## Local Young Woman, 2 Girls Hurt in Crashes

A young woman and two teenage girls from Kewaskum were hospitalized over the weekend with injuries suffered in two separate auto crashes.

Mrs. Jim (Delores) Hammes of 1306 Fond du Lac ave. was the most seriously injured and is still a patient at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. She suffered a broken right collar bone, broken right little finger, cut above her ear and multiple bruises over her body. The mishap occurred at 7:45 p. m. Saturday when her car left County Trunk Hwy. V about 3½ miles north of Kewaskum and rolled over down an embankment at the Roger Schleif farm. Mrs. Hammes crawled out of the car and made her way to the Otto Weddig home nearby for assistance.

Officer Dan Sondergard of Fond du Lac county, who investigated, said that Mrs. Hammes told him she thought she was traveling too fast on the rain-soaked road and attempted to slow down the car. It skidded out of control, however, broke through a metal guard rail and tumbled down a steep embankment. Mrs. Hammes was alone in the car, which was demolished.

Misses Linda Esterline, 16, Meadow Lane, and Charlotte Olson, 15, 131 Main st., Kewaskum, and their companions, Gordon Miller, 18, and Wayne Koefler, both of Menomonee Falls, were removed to Memorial Community hospital, Menomonee Falls, with injuries suffered in a two car crash at the intersection of Good Hope road and Pilgrim road near that city Sunday night.

Miss Olson suffered a laceration to her chin which required the taking of seven stitches, chipped tooth, cut inside her mouth, other cuts and bruises; Miss Esterline a cut on her left leg which required two stitches, slight brain concussion, cuts and bruises; Miller cuts on the face and chest and leg injuries, and Koefler a severe laceration to his right leg and knee which required 52 stitches and arm injuries, according to the girls. Miss Olson and Koefler were removed to the hospital by ambulance and the other two in cars. All were released after treatment except Miss Esterline, who remained at the hospital until Tuesday. Two occupants in the other car sustained minor injuries.

Miss Eugenia Sadownikow, 19, of Cedarburg, formerly of Kewaskum, daughter of Mrs. Norman Rauch of this village, suffered cuts and bruises at 6:10 a. m. Tuesday when she apparently lost control of her car while making a right hand curve on the Beaver Dam road northwest of Newburg. The car skidded to the left and went off the road and struck a tree. Miss Sadownikow is employed at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum.

## Kurt Schmidt, 9, Wounded in Leg By Rifle Bullet

Kurt Schmidt, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Schmidt of R. 2, Kewaskum, who reside on Hwy. 45 about a half mile south of the village, was released from St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, on Tuesday after being confined there for treatment of a wound in his left thigh after being struck in the leg by a .22 caliber rifle bullet last Saturday afternoon.

According to Juvenile Officer Hugh Carpenter of Washington county, who was called to investigate the incident, the Schmidt boy was accidentally struck by the bullet while helping his father and uncle, Ray Klein, who were working on the Klein farm. Due to the bullet being imbedded so deeply in the fleshy part of the thigh, it was not removed.

Two Kewaskum youths, 17 and 16 years of age, who were walking along the railroad tracks near the farm and were firing .22 caliber rifles in the area, were questioned by authorities, but denied firing the shot which struck Kurt.

## Cancer Crusade To Get Underway In County Apr. 21

The annual "Crusade Against Cancer," educational and fund raising program of the American Cancer society, will begin in local communities next week, April 21, according to Guido Schroeder, chairman of the Washington county unit.

General co-chairmen coordinating the county-wide neighbor-to-neighbor and direct mail phases of the campaign are Richard C. Klein, West Bend; Warren E. Coultas, West Bend, and Robert J. Dillon, Hartford.

D. J. Kenny, West Bend, and Hon. L. E. Buckley, Hartford, are chairmen for special gifts including business, professional and industry.

Schroeder urged all residents to read and heed the advice offered in the educational leaflets, noting particularly the seven danger signals. "Fifty per cent of cancer can be cured if recognized in time and given proper treatment," he stated, "but continued research is needed to put an end to the incurable cancers." "Our people have always contributed generously for that purpose," he commented.

A total of \$9,547 was raised in last year's crusade drive, a record high total in the county unit's more than 20-year history. Township, village and ward chairmen will be announced at a later date.



### POSTMASTERS AUTHORIZED TO ADMINISTER OATH TO JOB CORPS ENROLLEES

Postmasters (and assistant postmasters, if applicable) are being authorized, when requested, to administer the oath of office to Job Corps enrollees without charge, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski informed Postmaster Harry E. Koch today.

Job Corps, a major youth program in the President's War on Poverty, assists young men and women 16 through 21 who are out of school and out of work by providing them with the necessary education and work skills which will make them more employable.

Mr. Gronouski said that requests had been received from the Office of Economic Opportunity, which operates the Job Corps program, asking the department to take this action, enabling enrollees to travel as federal employees entitled to free transportation to assigned duty stations.

If enrollees are not sworn in before traveling to a center, they must pay their own transportation, which would mean a hardship for most of the Job Corps enrollees.

Under the new procedure, Mr. Gronouski has ordered provisions inserted in the postal manual, enabling all of the approximately 34,000 postmasters to administer the oath of office to the Job Corpsmen in or near their home towns.

"We are pleased to be able to do this and happy that our facilities which cover the country—make it possible for us to lend a hand in this vital program," Mr. Gronouski said.

**Swine Grading Program Held by County Breeders**

**LEE BECKER OF KEWASKUM CHAIRMAN OF ASSOCIATION**

Recently we had a fine swine program in the county sponsored by the Washington County Swine Breeders association. Incidentally, the officers of this organization are Lee Becker, Kewaskum, chairman, and Joe Ghilani, Slinger, vice-chairman.

Nine pigs were brought to Youngbauer's swine barn at Boltonville Monday morning, where they were weighed and graded. We estimated the back fat, the carcass length, and the loin eye. Monday afternoon these hogs were butchered and put in the cooler. Tuesday morning the same people, and others, were able to see these hogs as carcass. Then we actually measured the back fat, carcass length, and loin eye, and gave them a carcass grade.

Fred Giesler of the University of Wisconsin meat and animal science department worked with the breeders in the live hog class, and Quin Kilb of the same department worked with the breeders in the carcass class. The men were quite surprised to see how close Fred Giesler came in estimating the back fat, carcass length, and loin eye.

The top carcass in this group of nine pigs was a Berkshire brought in by George Janz. This pig weighed 220 lbs., it had a back fat of 1.3 inches, a carcass length of 28.8 inches, and a loin eye area of 4.65 square inches. It graded a high 1 as a carcass.

The second high carcass was a Yorkshire brought in by Lee Becker. This had 1.4 inches of back fat, the carcass was 30.5 inches in length, and the loin eye area was

4.4 square inches. It likewise graded a high 1. George Janz brought in the number 3 pig, another Berkshire with back fat 1.4, carcass length 29.9, and loin eye area 4.4 square inches, and again graded a number 1.

Other people who brought pigs were Walter Hassinger with Poland China; Orin Kirchner, Duroc Jersey; Dick Roembke, Yorkshire, and Howard Proeber with a Hampshire-Yorkshire cross.

These were the kind of pigs that anyone would be happy to purchase. But in this kind of a competitive class, and the competition being what it was, they couldn't all win. The reason for this program is to upgrade the quality of swine that is being sold in our state today. The quality of pigs has increased a great deal in the past 10 years, simply because there has been somebody in the field who has been pushing hard to improve the breeding stock available. The program that was held last week is a good indication that such a program is under way.

**EASTER'S A TIME FOR GIVING**



Easy-to-make coconut candies are excellent for filling Easter baskets. These, using flaked or packaged grated coconut, require a minimum of cooking and youngsters will love shaping them and putting on the finishing touches. To make Prune-Coconut Candy, bring 1 cup prunes to a boil; then drain, pit, and put through the food grinder with 3/4 cup flaked coconut. Add 1/2 teaspoon each of grated lemon and orange rind and about 4 teaspoons orange juice, enough for easy handling. Mix well and shape into small balls; put a miniature marshmallow in the center and roll balls in packaged grated coconut. Another easy candy recipe is this:

**Chocolate Bonbons**

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup instant powdered cream
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 package (6 oz.) Baker's Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chips
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 1/2 cups (about) flaked coconut

Combine sugar, flour, salt, and powdered cream in saucepan. Add butter, egg yolks, and water and mix well. Cook and stir over low heat until mixture becomes very thick - about 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Add chocolate chips and extracts, stirring until chocolate melts. Cool to room temperature. Drop from teaspoon into coconut. Form balls. Chill. Makes about 36 bonbons.


Kiwanis, which celebrates its own golden anniversary this year, has grown up simultaneously in

### County Agent News Notes

#### GRASS FIRE HAZARDS

High winds of the spring season, along with very dry grass on some of the idle land of Washington county and surrounding areas, could cause serious problems. Just imagine what could happen if a cigarette is flipped into the wind, then maybe carried and dropped by a bird onto tinder dry grass.

If the wind is as strong as it can be in the spring of the year, we can have a roaring inferno headed straight for somebody's buildings or other property, which can cause tremendous damage, even loss of life.

West Bend Fire Chief Carl Peters recommends that all land owners take extreme precautions during this season, especially those who have fields with long grass accumulated from last fall or seasons before. Mr. Peters recommends that all people who have this situation get a field chopper in there and chop that grass and blow it right back on the field. Then as the green grass shoots come up they will have less competition, and in no time at all the field will be green, thus eliminating a fire hazard.

Even if you make two or three swaths around your field, you will do some good. A fire lane of 20 feet or more would help to eliminate a fire hazard. Do this especially along the roadside where damage is more prevalent as a re-

sult of carelessly thrown cigarettes.

Please give your careful attention to this, it is very important.

#### FARMING IN GERMANY

Last week Dietrich Schlueter, Germantown, returned from a visit to his mother's home in Germany. I saw him the day after he got back, and while he was happy about the visit, he was glad to get back to his own farm. As time goes on, we're going to report some of his reactions to his homeland, because it might be information that many of you would like to have.

Dietrich's interest of course was agriculture. He indicates that farming is booming in Germany; however, one man does not operate as many acres of land in that country as they do here. In spite of all the modern equipment they have, and they do have it, one man operates perhaps only 50 acres and probably has some hired help, compared to our country where one man can operate up to 200 acres and do a pretty good job. He indicated they have tractors,

pipeline milkers, and many other new kinds of equipment characteristic of our own agricultural operation.

They don't have quite the quality of milk that we have because they don't have the inspection program. And their entire feeding program is quite different. Dietrich said he found a man who was making corn silage for his dairy herd, and this was unheard of at the time Dietrich lived in Germany, because the climate is so cold that corn does not thrive.

He also said that there isn't nearly enough labor available in Germany to do the things that the economy indicates ought to be done. I guess when everything is considered, we have to agree that the German people deserve a lot of credit for being able to pick themselves up by the bootstraps, so to speak, when 20 years ago they were a nation defeated—militarily, and in economy and morale.

It is often surprising to find what heights may be reached by remaining on the level.

**County Education Association Holds Monthly Meeting**

**ELIZABETH LUDWIG OF UW-M IS GUEST SPEAKER**

The Washington County Education Association (W.C.E.A.) held their April meeting in the court house annex in West Bend. Miss Elizabeth A. Ludwig, chairman of the department of physical education, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, was the guest speaker. Miss Ludwig's speech was based on physical education in grades K-12, centering most of her speech on the elementary level.

Miss Ludwig began by stating that basic movement education is the foundation upon which all the areas of physical education are built. It is the aim of basic movement education to help children become aware of their own potentials for moving effectively in all aspects of living. Fundamentals of movement are taught and built upon so that children develop an awareness of each part of the body as it moves through space, with variations in time and force. Children are taught to use their bodies with power and economy of movement; they are assisted in determining the degree of effort required for easy, fluent and efficient performance of the particular movement task they have undertaken.

Another objective of the physical education program is an understanding of rhythm. Changes of rhythm are produced by changing the time or force of a movement.

Miss Ludwig went on to say that awareness of the different parts of the body are also important. In order that the child may become aware of his own powers of movement, he must be conscious not only of his whole body in movement, but of each separate part, and what power that particular part has.

It was also stated that a creative-problem-solving approach to teaching is recommended for basic

movement education. Children can also be taught how to handle their bodies safely on apparatus such as climbing equipment, vaulting bars and the like if this approach is instituted.

Miss Ludwig also said that basic movement education is fundamental to the teaching of dance. Because dance is one of the communicating arts, a knowledge of the vocabulary of movement is essential to good performance.

One of Miss Ludwig's films, "Modern Concepts of Physical Education," was viewed by the association. It showed the physical education program of some of the schools of England.

Miss Ludwig had much to offer to the teachers in the light of a good physical education program.

An open discussion followed the very interesting speech of Miss Ludwig's.

#### Help Protect the Canada Goose

We again find ourselves asking for your help as we have many times in the past. It involves one of wildlife's most majestic and beautiful species—the Canada goose. This very valuable bird is particularly vulnerable to the gun of the greedy and the violator during its spring migration north to nest.

Because it presents itself as a target many times daily in search of food and resting areas, it is a species very difficult to protect. During the migratory flights this bird requires more food to sustain itself; and it is difficult at best during this crucial time of the year when food is not readily available without the added factors of predators and losses from illegal hunting.

The violator is aware of the fact that the warden is one man in a very large area. The warden must concentrate his activities in a relatively small area and spend many hours from daylight until dark during the spring attempting to observe the suspected subject actually making a kill. However, with your help the percentages become more favorable as far as protection is concerned.

It's a proven fact that game hogs curtail their illegal activities drastically when they know the public will not tolerate his kind.

Contestants bowl in their own age groups, boys against boys, girls against girls, according to these groups: Preps—youngsters through age 12; Juniors—13 through 15;


