## ELECTION AT POLLS ON DAY OF ANNUAL MEETING; JUNE 30 DEADLINE FOR FILING

At the request of the school board, Principal C. Ernest Mitchell has written and circulated a letter of explanation concerning the new method of electing school board members to all electors of the Kewaskum Community High School Joint District No. 2.

A petition signed by 104 electors of the Kewaskum Community High School Jt. District No. 2 was presented to the district school board clerk on April 27. This petition requested that school board members be elected at an election at the polls on the day of the annual meeting. Official notice that this petition had been filed was posted in four public places and published in the Kewaskum Statesman and West Bend News as required by law. Heretofore members were nominated and elected at the annual meeting.

This new procedure for electing school board members is as follows:

Any qualified elector may become a candidate for membership on the board by filing a written declaration of candidacy at least 20 days before the annual meeting. (The annual meeting this year will be held July 20, so the last day for filing would be June 30). Such declaration must state that the candidate is a qualified elector of the district and it must be filed with the district clerk, Fred J. Spoerl, 1136 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum.

No other form of nomination is acceptable but, of course, electors can vote for any qualified elector of the district by writing his name on the ballot.

The polling place will be at the Kewaskum Community High school and the polls will be open from 1:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. on the day of the annual meeting, July 20, 1964.

Immediately after the polls are closed, the ballots will be counted and the results declared.

## Brother of Local Residents Killed In Train Crash

Marvin Kurth, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Kurth, R. 1, Jackson, was fatally injured Saturday when the tractor he was driving was struck by a freight train on the Chicago and North Western tracks about a mile east of Gumm's Corners and about a mile south of Jackson. He was a brother of Mrs. Herbert (Lenore) Klumb and Mrs. Bernard (Phyllis) Ermer, both of Kewaskum.

The Kurths operated a farm at the scene of the crash and the railroad line transects their farm. Kurth was driving a tractor towing a hay crusher across the tracks when it was struck by the unscheduled freight train. The train, traveling about 50 miles per hour, was brought to a halt about 1,450 feet north of the crossing following the crash. The youth's body was carried about 1,250 feet. Debris was scattered along the railroad right-of-way with part of the tractor jammed against the front of the engine. The tractor was demolished.

The youth was reported to have suffered a fatal head injury. Funeral services were held at Jackson Wednesday. Besides the above mentioned sisters, he leaves his

parents, one other sister and two brothers.





## Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

By Bob Lake, Conservation Warden, Washington County

### DOE DEER WITH TWO FAWNS KILLED NEAR ST. MICHAELS

Fishing pressure dropped during the past week in the county. However, the number of motorboats operating on local waters increased enough to more than compensate for the number of missing fishing boats. The old time bass and northern fishermen continue to catch fish. Bluegills are biting in most lakes.

A large doe deer was killed on Highway 28 about one mile west of St. Michaels on Sunday night. Not only did this animal die, but her two fawns left in the woods will never survive.

### State Park, Forest Regulations

Last week was the first in a series of articles discussing regulations governing use and conduct in state parks, state forests, recreation areas, improved campsites, fish hatcheries, etc. This week we continue this discussion.

1. It is unlawful to build or maintain any fire or burn any refuse except at designated fireplaces in state parks, state recreation areas, improved campsites, fish hatcheries, or the state game farm.

2. It is unlawful to leave any fire unattended or to throw away any matches cigarettes, cigars or pipe ashes without extinguishing them, or to start any fire contrary to posted notice.

3. Peddling or soliciting business is prohibited, distributing handbills or other advertising matter and posting of any unauthorized signs is also prohibited. Using any such areas as a basis for commercial operation within or outside the area is also prohibited unless first authorized in writing.

4. It shall be unlawful to use in any manner the dock, pier, wharf, boat landing or mooring facilities ice or on the waters in or immediately adjacent to any state park, recreation area or state forest public use area for the purpose of soliciting rides of any kind.

5. It is unlawful to operate any vehicle at a speed in excess of 25 miles per hour unless different limits are indicated by official traffic signs.

6. It is unlawful to operate any motor vehicle upon any bridle path, hiking trail, beach area, playground, picnic area or contrary to public notice.

7. It is unlawful to use, for the

purpose of landing aircraft, the water or ice in the following specified waters:

(a) Devil's lake in Devil's Lake Park, (b) All waters in Governor Dodge State Park, (c) Crystal lake in Northern Highlands State Forests, (d) Lakes of the Dalles in Interstate Park, (e) Mauthe lake in Kettle Moraine State Forest, (f) Lake Seven in Kettle Moraine State Forest in Sheboygan Co., (g) Ottawa lake in Kettle Moraine State Forest in Waukesha Co.

8. It is unlawful to operate a motorboat of any kind in any manner on the following waters:

(a) Lakes of the Dalles in Interstate Park, (b) Interfalls lake in Pattison State Park, (c) Mauthe lake in Kettle Moraine State Forest, (d) Crystal lake in Northern Highlands State Forests, (e) All waters in Governor Dodge State Park in Iowa county, (f) Zander's lake in Browntown Public Hunting Grounds, (g) Lake Seven in Kettle Moraine State Forest, (h) Silver lake in Kettle Moraine State Forest, (i) Horicon Marsh Wildlife Area in Dodge county during the migratory waterfowl season, except the main ditch, Burnett ditch, and the east branch of the Rock river, (j) All state-owned lands and waters within the boundaries of the Germania wildlife Area, Marquette county, (k) On all ditches, streams and flowages, except the Little Eau Pleine river, within the Mead Wildlife Area.

Be sure you have an annual park sticker or a daily use sticker.

## County Agent News Notes

### DAIRY MONTH ACTIVITIES

June Dairy Month activities in Washington county fall in several different categories. The banquet that we hold annually was held June 17. The second big event will be the open house programs at dairy farms in the county. A few farmers have volunteered to invite civic club members and their families to visit their farm at milking time one evening during June. The specific invitations have gone out and we expect a fine turnout.

### BUILDING A LAWN

Many home owners in Washington county are in the process of building a lawn. Let's try to outline a few basic procedures, so we get off to the right start. Incidentally, we have a couple of very fine bulletins on this at the

office. Ask for them if you are interested.

First of all, check the kind of soil you are going to build this lawn on. It will not grow on plain sand but needs to have some kind of soil that will hold water. We think you should have 6 to 12 inches of good red clay placed on top of any sand you might have on your yard, and this means 6 to 12 inches when it is packed down. On top of this clap put at least 2 to 3 inches of black dirt. If you fertilize just before raking it the last time, you should have good success.

Use a maximum of bluegrass as your seed, cover it with straw to hold the moisture in the soil, then water it. This means a thorough watering job to get the water down into the subsoil, not just a little every day.

Try some of these ideas; they may give you good success.

### BEGIN SPRAYING APPLES

We should begin thinking now about spraying for the railroad worm in the apples. As the fly moves about it will lay eggs in the apples. The egg will hatch into a tiny worm which will chew its way through the apples on the trees. There are two or three spray programs we might use to control this. We think the best one is to use a product known as Sevin, straight through, starting right after the middle of June. Using it too early in June may cause some apples to drop off. It will do a very good job of controlling railroad worm. Remember, you must spray at least once a week to accomplish this properly.

Take longer and live longer. The Institute for Safer Living says don't wait until the last moment to start that auto trip. Always start in time to allow for moderate speeds and relaxed, unhurried driving.

## Homemaker Notes In The Service

College Week for Women, sponsored by the Wisconsin extension service and the Wisconsin home demonstration council, partners in the education of homemakers, was held at Madison this past week.

Those registered chose a depth course, a series of three classes for an hour and a half each. 


