## Contributions to Children's Service Society Are Needed

DR. EDWARDS REPORTS KEWASKUM DONATIONS LESS THAN LAST YEAR

Contributions to the Children's Service society from Kewaskum are less than last year's according to Dr. Richard G. Edwards, local committee member. Contributors are urged to send in their gifts which provide necessary help for children. Ray R. Umbs of the Alenton State Bank is treasurer of the Washington county committee of the Children's Service society.

Last year the Children's Service society served 705 children, 411 unmarried mothers and 294 adoptive applicants throughout the state. In 1963 there was a significant increase in all the agency's services including a 72% increase in the number of children placed for adoption, in comparison to the number placed five years ago.

The Children's Service society, a nonsectarian agency, was founded in 1889 when the Rev. J. P. Dy-sart began the work of finding good homes for homeless children of Wisconsin. A recent Children's Service society pamphlet notes: "Originally a great many young children had lost both parents and were in need of new homes. As the years have gone by, this has changed. Today, the full orphan is rare, but too many are social orphans with one or both parents living. They are children who came into the world unwanted, or whose fathers and mothers cannot or will not make real parents."

Pointing out that "a stable home with parents wanting and loving him is every child's most vital need for healthy growth," the Children's Service pamphlet explains: "After careful study it is sometimes determined that, at least temporarily, a child cannot stay with his own family and should move into a foster home.

"Deprived of a normal home life, love and affection from his own parents, he must have other people to look after his emotional as well as physical wants and needs. Foster care is a step toward a permanent plan for the child through eventual return to his own home, through adoption or some other arrangement."

The appointment of Mr. Loofboro was announced by Richard Klumb, West Bend, who is Brotherhood Week chairman for District 6 in which Washington county is located.

Dr. Fred H. Harrington, president of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, is State Brotherhood Week chairman for 1965. Serving with him as state vice-chairmen are: Attorney Fred W. Genrich, Jr., Wausau; District Attorney John H. Chisholm of Superior; Attorney V. J. Lucareli, Kenosha; Attorney Maurice B. Pasch, Madison; State Supt. of Schools Angus B. Rothwell, Madison, and prominent businessman Ben Sadoff of Fond du Lac.

Brotherhood Week will be observed Feb. 21-28, 1965, and has been sponsored annually since 1934 by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. The purposes of Brotherhood Week are:

To give people an opportunity to rededicate themselves as individuals to the basic ideals of respect for people and human rights which are essential to our way of life; to dramatize the practical things which people can do to promote an understanding and realization of these ideals, and to enlist the support of a large number of people in year-round activities to build brotherhood.

Commenting on his appointment, Mr. Loofboro said, "All weeks are loofboro in need of the practice of brotherhood. However, the week of Washington's Birthday has been set aside as a time of resolution to sustain brotherhood throughout the year. This can and should be done without seeking a union of religious bodies, without modifying the distinctive beliefs of Protestants, Catholics, and Jews, and without weakening the loyalties of those of any faith. It is our hope that

the people of Washington county will make every effort to participate in this observance."

A Washington county committee will be appointed soon to direct Brotherhood Week activities.

**Final Meeting of Kettle Moraine Study Group Held**

The fourth and final meeting of the Kettle Moraine Study Group was held Tuesday, Nov. 10, in the extension office, West Bend. Presenting the information at this program was Dr. Jacob Shapiro of Wisconsin State university at Oshkosh and Norbert Underwood of the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Dr. Shapiro talked about nature's cycles, and how each affects another. He explained that when one phase of nature is allowed to increase with no checks and balances, it soon becomes completely unbalanced and in turn unbalances something else.

He used as a prime example the deer herd in the state of Wisconsin. Dr. Shapiro reported that because of the tendency to have a strictly "buck law" in hunting, we have a great many does producing an ever increasing number of fawns each year. Today there is only one enemy of the deer, and that is man. If we kill only the bucks we don't do too much good. Therefore man is working against himself and certainly against the herd in the hope of keeping the deer population down.

Mr. Underwood talked about the many problems we have today in the woods with insects and diseases that affect trees. Each of these are nature's way of doing something, according to Mr. Underwood, and his example was the tent caterpillar. He reported how this insect has defoliated many acres of trees in the north. But

because of this defoliation, another species of tree is able to grow, which wouldn't have been the case had the tent caterpillar not existed.

At the end of the session Keith Schmude, soil scientist, gave an excellent summary of the entire program.

The group was asked to give their comments to the people who developed the program. After analyzing these comments, it is possible that there will be future meetings on understanding and appreciating the Kettle Moraine. Those topics that were thought to be of primary interest were more of the plant life, the animal life, rocks and minerals, and the formation of soil of the Kettle Moraine. Planning and developing such programs will take place in the near future.

**County Agent News Notes**

Washington County Agent

**LAKES BELOW LEVEL**

Visiting in several areas of the county last week, we saw some lakes the level of which is not controlled by man. Two or three of them were about three feet below the level of last spring, and that was low to begin with. It would seem that unless we get a lot of snow, or a lot of rain next spring, we could have some troubles next year. A situation like this could be disastrous in a metropolitan area such as ours that relies upon these lakes, as well as potholes and swamps, as the recharge area for the wells. So let's hope that we get a good supply of moisture so that this water level can get back where it should be.

With all this serious lack of rain it seems strange that we have such a bumper corn crop. Some farmers around the county tell me they are making 100-125 bushels per acre. Last summer I would have said there wouldn't be enough corn to feed the livestock! As we have said before, this is a real tribute to the plant breeders that we have the kind of plants that can resist drought.

**GET RID OF RATS, MICE**

We need to make our buildings

as rat and mouse-proof as possible, by putting tin over all holes, and keeping things clean so they have as little cover as possible. We also suggest using one of two kinds of poison to control rodents, either warfarin or prolin. They both work in the same manner and both do a good job. Buy it from your local dealer, place it in strategic locations, have a little faith in it, and in due time you should be able to rid your place of rats and mice. It goes without saying that this must be done quite properly; follow exactly the instructions on the containers.

As far as insects are concerned, a good spray program is probably the best thing to control them. You might use diazinon, or other related chemicals around the base of buildings where insects might tend to move about. Some of those that try to move to a warm place are crickets, box elder bugs and millipedes (these are tiny black-brown worms that seem to have a million legs). If you are going to use diazinon, spray it on the grass around your buildings, on the foundations and on the stone of the buildings. We suggest that you not spray it on the paint.

**HUNTERS TRESPASSING**

Hunters are out in the woods and open fields looking for game. This article is especially directed to the hunter.

Farmers in all areas, especially

urban areas, have had a disgraceful history on their farms of fences being cut, their animals being killed and an overall attitude of rudeness on the part of hunters. A man was in my office and told me about some hunters who actually stood in his front yard and shot at some rabbits that were quite tame and standing still. We certainly don't know what kind of sportsmanship this is.

The hunter should remember that when he is out in the woods and on someone else's property, he is trespassing. He should also remember that this farmer or a neighbor has had experience with his fences being cut, his animals being shot at, fires being set, cars parked so that the farmer was blocked in, along with a rude attitude on the part of the hunter.

Mr. Hunter, how would you feel if someone trampled your lawn, climbed over the shrubs around your house, spun the wheels of his car in the middle of the front lawn, and was completely rude to your family? Put yourself in this position and then you can see how the farmer feels when

this sort of thing happens to him. When a farmer posts his land so that hunters must stay off, he is not protesting the hunting of game animals. He is protesting defacing and destruction of his property. We suggest to all hunters that they approach a farmer in a gentlemanly fashion and ask his permission to hunt on his land. Assure him that you will leave your car in a place where it will not inconvenience him, and that you will not destroy anything on his farm. If all hunters were to do this they would be surprised how many farmers would say, "by all means, go ahead and hunt."

No farmer is going to tolerate the sort of things we have described here. Can you blame him?

**Ag Census Brings Farm Statistics Up To Date for County**

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Washington county, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 farm census for this county:

There were 1,850 farms in 1959, compared with 2,245 in 1954. The average size of farm was 117.9 acres in 1959, compared with 111.1 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the county's farmers in 1959 was \$13,541,778. The value of all crops sold was \$1,545,830. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$11,995,948.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, census bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and

holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

## Indians Fail to Place Man on All-Conference Team

LARRY AND BOB COULTER NAMED TO SCENIC GRID SECOND TEAM ON DEFENSE

Grafton and Pewaukee, which completely dominated the Scenic Moraine football picture this season, also completely dominated the all-conference selections named by the coaches. Last place Kewaskum failed to place a single player on the 25-man squad selected on the offensive and defensive first team. The Indians had two players, End Larry Coulter and Linebacker Bob Coulter named to the defensive second team.

Runner-up Pewaukee placed eight men in eight positions on the first team, while champion Grafton has several two-way stand-outs in placing five players in seven spots. The 1963 titlist, North Fondy, placed only defensive guard Rod Kresal on the team.

Gary Rogahn, Grafton's 155 lb. passing wizard, led the first team offense and was one of six repeat picks from last year. Others named to the first team for the second successive year were Kevin Pape, Grafton, guard; Tony Larscheidt, Pewaukee, offensive halfback; Ben Forschler, Grafton, defensive end; Joe Arrendondo, Random Lake, defensive halfback, and Kresal.

Pewaukee's touchdown twins, halfbacks Charles Paige and Larscheidt, supply the backfield with explosive power. The pair churned up the turf for over 1,500 yards rushing this season and were very effective on the power sweep. Lyle Demler, only a junior at Random Lake, provides the inside punch for the team, running at fullback.

The first team offensive line is anchored by Pape, who hits like a sledge hammer. Jerry Gleason, Grafton, and John Wolfe, Campbellsport, were effective at keeping blitzing safeties out of their backfields besides being prime receivers from their end positions.

The strength of Grafton's interior line is evident on the first team

defense as Gleason, Forschler and Norm Rennieke hold forth. Kresal, weighing 222 lbs., kept opposing offenses away from his sector and supplied the pass rush as he is a real dandy. Arredondo holds the defensive backfield together and he is joined on the flanks by ball hawks Larry Held, Slinger, and Don Strauss, Pewaukee.

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

### THREE-DAY ANY DEER SEASON OPENS IN COUNTY SATURDAY

The deer season will open in Washington county at 6:27 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 21, and close at 4:28 p. m. Monday, Nov. 23. Hunters will be allowed to kill buck, doe or fawn. Deer killed in Washington county must be registered at one of the following stations prior to transporting outside the county: sheriff's office, West Bend; Hartford police station, Klippel's Market, Richfield, or the Tally Ho Inn at Thompson. Deer killed in Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac or Dodge counties must be registered in the county of kill, do not bring them into Washington county prior to registration.

ALL hunters must wear red clothing during the deer season. It is illegal to carry a rifle of any caliber in any county that has a shotgun season for deer. (Rabbit, squirrel and raccoon hunters must use a shotgun with fine shot). It is illegal to possess any shotshell loaded with single slug or ball except during the gun season for deer and bear.

### Nine-Day State Deer Hunt Opens; List Safety Rules

Wisconsin's annual deer hunt opens Saturday morning, Nov. 21, at 6:27 a. m. and continues for 9 days through Nov. 29.

During deer season there are more hunters in the woods than at any other one time. We sell about 325,000 deer hunting licenses and the season is relatively short.

You can see the stage is set for hunting accidents unless every hunter uses a lot of caution and common sense.

While only 8 persons were killed by gunfire during the 1963 deer season, 22 were injured. Every hunting accident could be prevented. They are due to carelessness probably caused to a great degree by the excitement of the hunt. Such things as the victim being out of sight of the shooter, being mistaken for game, loading or unloading a gun, stumbled or fell, didn't know the gun was loaded, are the most common causes of hunting accidents.

Every hunter must agree that each of us has an obligation to prevent hunting accidents. The ten

commandments of shooting safety are:

1. TREAT EVERY GUN WITH THE RESPECT DUE A LOADED GUN.
2. WATCH THAT MUZZLE! Carry your gun safely; keep safety on until ready to shoot.
3. UNLOAD GUNS WHEN NOT IN USE, take down or have actions open; guns should be carried in cases to shooting area.
4. BE SURE BARREL IS CLEAR OF OBSTRUCTIONS, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the gun you carry.
5. BE SURE OF TARGET BEFORE YOU PULL TRIGGER: know identifying features of game you hunt.
6. NEVER POINT A GUN AT ANYTHING YOU DO NOT WANT TO SHOOT; avoid all horseplay.
7. NEVER CLIMB A TREE OR FENCE OR JUMP A DITCH WITH A LOADED GUN; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
8. NEVER SHOOT A BULLET AT A FLAT, HARD SURFACE OR WATER; at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.
9. STORE GUNS AND AMMUNITION SEPARATELY, beyond reach of children.
10. AVOID ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES before or during shooting.

Remember them and practice them and hunting accidents will decrease.
