Village Mourns, Pays Respect to Late President

RESIDENTS PAUSE FOR FINAL TRIBUTE, MEMORY HONORED BY STILLNESS

All residents of Kewaskum and area joined the entire world Monday in mourning for our great and beloved late President of the United States, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, victim of a cowardly assassin's bullet in Dallas, Tex. at 12:31 p. m. last Friday. President Kennedy was only 46 years of age, the 35th President of the United States, and the youngest man ever to hold the office of chief executive.

Details on the assassination of the President, the fatal shooting of his assassin, the killing of a policeman, the wounding of Governor John B. Connally of Texas, the President's funeral and burial services and all other events connected to the tragedy need not be repeated here. They were very thoroughly and amazingly covered on television, radio and in the daily press from Friday through Monday.

In tribute and respect to President Kennedy, Kewaskum churches conducted or will hold memorial services and both the public and parochial schools were closed Monday. Closed also were the post office, municipal building and all other public buildings. All village employees were given the day off and factories were shut down from 11 a. m. to 2 p. m. which were not obligated to carry on essential services.

A profound stillness settled over the village at 11 a. m. as all business places closed their doors for three hours at the request of the Kewaskum Business association. Professional offices and establishments followed a similar example. All taverns were closed at the request of the Washington County Tavern league. During this time traffic was almost at a standstill and streets were bare as everyone turned to their TV sets to witness the funeral services in Washington, D. C. and burial in Arlington cemetery.

Most social events were canceled or postponed over the week end and on Monday out of respect for Mr. Kennedy and other activities and programs were called off. Business was curtailed, there was little activity on the streets, and things were very quiet over the entire week end as residents were anxious to remain clustered around radios and television sets to keep up with the rapidly occurring events from Friday through Monday connected with the assassination. People were shocked, numbed and grief-stricken by the news. Many wept openly, others prayed. Everyone was filled with sorrow and few felt like going out for fun over the week end. When the shattering news struck, people cast aside their normal roles regardless of wealth, color, position and political affiliation.

He has further directed all posts to fly the American flag at half staff during the official mourning period of 30 days (Nov. 22-Dec. 22). Locally the municipal building, post office, schools and some other public places will also display the flag at half staff during this period.

The assassination of President Kennedy, an unspeakable, despicable crime, rocked the nation as well as other countries as no other incident has. President Kennedy and his family had become a symbol for a peace-loving people. Our beloved president was young, vigorous, aggressive, scholarly, courageous, respected, a hero, given by God to lead us. Even his severest political opponents agreed he increased in stature as time passed. His firmness in diplomatic matters frequently brought the nation through difficult situations abroad. The memory of John Fitzgerald Kennedy will long linger to nourish the faith of all who serve this same great land. The eternal question confronts us, "Why must it be?"

Tractor Tips, Pinning Driver

James Ruplinger, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Ruplinger, R. 2, Kewaskum, was injured at approximately 3:30 p. m. Wednesday when a tractor he was driving tipped over and he was pinned underneath the vehicle.

The mishap occurred on a town road near the Ruplinger farm, known as the Campbell or St. Bridgets road, about a half mile south of Hwy. H. It is the town line road dividing the towns of Kewaskum and Wayne.

Apparently Ruplinger made a sharp turn on the road, causing the tractor to tip. He was pinned underneath the vehicle which came to rest upside down. His cries were heard by his father and neighbors who came to his assistance.

A local physician and the Kewaskum firemen's rescue squad were called to the scene. They raised the tractor and succeeded in freeing the young man, who was rushed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. County Sheriff William Johnson and a deputy also assisted in the rescue.

Ruplinger is reported to have suffered a possible fractured pelvis and other lesser injuries in the accident.

European Traveler Presents Program To Woman's Club

A teacher of social science in the Alexander Graham Bell High school in Milwaukee, and a nephew of Mrs. R. G. Edwards, brought an outstanding program to the members of the Kewaskum Woman's club on Saturday, Nov. 23. He is Robert B. Roesler, who gleaned much knowledge of "The Place of Women in a Changing World" while doing work toward a master's degree in Eastern European history. He spent the summers of 1958 and 1960 visiting eleven European countries including a five week stay in the Soviet Union. In 1962 Mr. Roesler spent two months in Japan taking part in a program of Asian studies at Sophia university in Tokyo.

"I believe," said Mr. Roesler, "that the solution to the world problems is held by the social sciences rather than the scientific. We must maintain an interest in people, rather than in things, and comparing cultures is more important than comparing politics. Over one-half of the world population is made up of women," he continued, "and upon them depends its culture and civilization," pointing to the important role of a mother in molding a child's life.

In Japan the woman's place is in the home. It has always been so. The material changes that have taken place since 1945 are amazing. Western clothes and furniture have made their appearance and have become popular. Television sets and electric fans are common. Except for special occasions, gone are the brightly hued kimonos that have been commonly associated in a mind's eye picture of a Japanese woman. But her position in life remains unchanged. It is unthinkable for a woman to work outside the home. Secretarial jobs are held by men. Parents arrange marriages and the speaker observed that about

70% are happy and lasting. Retirement age is in a man's mid-fifties since there are more workers than jobs in the country.

In sharp contrast, the Russian woman bears the economic strain. It is unpatriotic for a woman to remain at home and care for her family. Since there are more jobs than workers, especially on farms, a woman does a man's work. She works on farms and in the streets. Russia, with 175 different nationalities within its borders, is a country for youth. Senior citizens are unwanted and unprovided for. It is a backward country and its economic strain is shown in the fact that oranges sell for \$10.50 a dozen. A ten-cent candy bar is available for \$1.30.

"Where does that leave the American woman?" asked Mr. Roesler. "She does not occupy a position as traditional as in Japan, nor as tradition-destroying as in the Soviet Union. The American woman occupies a position in the middle from where she is privileged to make her own choices and decisions, where strength of character is more important than material things. America will no longer be great," he observed, "if material things become more important than strength of character. Our late President Kennedy will be missed most for his strength of character."
