FFA Boys Attend Eagle River Camp

The Kewaskum FFA chapter, in conjunction with the Campbellsport FFA and the local Kiwanis club, sponsored 25 boys at Trees for Tomorrow Conservation Camp at Eagle River, Wis. this week. The boys left Sunday, Aug. 11, and returned home on Wednesday, Aug. 14.

The Kewaskum roster included FFA members Lee Schmidt, Ron Amerling, Don Schrauth, Mark Wilkens, Al Martin, John Kreif, Harry Krueger, Wayne Mueller, Rich. Zehren, Ken Ramthun, Eugene Ebert and Joe Egerer.

The group was under the supervision of John Collier and Roy Esser, vo-ag instructors from Campbellsport and Kewaskum high schools, respectively.

The boys spent the evenings drawing broad concepts from the sessions during the day, had lectures, movies and recreation. They had a full program every day and evening at the camp.

Besides their time in camp, the boys made field trips and studies at the N.E. area headquarters of the Wisconsin Conservation Dept. fish management; Rainbow Flowage, study of water of the Wisconsin river; game management and Star Lake plantations, Forest trails, Rhinelander ranger station and forest protection, Nicolet National Forest, cranberry bogs, game refuge, etc.

**GAIL STAEHLER TREATED AT
HOME, HOSPITAL AFTER
TAKING RUST REMOVER**

Gail Staehler, 13-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Staehler of R. 2, Kewaskum, accidentally swallowed poisonous rust remover fluid Tuesday and the rescue squad of West Bend station No. 2's fire department was summoned at 2:60 p. m. to take the young child to St. Joseph's Community hospital at West Bend.

Fire Chief Carl Peters said that when Mrs. Staehler discovered that the child had swallowed the poison she immediately read the directions on the container of the fluid and administered an antidote of raw eggs and milk. The response was fast in coming and the child regurgitated. Mrs. Staehler was alone at the time and feeling that further treatment might be warranted, she then summoned the rescue squad, which rushed the child to the hospital.

Little Gail's stomach was pumped at the hospital as a further precaution, and she was then released.



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Fall Adult Driver Education Program Offered By School

The West Bend School of Vocational and Adult Education will be starting its Fall adult driver education program on Wednesday, Sept. 11, in room 266 of the West Bend High school building. Any person wanting to learn to drive is requested to contact the vocational school office, phone FEderal 4-9131.

The driver education program is a fully accredited and highly recommended course consisting of 20 hours of classroom instruction and 8 hours of practice driving instruction in a dual control car. The classes meet from 7:30 - 9:30 on Wednesday evenings for ten weeks and the behind-the-wheel driving schedule is arranged with the individual learner for one hour per week for eight weeks. A fee of \$9.00 is charged for the course. Non-residents are charged an additional \$9.00 tuition fee.

Classroom instruction covers a variety of subjects including the following: Securing the instruction permit, personal fitness for driving, knowing your car, driving maneuvers, good practices in traffic, driving on expressways, skillful driving under adverse conditions, traffic laws, insurance protection, and automobile economy.

The behind-the-wheel instruction is offered in one of two 1963 dual control automatic shift cars. These cars are furnished to the school by Geiger Ford Corporation and by Klinka Oldsmobile garage. The actual driving instruc-

tion includes starting and stopping on a hill, turning, backing, signalling, parallel and angle parking, driving in traffic and driving on the open highway.

County Treasurer Notes Decline in Delinquent Taxes

County Treasurer Robert Klein reported this week that a total of 3,407 partial or postponed tax payments were made at his office prior to the July 31 tax payment deadline. A total of 4,154 such payments were due, leaving 747 payments on the "delinquent" list on 1962 taxes.

This year's number of payments exceeded those of last year when 3,099 payments were made prior to the July 31, 1962 deadline on a total of 4,079 which were due on 1961 taxes, leaving a total of 980 delinquents.

Treasurer Klein said the increased payments prior to the deadline and the lower number of delinquent taxes indicated a favorable trend, which, he hoped, will continue.

The total amount of taxes due on the postponed taxes this year was \$621,073. The amount collected on the 3,407 payments will not be known until the tax payments are entirely processed, Klein stated. The collection periods create a great deal more work in the county treasurer's office and additional time will be needed before all the records are brought up to date, Treasurer Klein indicated.

DATES OF HUNTING SEASONS ANNOUNCED

Bass fishing continued to be good at Big Cedar lake. Both residents and non-residents brought in catches taken on spinning tackle and nightcrawlers. White bass and crappies were biting on Little Cedar. Pike and perch fishing continued good at Pike lake.

The conservation fund received an unexpected boost recently in the form of four \$25 gifts upon order of Dodge county Juvenile Judge Joseph E. Schultz.

The judge decided that a quartet of youths involved in a deer poaching case should make contributions rather than pay fines. Under the law, fines must go to the school fund, but gifts are a different matter. Judge Schultz gave the youths and their parents 30 days to come up with the specified offering. The last check was received by the conservation department a few days ago.

The four admitted killing a buck and doe in the town of Calamus marsh. The doe was carrying unborn twin fawns. Since statutes place a minimum value of \$25 on a deer, Judge Schultz ordered the contribution. He also revoked hunting privileges of the four youths for one year.

Many of you are now making plans for a fall vacation and would like to get the dates of the various hunting seasons. All the information is not available, but we will give you what we have. Waterfowl seasons are set later, after we have received the framework from the federal government.

Basically, Wisconsin will have a nine-day deer season for bucks only from Nov. 23 - Dec. 1. In addition to this, 5,600 either sex permits will be available in limited areas in northwestern and west central Wisconsin. This will be Wisconsin's first experience with the variable quota idea.

A two-day either sex season on Nov. 23-24 will be followed by seven days of buck hunting in Manitowoc, Calumet, Sheboygan, Washington, Ozaukee, Fond du Lac, Dodge, Pierce, Dunn, Pepin, Buffalo, Trempealeau, and LaCrosse

counties. Also in Eau Claire county, west of Highway 12, Jackson county, west of Highways 12 and 27, Monroe county, west of Highways 27 and 33 and Vernon county, west of Highway 131.

There will be only a two-day season, Nov. 23-24, for deer of either sex in Crawford, Grant, LaFayette, Dane, Green, Jefferson, Waukesha, Rock, Walworth, Racine and Kenosha counties.

Ruffed grouse season opens state-wide on Saturday, Sept. 28, as does sharp-tailed grouse in the north; rabbits and raccoon in the north, and squirrels in the western portion of the state.

Pheasant season opens state-wide on Saturday, Oct. 19, as does rabbits and raccoon in the south; squirrels and Hungarian partridge in the eastern part of the state.

There will be no open season on quail.

Closing dates are as follows: Sharp-tailed grouse, Oct. 13; ruffed grouse, Nov. 19 in the north and Dec. 15 in the south; pheasants and Hungarian par-

tridge, Nov. 24; raccoon, Dec. 31, and rabbits and squirrels, Jan. 31.

Wash. County NFO Members Contact Milwaukee Processors

Washington county N.F.O. chairman, Ed Ritterbusch, reported county members joined in a police escorted motorcade with about 500 other N.F.O. members from neighboring counties on Aug. 12 in touring Milwaukee and stopping at the Sealtest milk plant, Golden Guernsey milk plant, the Milwaukee stockyards and the Borden milk plant in efforts to acquaint processors with the organization's efforts to establish a fair price for all agricultural production.

The general opinion of processors contacted was that farmers were receiving enough for their products even though N.F.O. representatives proved otherwise. However, Gavin McKerrow of Golden Guernsey went on to say

that, "Milk prices can not be raised, but that inflation must be stopped, and the general economy of the country has to be brought down to the level of the farmer rather than raising the farmer to the upper level of the country's economy."

Washington county will have its monthly business meeting Aug. 19 at 8:30 p. m. at the Hartford town hall.



COUNTY AGENT NEWS

FLY CONTROL

Fly control is always a problem on farms at this time of year. If you are having success with the chemicals that I have previously recommended, and if they are not too costly, we suggest continued use of them. However, if this is not the case, perhaps you would like to try something else. Mr. DeFoliart of the university tells us that spraying with one per cent dimethoate at four week intervals, or one per cent ronnel at two week intervals will furnish control. These chemicals are to be used on the ceiling, stanchions, support posts, low beams, overhanging cords and wires, calf pens, wall surfaces near windows and part of the ceiling. They should NEVER be sprayed directly on the cattle. Good sanitation along with a good residual-spray program should provide effective control for stable flies and face flies.

MORE INSECTS

Last week we received a report from a representative of the State Department of Agriculture who informed us of some new insects about to descend upon the northern part of our country. These include the green june beetle, the dogbane beetle, the rose chafer, and the spring rose beetle. We have not seen any in Washington county but we must be aware that unless we destroy the first ones, we may have severe problems. If you find an in-

sect that you have never seen before, find out what it is immediately. We have samples of those mentioned above in our office.

This is the season for roadside stands that sell farm-grown products directly to consumers. May we remind the seller to make sure his produce is of high quality. If you are selling sweet corn, make sure the ears are filled out, that there is no ear worm, that it is a good variety. Remember, the only way to get a customer the second time is to have satisfactory service the first time. Always sell high quality products at your roadside stands or to stores that buy directly from you.

QUACKGRASS

The best time to control quackgrass is in the fall. If quackgrass is sprayed with about 5 pounds of Atrazine per acre in August, then allowed to lay idle until spring plowing and corn planting, there should be almost 100% control.

CRABGRASS

If crabgrass is growing in your garden, lawn, or some other place, you are probably thoroughly discouraged in trying to get rid of this troublesome weed. We know of no chemicals that will completely control crabgrass. It is an annual that comes from seed each year and is germinated late in the spring. By this time of the

year, it is a heavy green leaf with a head containing many seeds. As the head begins to ripen it turns purple.

There is nothing you can do about crabgrass now. Control must be done early in the year. Fertilize the lawn very carefully and heavily in the spring. Set your lawn mower high. This is done to have a lawn with as tough a sod as possible. Then the bluegrass will crowd out the crabgrass and, in time, you should be completely rid of crabgrass.
