## Official Opening of Hon-E-Kor Country Club This Week End

TEE-OFF DINNER AND DANCE SATURDAY NIGHT, FLAG TOURNAMENT SUNDAY

Although members have been golfing on the course for several weeks now in favorable weather, the official opening of the season at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club in Kewaskum will be held this week end with a tee-off dinner and dance scheduled for Saturday night, April 27, followed by the first flag tournament of the season on Sunday.

The price for the dinner and dance will be \$3.00 per person and the reservation card promises a "big surprise." Dinner will be served from 6:30 to 8:30 p. m. on Saturday followed by dancing. The music to be furnished for the dance will come from Port Washington. Reservations which were to be turned in by Tuesday of this week, indicate that more than 100 of the members will attend the affair.

The opening flag tournament throughout the day on Sunday will be for both men and women with prizes to be awarded the winners in the various events on each hole of the course.

Other special events scheduled during the 1963 season include a mixed two ball foursome and dinner on Memorial Day, May 30; mixed two ball foursome and dinner on Saturday, June 15; flag tournament and pot luck family barbecue on Thursday, the 4th of July; mixed two ball foursome and dinner on Sunday, July 28; mixed two ball foursome and dinner on Saturday, Aug. 17; flag tournament and pot luck family barbecue on Labor Day, Sept. 2, and Christmas party on Saturday, Dec. 14. Different committees are in charge for each of these social affairs.

The Tuesday Night Men's league will open play on May 7 and will continue through Aug. 27. Tee time will be at 5:20 p. m. each Tuesday, followed by dinner at 8 p. m. Award night will be held Oct. 5. Thursday also is men's day from April 18 through Sept. 26.

Ladies' Day activities will begin on May 8 with an opening dinner and meeting at 7 p. m. Every Wednesday thereafter through Sept. 18 will be ladies' day with golf, luncheon and cards on that day. The ladies' 9-hole tournament will be held on Aug. 21.

Special golf events this summer are: Junior tournament, month of July; club champion event, month of September; senior champion 50 years and over event, month of September; president club champion event, July 15 to Aug. 31.

Officers and directors of the men's and women's golf committees were published at the time of their election last fall. Regulations of play, golf rules, general course rules, dues and fees, and all other information is contained in a program booklet distributed to all members at the start of the season.

## Blood Donors Wanted For Clinic Here May 6; Quota 120 Pints

It is again time to fill up the reserve of the Blood Bank. The mobile unit will be at the Kewaskum High school gym on Monday, May 6, from 1:30 to 6:00 p. m. Kewaskum's quota is 120 pints—LET'S GO OVER THE TOP! Please register at once. Contact Henry Rosenheimer at 626-2131 or Mrs. Ned Sengpiel at 626-2015.

It is urgent that the quota be reached as it has been raised by 20 pints. Everyone in the community benefits by this Blood Bank and when blood is needed they can "draw from the bank." Refreshments will be served to donors.

Unless Kewaskum and area residents rise to the challenge, we may one day lose the valuable service we now have of being able to obtain free blood when we need it. The West Bend Blood Donors club reported that in the first three months of 1963, 303 pints of blood were used at St. Joseph's Community hospital. In January 123 pints were used, in February 49 and in March 131. During this period one patient required 30 pints and another needed 26 pints. This is not a high figure of consumption but rather representative of the average usage.

In 1962 a total of 1,103 pints of blood were withdrawn from the West Bend blood account. The three blood drives last year netted 922 pints which were deposited into the bank, leaving a net loss of 181 pints. We cannot continue to draw more blood from our account than we deposit.

Since residents of the Kewaskum area enjoy the benefits of being able to obtain free blood when in need through the blood bank, they should seriously consider the obligation to insure the continued existence of this service by contributing to the blood drive here on May 6.

## Clark Landmann to Take Part in UW Chinese Program

Clark Landmann, Kewaskum, is among 50 Chinese language students at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, who will take part in a Chinese program being held on the UW campus Monday night, May 6.

The program, "China Night," given entirely in Chinese, will be presented at 8 p. m. May 6 in Wisconsin's Memorial Union.

Students in seven language classes will present a varied program consisting of a short play, a skit, poetry reading, and songs. The program is open to the public without charge.

Taught at Wisconsin since 1950, Chinese has rapidly gained in enrollment and in the variety of courses offered. The UW Chinese department offers a major in Chinese and a variety of courses ranging from beginning Chinese to journalistic Chinese, 20th-century plays, and T'ang poetry. The department also offers minors in Chinese for students studying in related areas.

The U. S. government is encouraging the study of Chinese by giving that language top priority in the National Defense Education Act's Foreign Language Fellowship program.



**WSES FILM WINS NATIONAL AWARD**

A recently produced film on the school "dropout" — "When I'm Old Enough . . . Goodbye" — has received a national award for excellence, according to H. H. Forster, manager of the Waukesha Wisconsin State Employment Service (WSES).

The 28-minute film is available without charge through the WSES for showing at high schools, PTA, civic or religious groups. Forster says of the film:

"Here is a powerful story that speaks directly to youth in their own language, dramatizing the problem of a teenager, Doug, who leaves school to work, failing to recognize the employment problem that faces him. Nearly a million young people are making this same mistake every year," Forster points out. "As a result, school dropouts find themselves unemployed more often and over longer periods of time."

It is estimated that approximately 10,000 persons in Wisconsin have seen the film through the WSES booking service.

The federal government owns and manages about two million acres of forest lands in Wisconsin.

### Soda Factory Notes Sixtieth Anniversary

The Campbellsport Bottling Works, producers of Sparkle beverages, under the ownership of Roderick "Bups" Reese, observed its 60th anniversary. The business was started in April of 1903 by the late William Warden.

When Mr. Warden moved to Campbellsport from the town of Scott where he was born, he had been employed in a distillery at Silver Creek and was familiar with the bottling business. He purchased land from John Kaemmerling, who at that time operated a wagon shop. Major improvements to the plant were made in 1923 and 1924 when the buildings were raised eight feet to meet the road level. At that time a new bridge had been constructed over the Milwaukee river there. In 1934 an addition was made to the bottling plant.

"Billy Pop" was a nickname by which Mr. Warden was familiarly known. His Sparkle beverages were known over a four-county area and were enjoyed at many a picnic.

Mr. Warden died in 1960 and Mrs. Warden continued to operate the business until her death the same year with her nephew, Roderick Reese, as manager. Reese, who had been with the Wardens for more than 20 years, inherited the business in 1962.

The boat owner who wishes to keep a boat certificate of number attached to his craft at all times may purchase a laminated facsimile for \$.50 from the Wisconsin

Laminating Service, P. O. Box 722, Madison, Wis. It is not necessary that you send in the certificate of registration, just mail them the information on the certificate.

Both federal law and Wisconsin law requires that the certificate of number for your boat be available for inspection on the boat at all times while the boat is in use.







### Telephone Co. Lowers Long Distance Rates

A decrease in rates after 9 p. m. for station-to-station long distance calls to points outside of Wisconsin is the major effect of the long distance rate changes which became effective Thursday, April 4.

General Telephone Company of Wisconsin spokesmen in announcing the new inter-state rate schedule, said that a three-minute, station-to-station call placed after 9 p. m. from Wisconsin now costs no more than 90c to any point in the continental United States.

Interstate rates have been reduced on all station-to-station long distance calls, covering more than 220 airline miles, placed between 9 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. This reduction in rates will apply to

the initial 3 minutes as well as to the overtime periods. (Each additional minute in excess of the initial 3-minute period).

Minor changes in interstate person-to-person calls resulted in an increase of five to ten cents on calls of less than 800 miles. These latest changes, in effect, create three schedules of rates on interstate station-to-station calls: day rate (4:30 a. m. to 6 p. m.), evening rate (6 to 9 p. m. plus Sunday and holidays), and the new rate (9 p. m. to 4:30 a. m.).

Reduced "after 9" rates have been in effect on an intrastate basis since Sept. 21, 1957. Under this plan, a three-minute, station-to-station call within Wisconsin costs 45 cents or less, while 10 minutes costs 75 cents or less.

General Telephone Company of Wisconsin spokesmen pointed out that the new "after nine o'clock" nighttime rates afford the whole

family the pleasure and economy of visiting by phone during the evening.


