## Opera House Tavern And Dance Hall, Dei's Delicatessen Sold

WALTER AND MARIE DEI SELL  
TO GALABINSKES AFTER  
15 YEARS IN BUSINESS

In a major real estate transaction completed recently, Walter and Marie Dei sold their Kewaskum Opera House tavern and hall and adjoining delicatessen and living quarters to another Kewaskum couple, Lawrence and Adeline Galabinske. Included in the deal was the purchase by Mr. and Mrs. Dei of the Galabinske residence at 221 North ave.

The new proprietors moved into the opera house this week to take over the business on Friday, March 1. Walter and Marie Dei had conducted the business for the past 15 years and four months. The Deis moved into one of the homes they own on Kettle Moraine Drive east of the village, where Walter will continue in the building business in which he was also active.

Mr. and Mrs. Galabinske will operate their newly acquired establishment under the name of Babe's Tavern and Delicatessen. "Babe" is a nickname by which Mr. Galabinske is well known. Before purchasing the Dei property, he was formerly in the trenching business in Kewaskum and area but at present was employed in Chicago.

The Galabinskes announce that at a later date they will begin serving chicken, fish and other lunches. They will also cater to weddings, parties and other affairs in their hall. The delicatessen has become a new member of Associated Grocers, Inc., handling Shurfine products, and this will enable them to add considerably to their stock of groceries and foods.

## Judicial Primary Election Tuesday

Voters of Kewaskum, Washington county and the state of Wisconsin will cast their ballots next Tuesday, March 5, for a candidate for the state supreme court to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Justice Timothy Brown. The "run-off" of the non-partisan judicial election will be held at the regular spring election on April 2.

Voting in the village will take place in the municipal building (fire house) and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. Voting hours for the town of Kewaskum will be from 9 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. and balloting will be done at the Labor Center in Kewaskum as usual.

Voters will have a slate of five candidates from which to select for nomination of their supreme court candidate, as follows: Bruce F. Beilfuss, Davis A. Donnelly,

William H. Evans, Harry E. Larsen, Christ Alexopoulos.

A very light vote is anticipated Tuesday as judicial elections seldom draw a great turnout of voters. No other contests loom on the county ballots to add interest to the primary election in this area.

Of the five candidates whose names appear on the judicial primary election ballot, the two candidates receiving, respectively, the highest and the next to the highest number of votes cast, will be nominated as candidates for the spring election for justice of the state supreme court.

The winning candidate April 2 will be elected to succeed Timothy Brown, whose term will expire on the first Monday of January, 1964, to serve for a 10 year term.



## Court Rules Forest Lake Dredging Law Invalid

Wisconsin's law forcing towns to improve lakes on petition of lakeshore property owners is unconstitutional, Circuit Judge Russell E. Hanson ruled recently at Fond du Lac.

Judge Hanson made the ruling in setting aside a court order asked by owners of property surrounding Forest lake to force the town of Auburn (Fond du Lac county) to dredge the lake.

The property owners said they had petitioned the town board before Sept. 6, 1959, to dredge the lake and remove weeds, silt, stumps, bogs, rice grass and other objectional matter.

They said the board failed to take action "without cause, excuse, or justification."

State law requires town boards to improve lakes on petition of a majority of the riparian landowners and to charge back the cost to the owners.

Judge Hanson reasoned that dredging the lake would affect the propagation of fish and their welfare without the consent of the state.

He said this would, in turn, affect the functions of state agencies such as the public service commission and the conservation department and the law was, therefore, unconstitutional.

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

### REMOVE SHANTIES BY MAR. 5

In the spring of 1961 a sample of the reddish growth from Big Cedar lake was identified at the Madison laboratory of the committee on water pollution as *Oscillatoria rubescens*. This is one of the blue-green algae which is actually red or purple in color. This species forms blooms during the late winter. Cold weather and clear ice will foster its development. It is an algae, not a fungus, and it will last only a short time after the ice leaves. When the sun shines on the ice and algae as the lake is breaking up, it reminds one of many rainbows in the sky.

Landowners in this vicinity who might wish to do some reforestation may purchase white ash and hard maple seedlings at \$20.00 per thousand and black walnut seeds at \$5.00 per thousand. They

may not be used for ornamental or landscaping purposes. If interested contact your district forester, 320 5th ave., West Bend. Telephone FE 4-7461.

All fish shanties must be removed from local lakes on or before March 5, 1963.

This is the time of the year when outdoor activities especially hunting and fishing are at an all time low. The ice fishing season, at least for most of you, is over. The sturgeon spearing season closes Friday, March 1. Spring is just around the corner, although it may not look or feel like it, and many of you will be putting your boats in shape for spring use.

If you are a regular reader of this column, you may recall that several times we called your attention to several deficiencies we, as well as the Coast Guard, had noted relative to the numbers placed on boats. Because many of you will be working on your boats in the near future, we wish to call this again to your attention.

The law requires that numbers be "in block characters of good proportions, not less than three

inches in height," and of a color which will contrast with the color of the background so as to be clearly visible and legible.

We wish to emphasize that numbers should be "as plain as the large letters and numerals used on auto license tags." Small white numbers with black borders, script, and ssmi-block designs of poor proportions are not acceptable. This is the biggest deficiency we have noticed. Many white or other light colored boats have light colored numbers with just black borders. They do look nice and are decorative, but they do not meet the requirements of the law.

Numbers should be located on each side of the forward half of the hull as near to the stem as practical and where they can best be seen.

The law also requires a space or hyphen between each part of the number. For example, WS-1234-AA or WS 1234 AA.

Late last year we also called these matters to your attention as it was obvious the numbers on many boats did not meet speci-

cations. Some of you will be working on your boats now and certainly all of you will before the boating season starts. So keep this in mind and arrange to have proper numbers, properly placed on your boat, before you use it.

## PRUNE CHEESE CAKE



Here is a layered cheese cake frankly rich and sumptuous. Below, it's all winy fruitiness set on a crunchy crust; above, velvety cheese creaminess with more of the crust as a top-off. The fruity part is prunes, tart-sweet and meaty, blended with sugar and grated lemon rind. The crunchy crust is toasted oat cereal, nut-like in taste. And the cheese layer has been frothed with eggs, cream, lemon rind and such.

#### Bottom Crust:

2 tablespoons butter or margarine | Pinch salt  
8 marshmallows (2 ounces) | 2 cups toasted oat cereal

Combine butter or margarine, marshmallows and salt. Stir over low heat until melted and smooth. Stir in cereal. Press mixture in even layer on bottom of greased 8-inch spring form pan.

#### Prune Layer:

2 cups pitted prunes, chopped | 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind  
½ cup sugar | ½ cup water  
Pinch salt

Combine ingredients and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick. Cool, then smoothly spread over cereal layer.

#### Cheese Filling:

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin | 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
1 cup sugar | 2 cups creamy cottage cheese  
¼ teaspoon salt | 1 8-ounce package cream cheese  
3 eggs, separated | 1 teaspoon vanilla  
¼ cup milk | 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

#### Topping:

¾ cup toasted oat cereal | 2 tablespoons sugar  
¼ teaspoon cinnamon | 1 tablespoon melted butter

In top section of double boiler, mix gelatin, sugar, and salt; stir in slightly beaten yolks and milk. Cook over simmering water until mixture is a thick, smooth custard. Cool, then chill a few minutes until mixture mounds when lifted with a spoon. Beat cottage cheese and cream cheese together to blend thoroughly. Beat in cooled custard and vanilla. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and whipped cream. Pour cheese filling over prune layer. Combine topping ingredients. Sprinkle over cheese layer. Garnish with whole prunes. Chill about 3 hours or until firm enough to cut. Makes 8-10 servings.





53. As a result teams in the Thiensville-Mequon tournament are the host school, Kewaskum, Cedarburg and Germantown.


