Firemen's Picnic Sets All-Time Record in Attendance, Sales; Outstanding Parade Best Held

Estimated 10,000 Persons Watch 1½ Hour Long Parade

WINNERS OF PRIZES IN PARADE AND FIREMEN'S CONTESTS ANNOUNCED

Wonderful weather, the longest and most outstanding parade held here, and the holding of the Badger Firemen's association annual tournament in conjunction with this year's event were largely responsible for making this year's firemen's picnic Saturday evening and Sunday the biggest and most successful ever put on. The picnic and parade not only set all-time records in attendance but in sales of concessions, food and refreshments in the park as well.

For example, close to 1,400 pounds of hamburger, almost three quarters of a ton, were sold. This is approximately 400 pounds more than last year. About 500 pounds of bratwurst also were consumed, another increase. A reported 971 cases of beer, making a total of well over 32,000 bottles of beer, were sold (there are 36 bottles in the Milwaukee cases). Added to the beer consumed were over 400 cases of soda.

The firemen's picnic has shown rapid growth each year in the past six years. In 1959 the gross

income was \$6,000 and this year the gross is already around \$13,000 with more money still to come in.

Unofficial counts and estimates of persons watching Sunday's parade varied all the way from 8,000 to 14,000. Our estimate is a conservative 10,000 people. Streets were jammed with people on both sides, from five to 15 rows deep in places, all along the main thoroughfares. Remarks were overheard such as "I never saw so many people in Kewaskum" and "We have never seen so many people watching a parade in this area." No doubt it was the largest number of persons ever to assemble in this village at one time.

The parade was by far the biggest and best ever held locally. Starting promptly at 12:30, it continued very close to one and one-half hours in duration and was several miles long. No other parade in the surrounding area can compare with it the possible exception of Cedarburg's Festival of Music. The parade featured 15 bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams, several orchestras on

trucks, 16 groups of marching firemen from various departments in the Badger association, a number of excellent floats, some exceptionally beautiful; numerous fire trucks, old cars, comic cars, other funny entries highlighted by the Theresa clown fire department, horses, decorated bikes, trikes, wagons and children's specialties on foot, and many, many other entries. The parade was highly praised by everyone who witnessed it and it was well deserved.

The park was also jammed with thousands of people throughout the day, setting an attendance record. Bolstering the attendance were the many families of the visiting firemen and band and drum corps members. Easily the outstanding attraction was the crack Milwaukee Continental Cadet band of 140 pieces. This band, with their baton twirlers, majorette and drill team, put on an outstanding show in the park after the parade. Other bands and drum corps also performed in the park. Free entertainment acts were provided from the stage afternoon and evening by the Michaels family and De Yip Loo. The crowd on Saturday night also was exceptionally large.

Many people witnessed the Badger Firemen's association tournament contests at 7 p. m. Saturday and those who missed them missed quite a show of speed, skill, training and laughs.

In the individual bucket and ladder climbing contest Fireman Paul Behring of Boltonville took first place with a time of 11.67 seconds. Other winners were: 2. Ronnie Krell, Newburg; 3. In the gas mask rescue contest Ron Petermann of Boltonville was first place winner with a time of 34 seconds. Other winners: 2. Brian Meyer, Jackson; 3. Tom Bublitz, Waubeka; 4. Fritz Gierach, Germantown; 5. Douglas Grade, Brown Deer. Tom Puerling, Newburg, and Rick Boden, Kewaskum, were disqualified for incomplete attire. \$57.00 in prizes was paid out in this test.

In the relay coupling race the winner was Germantown with a time of 1:12. Other winners: 2. Jackson; 3. Boltonville; 4. Newburg; 5. Cedarburg. Kewaskum was disqualified, only 2½ turns, and Brown Deer was disqualified, not

Register July 17 For 2nd Session Of Swim Lessons

114 CHILDREN SIGNED UP FOR FIRST SESSION; 15 KICKBOARDS PURCHASED

Registration for the second and final four-week session of Red Cross swimming lessons will take place at the village beach on Saturday, July 17, from 1 to 5 p. m. The courses being offered are: 9:00, Beginner I; 9:30, Beginner II; 10:00, Advanced Beginner; 10:30, Swimmer; 11:00, Junior and Senior Lifesaving. Lessons start on Monday.

No one under six years of age may sign up. Boys and girls are eligible for the junior lifesaving course if they are not less than 12 or more than 15 years of age, or if they are in the seventh to tenth school grade inclusive. Persons are eligible for the senior course who have passed their sixteenth birthday or are students in or above the eleventh grade.

The advanced beginner course has been substituted for the intermediate. This was necessary because it provides a more gradual step out of the beginner class.

There were 114 children who signed up for the first session. Cold weather hampered the instruction, but much of this was made up for by the recent purchase of 15 kickboards. They were greatly needed and have already been used extensively.

Death of Martin Koepsel Tuesday

Martin M. Koepsel, 72, of 345 S. 9th ave., West Bend, passed away at his residence on Tuesday morning, July 13, after a lingering illness.

Mr. Koepsel moved to West Bend 24 years ago. He was born at Theresa on March 22, 1892. He and the former Adela Asenbauer were married in St. Theresa's church, Theresa, on Oct. 10, 1916, and made their home in that village after their marriage. He operated a cheese factory there for some time and later operated cheese factories at Five Corners in the town of Auburn and Rosendale. While the Koepsel family lived at Five Corners on Hwy. V about 3½ miles north of Kewaskum, they were members of Holy Trinity church and their children attended schools in this village. After going to West Bend in 1941, Mr. Koepsel became an employee of Gehl Bros. Mfg. Co. and worked there until retiring in 1960.

His widow survives along with two daughters, Ruth (Mrs. Harold Casper) of Racine, and Alice (Mrs. Richard Yogerst) of West Bend; two sons-in-law, three grandchildren, two brothers, Math Koepsel of Theresa and Edward Roth of Hampshire, Ill. and other relatives. A sister and two brothers predeceased him.

Mr. Koepsel was a member of the Holy Name society of Holy Angels church, West Bend, and the Apostolate of the Suffering.

The Kewaskum Community High School Board of Education will be heard on WBKV radio at 12:45 p. m. on Saturday, July 17.

The board's purpose is to explain to the electors of the Kewaskum high school district the need for the proposed building addition. A referendum is being held on Monday, July 19, for the building project.

Electors of the Kewaskum Community High School District will vote for school board members and on a bond issue referendum on Monday, July 19, at the high school.

Candidates for school board positions are Mrs. Zona Miske of the town of Wayne and Richard L. Edwards of Kewaskum. There are two vacancies on the high school board this year. Terms expiring are those of Mrs. Miske, who was appointed to the position formerly held by Melvin Riley, and Roger McKenna, who is not a candidate.

Polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. at the high school, at which time electors may vote for school board members and on the referendum for a bond issue not to exceed \$633,000 to improve and expand the present high school building and facilities. The bond issue was presented to the electors in February and was defeated.

School authorities point out that enrollment in the high school has grown from 267 to 550 since the building was constructed nine years ago. During this period the normal class load of students had increased from four to five subjects and the school day has been increased from six to eight periods, the board indicates. Based on the number of children now in the grade schools, the high school enrollment is expected to increase by 30 students annually.

The high school board is making arrangements for some classes to be held in the Kewaskum elementary school during the 1965-66 school year. The high school is overcrowded now and unless additional space is provided, the educational program will have to be curtailed.

The board held an informational meeting on Thursday evening, July 15, to explain the proposed building program to the electors.

The annual meeting and budget hearing for the high school district will begin at 8 p. m. Monday, July 19, in the high school building.

Picnic Notes

Due to good police and extra supervision there were no unusual "incidents" at the picnic but everything didn't come up roses either.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl reports that during the parade one of the horses, a sorrel mare (listed as vehicle No. 2 in the accident report), ridden by Robert Rook of the Wayne Wranglers, Inc. reared up and its hoof struck and damaged a parked car owned by Marvin Bove of R. 1, Mt. Calvary, who was watching the parade. Rook said the animal was frightened by the noise made by stock car racers in the parade. The mishap occurred near the bridge on Main st. The right rear fender, tail light and chrome of the car were damaged.

Chief Pledl also reported that early in the morning the day af-

ter the picnic, about 5:30 a. m., Monday, several youngsters apparently looking for coins in the park, crawled through an unlocked window in the hamburger stand and took cigarettes, cigars and several prizes which were stored there from the picnic. All of the merchandise was recovered from the children.

Another incident reported by the chief was that one of the firemen assisting with the parade was brushed by a float at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. The flashlight he was carrying was knocked to the pavement and flattened under the wheels of the car.

Traffic this year was effectively re-routed around the village during the time of the parade and this greatly relieved traffic congestion. But even so traffic was reported held up on Hwy. 45 as far south as the Kewaskum swamp. As a result a couple of the bands participating in the parade arrived late

and hurriedly fell in and joined the parade after it had started.

Hats off to the parade marshalls who did a real good job, even to the point of keeping all the horses at the end of the line. Those were the marshalls who came puffing in at the end of the parade. It's a big job to line up a parade of this size. Hats off to all of the committees in charge as well.

One would get the impression in the park Sunday that prohibition and meat rationing were coming back into force Monday.



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


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
