## Beechwood Parish Will Celebrate 75th Anniversary

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH TO MARK EVENT SUNDAY, OCT. 20, WITH TWO SERVICES

The 75th anniversary of its founding will be observed by St. John's United Church of Christ at Beechwood on Sunday, Oct. 20, with morning and afternoon worship services.

The celebration will start with the morning services at 10 a. m. The Rev. E. F. Menger, a former pastor, will deliver the sermon. Pastor Menger is now at Lake Elmo, Minn. The service will be followed by a cafeteria dinner at noon served to all.

At the afternoon worship at 3 p. m. the Rev. Charles Koch, pastor of the New Holstein United Church of Christ, will deliver the sermon. Rev. Koch is a son of the Beechwood congregation. Everyone is welcome to attend these celebration services.

The present pastor, the Rev. Duane D. Budach will be in attendance, as will be some of the former pastors. The former pastors include: Rev. Frank, 1888-1892; Rev. Gruenewald, 1892-1903; Rev. Voight, 1903-1909; Rev. Goldstein, 1909-1913; Rev. Kuenne, 1913-1935; Rev. Gadow, 1935-1939; Rev. Tetzlaff, 1939-1941; Rev. Meiller, 1941-1944; Rev. Schroer, 1945-1951; Rev. Fresenburg, 1952-1957; Student John Clausung, summer 1957; Rev. Menger, 1958-1960; Rev. Budach, pastor since 1960.

The congregation was founded by the Rev. Julius Frank. In 1887 the members of the new congregation worshipped in the former district 10 school house, north of

Residents of the village are requested not to burn leaves. Rake them to the curb anytime and the village will pick them up with their new vacuum leaf picking machine.



## Mention Made of Village by Edna Ferber in McCall's

Part III of a series of copyrighted articles by Edna Ferber, famous writer and author, appears in the October issue of McCall's magazine for women. In the Part III installment, entitled "The Story Locked in Memory and Emotions for Nearly Twenty Years: Her Spring in War-Weary Europe" mention is made of our little city of Kewaskum in one paragraph.

In one sentence Edna Ferber writes: "American town names containing the letter K and especially those beginning with K—Kokomo; Kalamazoo (where I was born); Kewaskum; Kewaunee; Kankakee; not to mention Oshkosh which carries the K in its middle—these are for some obscure reason considered mildly comic and always were good for a laugh in the old days of vaudeville."

At one time, between the ages of 17 and 21, Miss Ferber worked as a newspaper reporter for the Milwaukee Journal. She made mention of Kewaskum in writing about an assignment by the Writers' War Board to get a story on the manufacture of lifeboats in Kokomo, Ind.

### Fall Convention of County Schoolboard Association Oct. 22

The Washington County Schoolboard association will hold its annual fall convention at the elementary school gym in the village of Germantown on Tuesday, Oct. 22, at 8:00 p. m.

As in previous years, the program committee has arranged a most interesting program. Two prominent speakers have been secured.

William Kahl, first assistant state superintendent, will give a report on the progress in education. The second speaker, Sheriff Wolke of Milwaukee county, will speak on how his department works with youth.

Mr. Kahl is a senior member of the State Department of Public Instruction. He formerly was in charge of the School Aids Division before his promotion to the first assistant position.

### Youth Escapes When Train Strikes Auto At Campbellsport

Gary Grahl, 19, of R. 1, Eden, escaped serious injury and possible death at 6:55 a. m. Monday when his car was struck by southbound Passenger Train No. 206 on the town line road at the southern village limits of Campbellsport.

Grahl was driving west on the town road called "Lovers Lane" in the area enroute to work at Precision Metals, a new plant just west of the North Western railroad tracks, at the time of the accident.

Grahl reported that he stopped at the railroad tracks, then proceeded west and the southbound train, traveling at an estimated speed of 65 miles per hour, struck the rear of the Grahl auto, hurling it off the tracks. The auto, a 1959 model, was badly wrecked.

The entire rear end of the car was demolished. Grahl, badly shaken, but able to walk around at the scene, was taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, for a checkup.

The train was reported approximately one-half hour late on its southbound trip as a result of the crash.

### \$101,256 Pledged in MU Drive in County; 56% of Alumni Give

#### CHAIRMAN GEHL REPORTS 122 CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVED

A total of \$101,256 has been pledged in the Washington county campaign in behalf of the Greater Marquette program, Albert C. Gehl, general chairman, announced this week.

Gehl, a Marquette University alumnus who is secretary and general manager of Gehl Brothers Mfg. Co., West Bend, reported that 122 contributions have been received from alumni, corporations, parents and other individuals.

Of the 174 alumni in the county, 98 (56 per cent) pledged to the program.

Marquette has now raised more than \$5.5 million as part of a long range improvement plan. The program's first phase, ending in 1966, seeks to obtain \$15 million for faculty and academic improvements, land and buildings, and increases in endowment and student aids.

The Washington county campaign, started Sept. 10, was the

first effort outside of the Milwaukee and Chicago areas. Similar campaigns, based on the Washington county experience, will be started in other sections of Wisconsin this fall.

Co-chairmen of the industrial solicitation were Thomas J. Rolfs, vice-president of Amity Leather Products Co., West Bend, and Douglas Ziegler, vice-president of the West Bend Co.

John J. Shinnors, Marquette alumnus and publisher of the Hartford Times-Press, headed the alumni phase of the Washington county campaign.

In charge of soliciting parents was Cyril A. Opgenorth, West Bend, whose daughter, Diane, is a senior in liberal arts. Father John Holbrook, S. J., associate director of development, was coordinator.



(Continued from page one) Beechwood, and then moved to a building located across the road from the present day church. The structure, which still stands today, was built in 1888. Donations were received from the members and interested persons of other denominations. The head carpenter was Emil Gessner. In October, 1888, the building was completed.

Since then there have been improvements and additions made. The present bell was purchased in 1897, in 1923 the straight wall was changed to an altar, in 1931 the basement was dug out, in 1951 the pulpit was cut down, carpeting put in and everything revarnished; in 1962 the interior and exterior were painted and the floors, woodwork, pulpit and altar were refinished, a loud speaker and new pews were installed; in 1963 carpeting was purchased for the aisles and stairway.

In 1942 the congregation, previously a part of the Evangelical church, voted to join the Evangelical and Reformed church. In 1961, in accordance with the recent merger of the E and R church, the congregation changed its name to St. John's United Church of Christ.

Present organizations in the church include the Sunday church school, 36 students; Women's Guild, 19 members; Brotherhood, 15 members; Adult Bible Class, 12 members; Youth Fellowship (held jointly with Silver Creek church).

22 members; three choirs, 27 members; two organists, Wade Schemmel and Karen Kraemer; communicate membership of church, 115 members.

In the parish's 75 year existence there have been 319 baptisms, 286 confirmations, 108 weddings, 154 funerals.

## HUNTING SEASON OPENS AT 12 NOON SATURDAY

Saturday, Oct. 19, at 12:00 noon the season will open on pheasant, rabbit, squirrel, Hungarian partridge and raccoon. All of this information and much more is available in the small game regulations that can be obtained from the county clerk or any license depot in the county. (PLEASE READ THEM).

## Illegal Hunting Complaints

The complaints that came in to the office of the Washington county sheriff in regard to illegal hunting and vandalism on the opening of the duck season was bad enough. However, with the large numbers of men out on the 19th it could be worse. As an example tame ducks were shot near farm buildings and pheasants in gardens. One farmer was so angry when he saw four young men shoot a bird from a car that instead of writing down the license number he made a large dent in the rear fender with an iron rod.

In case of a violation take the car license number and immediately call the office of the Washington county sheriff. FE 4-5588.

Farmers who have young stock pastured away from buildings should keep an eye on them at night. Reports are coming in of cars driving in fields and an occasional shot at night. Yours will not be the first pony, cow or horse in Wisconsin killed by illegal night hunters.

## Don't Shoot Hens

The pheasant hunting season opens Saturday, Oct. 19, at 12 noon and extends through Nov. 24, state-wide. The bag limit the first 2 days (Oct. 19 & 20) is 1 cock per day. The remainder of the season, the bag limit is 2 cocks per day.

The pheasant population certainly is not high. If it is to again reach the level we knew in the past, it will be as a result of increasing the breeding population, so DON'T SHOOT HENS. They are the birds that will provide the hunting in the future by raising

broods of young birds each year.

If you wish to preserve and better the sport of pheasant hunting, DON'T SHOOT HENS and impress this upon your hunting companions and the other hunters you talk to. If and when you observe anyone shooting hens, report it to the nearest conservation warden, giving the violator's name, if that is possible, a good description of the individual, and an accurate description of how he is dressed. If an automobile is involved, be sure and report the license number.





To the Editor:

The week of October 13-19 has been designated as National Newspaper Week. As such, it draws attention to the important role that newspapers play in a free society—a role that is all too often taken for granted.

A free and open society is made possible by citizen awareness of the happenings of the day, stimulated by active political discussions of all current issues. Newspapers are a chief factor in making intelligent citizen debate possible, both by providing facts and by offering editorial comment.

History is full of examples of the decisive role newspapers have played. The past six months provide a convenient example. Early this year I made a state-wide tour of our public institutions. I was accompanied by members of the press. As we visited mental health centers, state hospitals and prisons, we were overwhelmed by the enormity of the tasks that faced these institutions. Facilities were overcrowded, inadequate staffs overworked, and still we were not able to accommodate the ever increasing number of patients and

inmates. The situation was shocking, yet very few of our citizens were concerned because very few were aware of these deplorable conditions.

The newspapers of Wisconsin changed this. They informed us all of the conditions of our state institutions, stressing the clear need for expansion and improvement. As a result, we were able to give proper consideration to these needs in the 1963-65 budget. Newspapers were key agents in a process in which the entire state benefited. This example is typical of the role of a free press.

As Governor of the State of Wisconsin, I proudly salute the newspapers of our state, and I congratulate you and your paper for the role you have played in preserving our traditions.
