## Firemen's Picnic and Badger Ass'n. Tournament Here July 10-11 Will Feature Biggest Parade Ever Held

### 13 Bands and Drum Corps, Hundreds of Firemen to March

**22 FIRE DEPARTMENTS TO COMPETE IN TOURNAMENT CONTESTS SATURDAY EVE AND PARADE SUNDAY FOR MORE THAN \$335 IN PRIZES**

This year's annual Kewaskum firemen's picnic on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 10 and 11, will be highlighted by the biggest parade in Kewaskum's history and should also break all attendance records if the weather is good. In conjunction with this year's picnic, the local fire department will also be host to the Badger Firemen's association tournament.

The Badger association is comprised of 22 fire departments from Belgium, Boltonville, Brown Deer, Campbellsport, Cedarburg, Fillmore, Fredonia, Germantown, Glendale, Grafton, Jackson, Kewaskum, Menomonee Falls, Mequon, Newburg, Port Washington, Random Lake, Saukville, Slinger, Thiensville, Waubesa and West Bend. Firemen from most of the above departments will be competing in the tournament contests Saturday evening for \$189.00 in cash prizes and in the parade Sunday for approximately \$150.00 in cash prizes. Being the host department, Kewaskum will not enter the competition this year.

By far the main feature of the event will be a really outstanding parade on Sunday at 12:30 p. m. sharp. To date the parade committee (there are separate committees for the parade, entertainment, tickets, booklet printed, advertising, water fights, contests, etc.) has 13 bands and drum and bugle corps engaged to participate in the parade. These include the Kewaskum, Random Lake, Campbellsport and Germantown high school bands, Cedarburg Civic band, Germantown Community band, famous Milwaukee Continental Cadet band, Watertown Twirlettes, Sheboyganites band, Buccaneers drum and bugle corps and The Accents all girl band, all of Sheboygan; K. Y. Warriors band of Oshkosh, and Marquis drum and bugle corps of Fond du Lac. There will also be at least two other musical organizations making a total of 15.

The bands and drum and bugle corps alone will enter about 500 people in the parade and will bring to town more than 1,000 persons with their wives, husbands and families. There will also be hundreds of visiting firemen from the various departments marching in the parade for prizes and with their equipment. Most of these men will also be accompanied by wives and families, accounting for many more hundreds of people. These are all in addition to the regular attendance at the picnic, which surely will also be larger than ever with the tournament being held here and bigger and better parade.

In addition to the numerous above musical organizations and visiting firemen, there will be all

of the other usual units in the parade. There will be much antique fire equipment as well as new and modern engines and equipment, many floats, American Legion units, numerous comedy entries, old cars, horses, dozens of children's specialties, scouts, 4-H clubs, organizations, orchestras, and many, many other groups. Approximately \$100 in prize money will also be awarded to the best floats, children's decorated buggies, wagons, bikes, trikes and other group and individual units. All kiddies entering will also be given tickets good in trade in the park. A number of the bands and drum corps will play and entertain in the park immediately following the parade.

Because of its size this year, the parade will form at the high school grounds, where there is plenty of space on the parking lots, athletic fields and streets. The line of march will proceed from there to Second st., west on Second to Fond du Lac ave., south on Fond du Lac to Main, east on Main to Riverview, and south on Riverview to the park.

The tournament contests will be held at 7 p. m. Saturday with the drawing for places starting at 6:30 p. m. and all departments in the association are eligible to enter. The three contests will be as follows. No. 1—Gas Mask Rescue. Team: 1 man (from each participating department); prizes \$20, \$15, \$10, \$7, \$5—total \$57. No. 2—Individual Bucket and Ladder Climbing. (No more than three men to be entered from participating departments); prizes \$20, \$15, \$10, \$7, \$5—total \$57. No. 3—Relay Coupling Races. Team: 4 men (only 1 team from participating departments); prizes \$25, \$20, \$15, \$10, \$5—total \$75. Departments entering at least two of the three contests will receive a \$5.00 minimum for entering. The proper rules will be given the night of the contest by the judges. The contests will be held next to the river, below the park hill. The picnic in the park will continue throughout the evening.

Sunday's festivities will open with the huge parade. Floats and children's specialties will be judged from the street for prizes. Each member fire department marching is paid off according to the number of men in the parade. Usually there are about 300 firemen entered for a total of approximately \$150 in prizes.

Entertainment will be provided in the park afternoon and evening by The Michaels, sensational acrobatic balancing act, and De Yip Loo, amazing magical mirthquake, free of charge from the stage. There will be water fights at 6:30 p. m. with several neighboring fire departments competing.

This year's picnic will also have more rides, five in all. There will be three kiddie rides and two teenage rides. There will also be the customary concessions, games, amusements, refreshments, delicious bratwurst and hamburgers.

## J. Van Blarcom, Former Official, Businessman Dies

Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Monday, June 28, from Miller's Funeral home and at 10 a. m. at Holy Trinity church for John P. Van Blarcom, 63, a resident of 224 Main st., Kewaskum, for many years, who passed away Thursday evening, June 24, at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where he had been removed several hours before by ambulance after suffering an attack at his home. He had been ailing with asthma for several years. The Rev. John T. Budde, pastor, officiated and burial took place in Calvary cemetery, Fond du Lac. Prior to the services friends called at the funeral home from 2 p. m. Sunday.

Mr. Van Blarcom was born Dec. 13, 1901, at Boltonville, a son of the late John and Addie O'Brien Van Blarcom. He was married to the former Frances Raether on Nov. 12, 1928 and lived most of his life in Beechwood and Kewaskum. He was in the plumbing and heating business in Kewaskum and also operated the Gambles store for several years before becoming a rural mail carrier, which position he held at the time of his death. Mr. Van Blarcom formerly served for several years as a village trustee in Kewaskum, was a member and past secretary of the Washington County Rural Letter Carriers association, and a member of Holy Trinity church.

Mr. Van Blarcom was the father of three children, two of whom preceded him in death. A son Bruce died at the age of seven years and a daughter Nancy died in infancy. Surviving are the widow, one son, John P. Van Blarcom, Jr. of Garden Grove, Calif., one daughter-in-law, Phronsis Van Blarcom; four grandsons, Steven T. John P., Michael T. and Timothy C. Van Blarcom, all of Garden Grove, Calif.; his father-in-law, Charles Raether, of Kewaskum; the following aunts and uncles: Mrs. Zita Hurley of Escondido, Calif., Joseph O'Brien of Milwaukee, Louis Reed of Plymouth, Mrs. Addie Bowen of Fond du Lac, and Frank Reed of Stevens Point, and many cousins and friends.

## 3 Local Youths Hurt When Auto Hits Tree

Three Kewaskum youths were injured at 1:30 a. m. Sunday when a car driven by Robert J. Miller, 18, of 215 Main st., Kewaskum, left County Trunk Hwy. D. about three miles east of New Fane and four miles southwest of Beechwood, and struck a tree.

Miller suffered a cut left cheek, his brother, Michael, 16, sustained bruises and another passenger in the car, 16-year-old Christie L. Heberer of R. I. Kewaskum (New Fane), suffered a fractured jaw, tongue and head injuries.

The three were reported on their way home after already taking a fourth passenger, Bernadine Fellenz, to her home about a mile east of the scene of the mishap. Miller was proceeding west on the highway when the car he was driving, owned by his uncle, Joe Schmitt, left the road, struck the tree and came to rest in a ditch facing the opposite direction. The right side of the auto was demolished.

The injured were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. The Miller boys were released the same day, while Miss Heberer was transferred to the Milwaukee hospital on Monday.

The Miller brothers were star athletes at Kewaskum Community High school the past year, Bob as a senior and Mike as a sophomore.

## Appoint 2 Local Men to Watershed Advisory Group

**PETERSON, ROMAINE NAMED BY REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION**

George C. Berteau, chairman of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) this week announced the creation and appointment of a Milwaukee River Watershed Advisory Committee, composed of prominent local public officials and interested citizen leaders from three counties.

Berteau said, "The Commission's action in the creation of this committee resulted from previous requests by the common council of the city of Milwaukee and the Milwaukee County Board that the SEWRPC inaugurate as soon as practical a comprehensive study of the Milwaukee river watershed in cooperation with federal, state, and local agencies, to develop plans for immediate and long-range solutions to the many water-related problems of the river valley.

"The function of the Milwaukee River Watershed Advisory Committee will be to draft and recommend a comprehensive planning program for the Milwaukee River Watershed through which solutions can be found for critical problems such as flooding, pollution, soil erosion and stream siltation, park and open-space reservation, and deteriorating fish and wildlife habitat," he said.

The sixteen member Milwaukee River Watershed Advisory Committee of Milwaukee, Ozaukee and Washington counties includes five prominent Washington county residents, two of them from Kewaskum. They are Douglas Ziegler, vice-president of the West Bend Co.; L. N. Peterson, executive vice-president of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum; Dr. Carlton M. Herman, SEWRPC commissioner; John L. Kratz, Washington county supervisor, feed and seed merchant; Elwin M. Romaine, Kewaskum chairman, Washington county board.

Additional members representing Sheboygan and Fond du Lac counties outside of the South-

## Firemen Extinguish Grass Fire Monday

Kewaskum firemen received a call to extinguish a grass fire at 1:30 p. m. Monday on the N. E. Norton land about 2½ miles east of the village near St. Michaels in the Kettle Moraine area.

Lloyd Etta of Kewaskum had just begun to cut hay in the field and it is believed that the mower blade struck a rock or some metal can containing gasoline or oil, creating a spark and starting a blaze which spread through the grass. There was some rubbish deposited on the field which Etta had passed over with the mower.

A good-sized patch of grass burned over before the fire was put out but firemen prevented the flames from passing over a hill and into a larger grassy area. Firemen fought the blaze nearly an hour.

eastern Wisconsin Region may be named at a later date.

The Milwaukee River Watershed Advisory Committee is the third such committee in the region to be created by the SEWRPC at the request of member municipalities. The first was the Root River Watershed Committee, created in August 1962; the second was the Fox River Watershed Committee, created in December 1963. A comprehensive watershed planning study of the Root River basin is now in its second year and is scheduled for completion in 1966, cooperatively financed by local municipalities involved and the HHFA. Application has been made to the HHFA for financial assistance in a comprehensive Fox River Watershed Study. If all necessary local, state, and federal agency approvals are obtained, this study is scheduled for mounting late in 1965.

It is anticipated that the organizational meeting of the Milwaukee River Watershed Advisory Committee will be held in late August.

**Larsen Attending Summer Institute**

Two summer institutes, one in mathematics and the other in geography, enrolling seventy-five elementary school personnel, are currently in progress on the campus of Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire. ### County Agent News Notes

By MAURICE J. HOVLAND  
Washington County Agent

#### HAIL CAUSES DAMAGE

We understand from some of the farmers in the county that we had quite a severe hailstorm last week. This is unfortunate. We have had such a late year as it is, and some of the crops that are perennial in nature have been injured quite badly. Then a hailstorm comes along and does even more injury. But it's one of those things we can't do much about. Probably the only fortunate thing about it is that it came at a time when we can still replant. We won't have to wait until next year to get some crop from that field.

So, let's suppose that your corn was hailed out, or should be hailed out sometime even the early part of July. Should this happen I think you have two alternatives. First of all, dig up the field if the corn is in bad shape and replant it to either a very short maturity corn, or plant it to sudan grass and use that as forage or dry hay. Either one of these will work quite well.

What would you do if this would be a field that was planted to oats and seeded down. Again I think this can be answered best by taking off the oats that might be there now and putting it in the barn as hay. This again assumes that the oats is injured beyond repair. Very likely the tiny seedlings that are coming up will still be all right.

We are making some assumptions here, of course, but we do believe that even until the middle of July on fields planted to corn, we can still plant sudan and get reasonably good yields of forage from that field.

#### PREFIX NAME IS RESERVED FOR MARVIN GARBISCH HERD

Marvin Garbisch, Kewaskum, will have the exclusive use of the prefix "Boundaryview" in naming all registered Holstein dairy animals bred in that herd.

Use of this prefix name has been granted by Holstein-Friesian Association of America; it also becomes a part of official breed records at the national headquarters in Brattleboro, Vt.

Nearly 1,500 prefixes are reserved for registered Holstein breeders each year. More than 38,000 are now on file for use in giving distinctive names to home-bred cattle. Reservation and use of these prefix names became an active membership requirement in 1965.



### Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

#### LEAVE YOUNG WILD ANIMALS IN WOODS AND FIELDS ALONE

Fair perch and good walleye fishing at Pike lake. Good bass fishing at Big and Little Cedar, frogs best bait. Bluegills biting in most lakes.

Three deer were killed in the county this past week, a doe at Hwy. 41 and CTH (H), a buck at Hwy. 41 and old Hwy. 60 and a doe fawn lost three feet in a hay mower in the town of Trenton.

Early June is the peak of the fawning season in Wisconsin and the conservation department again this year reminds people roaming the woods and farm lands to leave baby deer and other wild crea-

tures alone. "Naturenapping," as it is called, is still common in Wisconsin during late spring and summer. Uninformed children and adults, too, discover young creatures alone in the woods and innocently assume they are lost or abandoned by their parents. This is not the case. Frightened by human disturbances, parents of these youngsters are only a short distance away and will resume care of their offspring in a little while.

Human sympathy goes out particularly to fawn deer. Each year wardens are plagued with "orphaned" fawns who would have lived normal lives had they been left in the woods. Most adopted wild creatures live only a short time under human care.

"Please leave young wild animals in the fields and woods, in addition to the cruelty of taking them from their natural haunts it is unlawful."

The violation can result in a fine as high as \$100.00 or a jail sentence as long as six months or both.



### SALAD DAYS



Handsome in looks, early-fruiting and resistant to disease, all of which endear it to the gardener, Triumph cucumber is super for salads. Use plain slices or "scallop" them as shown.



A new hybrid squash named Chefini may be used raw in salads in the same way as you now use cucumbers. It is not necessary to peel the squash. It's also good to eat in "stick" form.

What could please your family more during the hot days of summer than using crisp, fresh vegetables from the garden for equally crisp, fresh salads?

Salad vegetables are easy to grow, take but little room and can be planted in odd corners of the yard. Plant the seeds of lettuce, cucumber, tomato, radish or squash wherever you have even a few square feet to spare.

Then, when they've grown to maturity and their crops are ready to be made into succulent salads, make these unique by using one of the ideas below.

Cucumber slices may be "scaloped" by drawing the tines of a fork down the length of the peeled or unpeeled cucumber before slicing it. Scalloped cucumber half slices inserted between tomato wedges make an eye-catching and mouth watering combination.

For this purpose grow and use

the new cucumber that won an All-America Selections bronze medal this year. Its name is Triumph, it is an extra-early bearing hybrid and triumphs over most cucumber diseases.

A vegetable new for salad use is squash. Another All-America Selections winner, also a hybrid, named Chefini is the squash to grow and use. Pick the fruits while they are young and slice them just as you would a cucumber. Add lengthwise sticks to the relish glass or plate with carrots and celery, the quartered slices to any type of salad for a new and tantalizing taste.
