## Myron Oppermann, 18, Drowns As Car Plunges Into Lake Bernice

GRADUATED IN JUNE FROM LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL; BODY IS FOUND AFTER SEARCH

An 18-year-old town of Auburn boy drowned late Saturday night in a freak accident after his open convertible left a town of Ashford road and plunged to a 12-foot depth in Lake Bernice, located several miles northwest of Kewaskum.

Myron D. Oppermann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Oppermann, R. 2, Campbellsport, who reside several miles north of Kewaskum, became Fond du Lac county's 13th traffic fatality this year.

Authorities said the youth was alone in his car when it left the road at 11:40 p. m. Saturday. He was thrown from the vehicle as it struck the water. Dragging operations turned up the body at 3:05 a. m. Sunday. The highway skirts the east shore of the lake at the scene of the mishap.

Fond du Lac County Traffic Officer David Kohl was dispatched to the scene following a call to the sheriff's department by persons who saw the car plunge into the lake. Kohl said that Jerry Beck, R. 3, Campbellsport, witnessed the mishap and Sandra Spradau swam out to the car to investigate but was unable to locate the driver.

Sheriff Ray Howard, Under-sheriff Harry Rozek and Police Radio Operator Clarence Marx of Fond du Lac county, who arrived at the scene shortly after, engineered dragging operations with two drags. Richard Sadoff, Long lake, pulled the car free of the water with a wrecker. Sheriff Howard said the car received only minor damage.

Oppermann was pronounced dead at the scene by a physician from Kewaskum and was brought to Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, in the Campbellsport firemen's ambulance. The mishap occurred near the Lake View tavern and the Spradau mill on the east shore of the lake. Immediate help was available from the tavern patrons and the Walter Spradau family, which was to no avail in locating the drowned youth.

Oppermann was born March 22, 1947, in the town of Auburn and was a lifelong resident of that township. A graduate of Kewaskum Community High school in June of this year, he was employed in the shipping department of the Gehl Bros. Mfg. Co., West Bend. He was a member of St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane and past president of the Walther League of the church.

Survivors include his parents, four brothers, Pfc. Wayne Oppermann, who is serving in the U. S. Army in Vietnam and was flown home for the funeral, arriving here on Tuesday; and Dennis, Mark and Allen Oppermann, all at home; one sister, Sherron, at home; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Alma Butzke of rural Campbellsport, and many uncles, aunts and cousins.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday at St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, the Rev. Arthur Haupt, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m.

## Dorwin Perkins, Mrs. Math. Kohn, Others Pass On

Dorwin H. Perkins, 78, of R. 2, Kewaskum, a resident of Kewaskum and area the past 31 years, who was a retired employee of Fairmont Foods, Kewaskum, passed away Thursday morning, July 29, at his home.

He was born Oct. 31, 1886, in Alexandria, Minn., a son of the late Randall and Ellen Todd Perkins, and was married to the former Elizabeth D. Muckerheide in Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, on Sept. 22, 1926. After their marriage the couple lived in Milwaukee for a short time and later in Marengo, Ill. for several years before coming to Kewaskum.

Surviving are his widow, three daughters, Marilyn (Mrs. Marvin Schommer) of West Bend, Viola (Mrs. Jacob Lawrenz) of Holy Cross and Pat (Mrs. William Kirschling) of Mt. Prospect, Ill.; two sons, Harold and Marvin Perkins, both of Kewaskum; two daughters-in-law, three sons-in-law, 24 grandchildren, and other relatives. His brothers and sisters all predeceased him.

Mr. Perkins was a veteran of World War I, a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Kewaskum, and the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church.





### HUNTING SEASON DATES, BAG LIMITS ANNOUNCED

Fishing pressure light and fishing slow due to the hot weather. Night fishing best for bass and walleyes. Night crawlers the bait. First signs of fall, grain in the shock, swallows on the electric wires, young mallard, teal and black duck trying their wings morning and evening, a number of fair size broods of pheasants sighted in the cornfields, and a resident of Newburg reports a black bear in the vicinity of the Cedarburg bog.

The following list is the upland game bird and animal seasons. Migratory waterfowl seasons have not been announced by the Fish and Wild Life Service.



### Attends Teacher Intern Workshop

Dennis Lee Vetter, Kewaskum, student at Whitewater State university is spending this week on the University of Wisconsin campus, participating in a teacher intern workshop as preparation for interning in the New Richmond school system where he will intern one semester of the coming year.

Twenty-six Whitewater State university education students are taking part in a conference on teacher internships at the University of Wisconsin in Madison July 25-31. The week-long workshop is part of the preparation for intern teaching in Wisconsin high schools this fall.

Under the internship plan a student is eligible for consideration if he has an overall grade point average of 2.75 or higher and has satisfactorily completed an interview with the department chairman in his major academic area. His interest in teaching and his personal characteristics are also factors in the selection process, Dr. Wollin says. Interested students should apply the first semester of their junior year.

Selected interns work for a semester in their assigned school, living in the community and participating as would a regular teacher. They take no other course work and serve full time—planning, teaching, evaluating, observing, conferring. Supervision is provided by the University and the experienced teacher or teachers to whom they are assigned in the school system. Each intern will receive \$1,200

for his semester's work, as well as 6 credits for his student teaching.


