Admiral Harold Bowen, Jr., commander Cruiser-Destroyer Flotilla Four. He was at the Cape Canaveral control center to direct the force, which included 19 ships, over 50 aircraft and a group of specialists in the launch area.

The around-the-world vigil, maintained by the Pacific and Atlantic recovery forces, marked the first time that Pacific Fleet forces have been specifically assigned to Project Mercury recovery operations. However, in past spaceshots, all military units which possibly might be used have been on standby during the shot. The landings of the two previous manned orbital

flights were terminated in the Atlantic.

Shore-based communications units, linked in a world-spanning network, and air stations figured in the recovery operations.

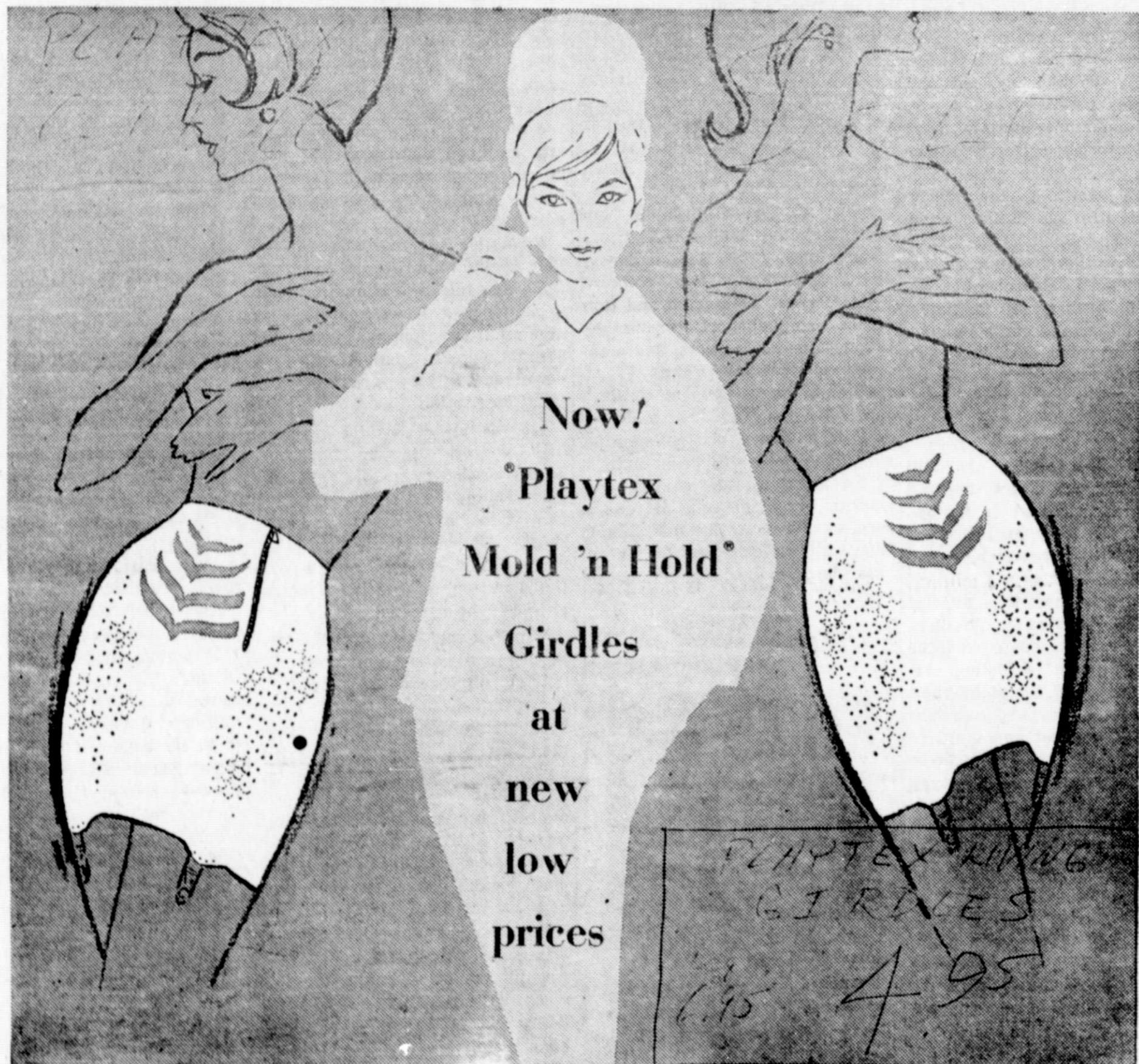

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# L. Rosenheimer

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The proper operation of a mechanical corn picker increases the farmer's yield per acre. And proper operation is safe operation, say members of the Kewaskum chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

The organization is participating in a nationwide program to reduce accidents due to carelessness during the corn harvest. The Safe Corn Harvest program is sponsored by the Farm Equipment Institute and the National Safety Council.

"A safe corn picker operator has only about one chance in a million of being hurt on a picker in the next five years, while the average operator stands one in 25," according to the University of Illinois College of Agriculture "A careless operator has a 50-50 chance of being seriously injured in the next five years."

The U. of I. study showed "the average corn picker loses about 10 percent of the yield. But one operator in five loses only half this much, while another almost doubles the average loss."

As part of the program, members of the chapter will try to visit every farm family in the community. They will review the safety precautions required for the safe operation of corn pickers and other harvest equipment. A packet of safety materials will be left with each family.

"The corn picker is the most dangerous farm machine to operate, and on most farms it is leaving too much corn in the field. But the danger is to the careless operator. Proper and safe operation puts money in the family's bank account."

Safety experts have shown that traffic fatalities and injuries could be reduced substantially if car occupants wore seat belts.

One insurance firm pays double benefits if the accident victim had a belt on. The added compensation can be applied in case the driver or passenger is either killed or injured, just as long as the seat belt was fastened.

A person in an accident is 60 per cent less likely to have an injury of any sort if he is wearing a seat belt, and chances of being killed are reduced considerably.

**GOOSE, DUCK HUNTING SEASON OPENS SATURDAY**

The season on wild geese, ducks and Wilson snipe will open in Washington county at noon, Oct. 13. The woodcock season opened Oct. 1. Shooting hours on the 13th are from noon to 5:18 p. m. A sportsmen's or a small game license and a duck stamp must be in your possession while hunting waterfowl.

A copy of the 1962 migratory bird and waterfowl regulations can be picked up at the office of the county clerk or any depot where hunting licenses are sold. Pick one up and read it before you hunt, it tells you the length of the seasons, bag and possession limits, shooting hours, etc.

A letter from Daniel O. Trainer, assistant professor, Department of Veterinary Science, University of Wisconsin, regarding the sick raccoon sent to him for examination is self-explanatory. One paragraph reads as follows:

The young female died of canine distemper. This disease which is the same as dogs experience, has been observed in raccoons in Wisconsin this year in Dane, Jefferson, Dodge and Racine counties. Evidently Washington county can now be added to the list. I would suspect that the other raccoon losses in the area were also due to distemper. Distemper in raccoons often affects the central nervous system resulting in strange behavior and sometimes convulsions and paralysis. The disease is usually highly fatal in this species.
