## Nancy Held Awarded Degree at Lawrence

Nancy Held, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Held, 361 First st., Kewaskum, was among a group of 280 candidates for the bachelor's degree at Lawrence university's 116th commencement on June 13 at Appleton.

This was the first graduation ceremony since Lawrence resumed the designation of university, by which it was known for the first 64 years of its history. From 1914 until 1964 it was known as Lawrence college, but the merger with Milwaukee-Downer college last July caused the earlier name to be re-adopted. President Curtis W. Tarr, 12th head of Lawrence, presented the degrees.

Speakers for the weekend were Wisconsin Governor Warren Knowles, who presented the commencement address, and the Rev. Mr. J. Ellsworth Kalas, pastor of the First Methodist church of Madison, Wis., who preached the baccalaureate sermon.

Two girls from Kewaskum are among the 450 high school girls from throughout Wisconsin participating in the 22nd session of Badger Girls' State June 12-19 on the University of Wisconsin campus, Madison.

Co-sponsored by the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary and the UW Extension political science department, the girls spend the week learning about government on city, county and state levels in a program designed to prepare them for their future responsibilities as citizens. The girls, all seniors-to-be in Wisconsin high schools, have been selected by school officials on the basis of leadership, scholarship and character. Each is sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary or a civic group in her home town.

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

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
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### Local Post Office To Work With 'VISTA' Program

The Kewaskum post office will cooperate with the Office of Economic Opportunity in the recruitment program of "VISTA" (Volunteers in Service to America) workers by making application blanks available at all first class post offices, Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced today.

In compliance with a request from OEO Director Sargent Shriver, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski made supplies of the applications available at the Kewaskum post office and the other 4,441 first class offices by June 14. OEO will supply the application blanks and reimburse the department for costs involved.

The applications for the positions—containing simple, routine questions, (name, address, ZIP code, education, marital status, citizenship, etc.)—are single-sheet prepaid "self mailers."

A minimum age of 18 is specified with no maximum. The initial period of employment is one year, including a 4-6 training period, and service may be extended for two additional periods of one year for a total of three years.

Mr. Gronouski emphasized, in telling Postmaster Koch of this cooperative effort, that while every effort will be made to assist applicants in getting the blanks and mailing them (to VISTA, Office of Economic Opportunity, Washington, D. C. 20506—attention of Division of Evaluation and Placement) questions on details of the program should be addressed to "VISTA Recruitment" at the Office of Economic Opportunity in Washington.

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
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


