Mrs. Charles E. Reigle Dies Unexpectedly

WIFE OF REGAL WARE, INC. EXECUTIVE SUCCEUMS AT HOME TUESDAY EVENING

Mrs. Charles E. Reigle of 1305 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, whose husband is vice-president of Regal Ware, Inc., passed away unexpectedly at her home on Tuesday evening, Dec. 1, three days before her birthday. She would have reached the age of 51 years on Dec. 4.

Mrs. Reigle, the former Irene Wilson, was born Dec. 4, 1913, at Selma, Ala., a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jessie Morgan Wilson. She moved from Selma to Canton, Ohio, in 1933. She was married to Charles E. Reigle on March 25, 1943, and they moved to Kewaskum in 1945, residing here for the past 19 years.

Surviving are her husband, four sisters, Mrs. Estelle Thompson of Birmingham, Ala., Mrs. J. J. Manderson, Mrs. E. V. Christian and Mrs. Mannie Arnold, all of Napersville, Ala.; five brothers, Louis, Raymond and Horace Wilson, all of Birmingham, Ala., I. D. Wilson of Pensacola, Fla. and Roland E. Wilson of Salem, Ala. She is further survived by brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law and many other relatives. Her parents and two brothers, James and Jack Wilson, preceded her in death. The latter brother, of Kewaskum, lost his life only a few weeks ago, on Oct. 30, in an auto accident near Chadron, Nebr. while returning here from a hunting trip in Wyoming.

Mrs. Reigle was a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 3 to 9 p. m. on Thursday, Dec. 3, after which it was taken to Spiker's Funeral home in Canton, Ohio, where funeral services will be held at 1 p. m. Saturday, Dec. 5. Dr. Otto Gerber will officiate and the services and burial will be in Forest Hills cemetery at Canton.



2 Local Drivers Hurt in Crashes

Several traffic mishaps occurred over the weekend involving Kewaskum drivers and vehicles. Two of the drivers were injured in the crashes.

Ann A. Schaefer, 19, of Kewaskum suffered a neck injury at 3:05 p. m. Sunday when the auto she was driving was struck in the left rear by the right fender of a car driven by Gerald Stern, 26, of West Bend. The mishap occurred as Miss Schaefer started to make a right turn into the driveway of the former Donald Backhaus farm (recently purchased by Russ Krueger and Henry Timblin) on the Kewaskum hill on Hwy. 45. The Schaefer vehicle crossed the road and went into a field following the impact. Stern said he saw the directional light of the other car but could not turn in time to avoid striking it.

A car driven by Kenneth Cudnochoske, 34, of R. 1, Kewaskum, went into the ditch on Hwy. W about a half mile north of Kohlsville when a tire on the car blew out early Sunday and the driver lost control.

James R. Coplin, 18, of Menomonee Falls suffered a right arm cut in a three vehicle crash on STH 45 near Jackson at 12:49 a. m. last Friday. The mishap reportedly occurred when a car driven by Herman J. Jahner, 20, of Milwaukee overtook an auto driven by David L. Janik, 18, of Menomonee Falls as the vehicles traveled south. Jahner braked and swerved to his left, striking the rear of the Janik auto and then colliding with a Fairmont Foods truck of Kewaskum which was approaching and was driven by John P. Schield, 25, of West Bend.

Perry H. Harris, 17, of R. 2, Ke-

waskum, suffered head injuries at 12:20 p. m. last Thursday when the brakes on his car apparently failed as the vehicle entered a curve and the car left the road and struck two posts, a mail box, a boulder and flipped over and came to rest on its wheels on a lawn on the N. River rd. about .1 of a mile north of West Bend.

In another recent accident two drivers were injured at night when a car struck some dairy cattle on the Wallace Lake rd. at the Buffer rd. and a following auto then collided with the disabled vehicle. The mishap occurred when a car operated by Larry R. Fahney, 19, of R. 2, West Bend, struck a dairy animal, which was killed, wrecking his car. An auto operated by Richard T. Hahn, 18, of R. 1, Kewaskum, which was following, then struck the Fahney vehicle. Fahney suffered a possible head injury and Hahn a left arm injury.

Fruity Cranberry Bread



Gay looking Cranberry Bread is a boon to the homemaker during the holidays. Keep several loaves on hand, for they'll prove to be the answer to many an emergency. Drop-in guests? Cranberry bread and a beverage will make a delightful afternoon or late-night snack. A gift you forgot to buy? Wrap a loaf in pretty Christmas paper. Wishing Godspeed to a departing guest? Tuck a loaf in his bag. Want a quick dessert? Top with whipped cream mixed with whole berry cranberry sauce.

Cranberry Bread

- 1 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup mashed ripe banana (2 to 3)
- 1 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 cup cubes Ocean Spray Jellied Cranberry Sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Sift together flour, soda, cream of tartar, and salt. Beat shortening until creamy. Add sugar gradually, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add flour mixture alternately with bananas, 1/4 at a time, stirring only until flour is moistened. Very carefully fold in cranberry sauce cubes and chopped nuts. Turn into a well-greased loaf pan (9x5x3) and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., about 1 hour, or until bread is done. Makes 1 loaf.

County Agent News Notes

COUNTY CONSERVATION SPEAKING CONTEST

The extension office would like to invite any adult who would like to participate to enter the Washington county conservation speaking contest, to be held Jan. 5.

The Wisconsin Association of Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors sponsors a state contest every year, and each county has a local contest in order to find the entries eligible for the state contest. There are four divisions — junior, youth, college and adult.

This notice is made primarily to appeal to adults, although anyone else who would like to enter may do so in their proper division. We know many farmers, school teachers and others who would be very good candidates.

If you would like to investigate this further, call the office and we will send you a brochure containing the rules and regulations, a copy of the scoring sheet, and an entry blank.

"I LIKE SCRUB COWS"

A few weeks ago I read a short piece in another paper that should set a dairyman to thinking. We could summarize it by saying, "I like scrub cows."

Everyone picks on the poor scrub cows because they are not producing like they should.

But scrub cows are important. They give employment every day in the year to the farmer who owns them.

They consume generous amounts of hay and grain, grow fat and sleek, and thus become a thing of beauty. And why shouldn't they, as there is no work involved in what they are doing.

Surely, she helps reduce the farmer's income tax. This is even more true when there are several of them in the herd.

Scrub cows are a luxury, and of

course every dairyman is entitled to as many luxuries as he can support.

Some people say that scrub cows should be sold to the butcher and right away. But this is being hard-hearted.

Besides, people who have their cows on test say that it takes only three good cows to support one scrub cow.

A man from a lending agency said that the small amount of milk the scrub cow contributes can justly be called "the milk of human kindness" because only human kindness allows her to exist.

A scrub cow produces varying amount of milk—usually the least amount.

The fortunate thing about owning scrub cows is that they are very often hard to identify. The dairyman can make some guesses, but nothing more.

If you think you have a few scrub cows in your herd, don't admit it. Not even to yourself. Keep them in your herd, because they make the good cows look even better.

And always remember — they give you a little exercise to take care of them. You don't have anything more important to do.

This has been written in jest, of course. But it calls attention to a philosophy behind sound dairying practices. When a farmer has to pay the kind of money that he does today for tractors, machinery and other farm equipment, including cows, it stands to reason that only those cows in his herd that are good producers can possibly help him pay the bills.

Good cows are an asset; poor cows are a liability. The more we can do to improve our assets and cut down our liabilities, the better off we are. This is just sound economics.

9 MONTHS OF WINTER AND 3 MONTHS OF POOR SLEIGHING

Farmers really should not hate the cold and snow that will plague us from now until spring. Someone once said that Wisconsin is the country where we get nine months of winter and three

months of poor sleighing. But this is not all that bad. While we hate to get out in the cold blustery mornings to do whatever we have to do, and while it probably costs a little more to operate during the winter, and the personal comfort of ourselves is not quite as good, there are advantages to be considered.

The winter is a good time to rejuvenate the soil. We are getting adequate amounts of moisture back into the soil if we have a good amount of snow. So the next time you have to shovel your way out of a heavy snowfall, remember that every inch of that snow will soak into your fields which need it for the coming crop.

Another thing to consider is that disease and insect cycles are broken in the very cold temperatures we have in Wisconsin. If this didn't happen, some of these things would continue to build up until soon we would have so many insects that man would have to go to great extremes to find ways of protecting himself. Cold winters break these cycles. This is one of the reasons we are not bothered with hog cholera in Wisconsin. Many of these disease organisms are frozen out and eliminated during the course of the winter.

One more thing, this is also a good time for farmers who have a good warm shop to bring in their machinery and get it repaired.

All these things won't make it one bit easier to shovel the snow, to brace yourself against the extreme cold, and pay the added

bills. But considering a few advantages of these extremes may make it a more enjoyable time.

COUNTY'S FINAL 3-DAY DEER TALLY WAS 343

The final tally for the three-day any deer season in Washington county was 343 animals registered at the four check stations. The 1963 registration for the county showed a tally of 224.

The car kill this year to date is 85 animals, up 24 over the 1963 car kill. In addition one fawn was killed with a hay mower and a number were found in the woods shot by bird hunters in October.

Lakes are beginning to freeze over and ice fishing will soon start. The 1964 regulations are in effect until Dec. 31, 1964. New regulations will be out soon. However, they do not take effect until Jan. 1, 1965.

Safety Tips for Ice Fishermen To Prevent Drowning Tragedies

Each year at about this time many wardens are called upon to locate and remove the bodies of drowning victims from our lakes and streams.

Like the investigation of hunting accidents this also is an unpleasant task to say the least. Like the hunting accident victims these people are victims of a preventable accident.

It's very disheartening to read where 3 or 4 people drowned in the same car after it broke through the ice, and to make it worse many times they are members of the same family.

The natural question is well how can these tragedies be prevented? The answer COMMON SENSE.

Here are a few simple tips:

1. Don't be the first brave soul to venture out onto the ice with your car unless you have tested the entire line of travel.

2. Never cross a known crack on larger lakes without first investigating its condition.

3. Stay away from areas of current such as springs, outlets and inlets of lakes, channels and points.

4. Investigate before crossing any dark unnatural appearing areas or the causes of water above the ice.

A great deal of fun can be had by young and old alike at this time of the year, but please use good judgment.

Major Hunting Season Over

With the end of the deer season last weekend, the major hunting season is over. There are, however, hunting opportunities still available for those of you who have not had your fill.

The ruffed grouse season is open through Dec. 15 south of Highway 64.

The squirrel season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1965.

The rabbit season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1965.

The raccoon season in the state is open through Dec. 31, 1964.

For you bow and arrow hunters, all counties are open for bow and arrow deer hunting from Dec. 5 through 31.

One word of caution, if you participate in the late hunting—each year a considerable number of hunters find themselves in difficulty because of shooting illegal game. Pheasants, especially, seem to be a great temptation. When these birds have been smart enough or lucky enough to have made it through the season, they should be saved for the very important breeding season in the spring. The public and the courts

frown on the illegal hunting and fines in most instances run very high.



DEER KILL IN STATE REACHES OVER 89,000

Miss Margie Kirsch of R. 2, Campbellsport, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Kirsch, shot a 7-point buck Saturday morning while hunting in the Clear Lake area in northern Wisconsin. This was the first time she ever went hunting.

Washington county's final deer registration total for the three-day any deer season, according to Warden Bob Lake, was 343. This compared with the 1963 count of 224 and set a new record.

An unusual sidelight of the deer season included the bagging of a deer with a Civil War musket. Joe Hashek, R. 2, West Bend, used an 1857 Springfield, .58 caliber muzzle loader in getting his 150 pound buck Saturday morning in the Beechwood area. Joe is a member of the Second Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry (Civil War outfit), which is a member of the North-South Skirmish association.

One of the most successful parties in this area was a group of nine hunters who bagged eight deer in the Kohlsville and Wayne areas over the opening weekend. The hunters who contributed to about 1,000 pounds of venison were: Hibbie Hogerst, Jerry Staeh-

ler, Don and Alan Schulz, Jim and Eugene Bartelt, Herman Dunst and Bob and Dick Burckardt.

If we listed the names of successful hunters in the surrounding area and north woods who came home with deer, the list would be endless. Locker plants and markets were swamped with business.

Wisconsin deer hunters bagged more than 89,000 deer during the nine-day season which ended Sunday. The count reached 89,236 Wednesday, two days after the deadline for registrations. But J. R. Smith, state game division chief, warned that we still have too many deer to survive a hard winter. The conservation department estimated the state deer herd at more than half a million animals at the start of the season. This would leave 410,764 deer still at large in the state.
