Elementary School to Open Aug. 27 With Expected Enrollment of 465

2 HIGH SCHOOL CLASSES IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The Kewaskum Elementary school will open on Friday, Aug. 27, at 9:00 o'clock, with an enrollment of 465 expected.

The elementary and high school cafeterias will begin operating on Monday, Aug. 30, the second day of school. Lunches for the first week of school will be \$1.25 and must be ordered and paid for on Friday morning, the first day of school.

It is the hope of Mr. Zarling, the supervising principal, that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance throughout the year. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance.

Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten or first grade and who have not registered for them are asked to do so at the elementary school office no later than August 20. To be eligible for kindergarten, a child must have reached his or her 5th birthday on or before Aug. 31, 1965. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed by mail which session children will be assigned to attend.

Children who will be attending first grade must have reached their 6th birthday on or before Aug. 31, 1965 unless they have satisfactorily completed kindergarten this past year.

The kindergarten and grades one and two will be housed in the primary wing as in the past. Grades three, four, and five, plus the office and vocal music will be in the latest addition. This section of the building will also house the high school vocal music as well as Spanish classes. The departmentalized grades six, seven, and eight as well as the special education class will be held in the main section of the building as in the past. This year there will be two sections of all grades Kindergarten through grade 8, and one class of special education.

These Century farm and home awards were begun in 1948 at the time of the 23-day Wisconsin Centennial State Fair. Honors are given to farm families that trace their deeds and abstracts to blood relatives of 100 years or more. The cumulative list, including 1965, totals 2,411 names.

John Geidel, 36, Village Official Dies Thursday

STROKE FATAL TO WELL KNOWN MAN, ACTIVE CLUB, ORGANIZATION MEMBER

This community was shocked on Thursday morning, Aug. 12 to learn of the death of John C. Geidel of 1405 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, village official and active club and organization member, who passed away at the young age of 36 years at Rockford Memorial hospital, Rockford, Ill. following an apparent stroke.

John left for the hospital at Rockford Sunday to undergo a very minor ear operation Monday morning. After the operation he called to report that he was feeling fine and would be coming home soon. Early the same evening he reportedly suffered the unexpected stroke, rendering him unconscious, paralyzing one side of his body and causing a high fever. The stroke proved fatal to him three days later, on Thursday.

John was a lifelong resident of Kewaskum with the exception of two years when he served his country in the U. S. Army during the Korean War. He was employed for the past 11½ years as a pole lineman with the Wisconsin Electric Power Company. He was born on Nov. 12, 1928 in Kewaskum, a son of Wallace Geidel and the late Agnes Schmidt Geidel.

Geidel held office as a trustee on the Kewaskum village board and was serving his second two-year term in that position. He was a member of the Kewaskum fire department for the past 16 years and was very active in that capacity, just recently having served as chairman in charge of the printing of the booklet for the annual tournament of the Badger Firemen's association and firemen's picnic here. John was also a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Kewaskum, and the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum.

Geidel was married to the former LaVern Siegfried in Immanuel Lutheran church, town of Scott, on June 3, 1948 and she survives together with his father, Wallace Geidel, of Kewaskum; his father-in-law and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Siegfried of Beechwood; his wife's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Loran Backhaus, Jr.; aunts, uncles, nephew, cousins and other relatives and many friends.

Friends may call at Miller's Funeral home from 4 p. m. Saturday. Funeral services will be conducted at 3 p. m. Sunday, Aug. 15, at St. Lucas Lutheran church with the Rev. Donald Bitter officiating. Interment will be in Lutheran Memorial Park. Military services will be conducted at the graveside by members of Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post.

Local Residents' Brother and Wife Killed in Mishap

ARMIN LAUBENSTEINS LOSE LIVES IN OZAUKEE COUNTY

A West Bend area couple was killed and their two children and a truck driver were injured in a car-truck crash northwest of Waubesa in Ozaukee county last Thursday afternoon. Killed in the mishap were Armin Laubenstein, 36, of R. 6, West Bend, and Bernice Laubenstein, 38, his wife. Laubenstein was a brother of Roman and Howard Laubenstein, both of R. 2, Kewaskum.

The Laubenstein's son, David, 13, and daughter, Marlece, 12, were reported critically injured in the crash. The driver of the truck, which collided with the Laubenstein car, Robert Donath, 30, R. 6, West Bend, reportedly suffered back injuries. He was reported in satisfactory condition.

The mishap occurred at a town road intersection about 2½ miles northwest of Waubesa. Ozaukee county authorities stated that the truck, belonging to the Cedar Valley Cheese Factory north of Fredonia, was traveling west while the Laubenstein car was northbound.

The car was demolished and the front wheels of the truck were knocked off in the crash, according to witnesses. Mrs. Laubenstein died at the scene while her husband died a short time later at St. Alphonsus hospital, Port Washington. The Laubenstein children and Donath were also taken to the hospital in that city.

Mr. Laubenstein was born at Cedarburg on May 15, 1927 and later moved to the town of Jackson. He and the former Bernice Tretow were married at Lakefield, Wis. on Nov. 13, 1948 and moved to the town of Grafton where they lived until moving to West Bend. In April of this year they moved to the R. 6 address.

He leaves four children. Gene, Myron, David and Marlece, all at home; his mother, Mrs. Renata Laubenstein of West Bend; two sisters, Mrs. Charles Voss (Elvera) and Mrs. David Martin (Elmyra) of West Bend; two other brothers besides the ones here, Elroy, R. 3, West Bend, and SFC Marvin with the U. S. Army in Germany, and other relatives.

Mrs. Laubenstein was born at Thiensville on July 27, 1927 and when 11 moved to the Lakefield area, where she lived until her marriage. In addition to the four children, she leaves her parents, (Continued on page 2)

Capt. Ken Mehlos Is Killed in Air Crash in Nevada

BROTHER OF LOCAL WOMAN; BODY OF VICTIM SHIPPED TO KEWASKUM FOR BURIAL

Capt. Kenneth H. Mehlos, 31, of 219 Nieto ave., Long Beach, Calif., a brother of Mrs. Leroy Keller, Jr. (Charleen) and nephew of Ray Klein and Mrs. Walter Schmidt of Kewaskum, was killed in an airplane crash during U. S. Army reserve summer training on Sunday, Aug. 1, in the Sierra Mountains in Nevada.

Capt. Mehlos was attending two weeks of summer training with the army reserves at Camp Roberts, Calif. and was killed in the Sierra Mountains near Carson City, Nev. while on a mission for the U. S. Army. The plane was piloted by Capt. Art Ackerman, who also lost his life in the crash. They left Camp Roberts on Aug. 1 and never returned. Their plane and bodies were found by a searching party a week later, on Saturday, Aug. 7, where the plane crashed into the mountains.

Capt. Mehlos, who made his home in Long Beach, Calif., had been a sales representative for Western Zone Sales Corp. of Los Angeles the past four years. He was born in Milwaukee on Feb. 11, 1934, a son of Harvey K. Mehlos and the late Mrs. Mehlos. His mother was the former Vanelda Klein of Kewaskum. Capt. Mehlos resided in Milwaukee until six years ago when he moved to California. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Capt. Mehlos used to spend many of his summers as a boy on the farm of his grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Louis Klein, just south of the village, and still visited there frequently before moving out West.

Surviving are his father, and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Mehlos, of 8645 W. Stickney ave., two sons, Mark and James Mehlos of Ventura, Calif.; two sisters, Charleen (Mrs. Leroy Keller, Jr.) of Kewaskum and Miss Barbara E. Mehlos of Wauwatosa; one brother, Harvey K. Mehlos, Jr. of Wauwatosa, his brother-in-law, Leroy Keller, Jr.; nephews, aunts, uncles and other relatives.

Accompanied by an army escort, the body was flown to Chicago where it was called for by Miller's and brought to Kewaskum for burial. Friends may call at Miller's Funeral home since 7 p. m. Friday. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 14, at the funeral home with an army chaplain conducting the service. Burial will take place in Lutheran Memorial Park, Kewaskum. Members of the U. S. Army from Milwaukee and members of Robert G. Romaine Post 384, American Legion, Kewaskum, will conduct services at the graveside.

At the annual school district meeting Maurice Rosenheimer was elected a director for a three year term to succeed Erwin Koch. Elwyn Romaine, Paul Landmann and Theo. Schmidt were appointed to the auditing committee. Salaries of the officers were kept as follows: Director, no salary; clerk, \$50. and treasurer, \$25.

According to the 16th census, conducted by the bureau of census, the village of Kewaskum registered a gain of 81 people in the past 10 years. The new village population is 880, as compared to 799 in the 1930 census. The town of Kewaskum registered a gain of six people in the past 10 years, from 730 to 736.

Mr. and Mrs. Nic Laubach announced the engagement of their

daughter, Bernadine, to Norman J. Van Altina, Milwaukee.

The postponed firemen's picnic and Badger Association tourney, which was rained out on the original date, was an enormous success Sunday. An estimated 9,000 to 10,000 people jammed the streets for the parade and park for the picnic. It was the largest crowd in history of the tournament and the village. Cars were parked on Hwy 55 as far out as the Kewaskum hill. More than \$4,700 was grossed and the firemen expect to clear \$1,500. Cars poured into town from all roads and traffic was jammed. A total of 66 half barrels of beer were consumed and the buns and other food were all gone early in the evening, even with all the stores raided for more. A kiddies' parade was held Saturday evening and a mammoth, mile-long parade was held Sunday, the biggest ever held. Seven bands and drum corps, visiting firemen and floats highlighted the parade. Many kiddies' parade prizes were awarded as well as those in the firemen's contests and for number of men marching in the parade. Merchandise prizes valued at \$500 were given. The Little German band of Winneconne and the Blatz quartet of Milwaukee entertained in the park, where all of the other bands also played. Grafton firemen won the most money in the tourney.

Mr. Olson is a beginning teacher while Mr. Simonsin taught one year at Waupaca and the past four years at Campbellsport. Mr. Simonsin will also coach the elementary basketball team.

The new position of Assistant Principal will be held by Mr. Erickson who has been on the staff for the past four years. Mr. Erickson began work leading to a master's degree in school administration this summer while attending Wisconsin State University - Superior. The government is worried over the unemployment of youth not seeming to realize that laws and regulations and taxes for benefits, makes it almost impossible to hire youth.

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





- 1 1/2 cups (8-slice 6-oz. pkg.) Vera-Sharp pasteurized process American cheese, shredded
- 1 cup sour cream


Into a medium-size bowl, sift flour, baking powder, soda, sugar and salt. Stir in corn meal and onions. Add eggs, buttermilk and shortening; beat with rotary beater about 1 minute. Do not overbeat. Pour mixture into well-buttered 9 x 9 x 2-inch pan. In small mixing bowl, combine shredded cheese and sour cream; mix well. Drop by tablespoonsful over top of corn bread batter. State To Hold 28 School Bus Safety Clinics

During August and September the department of public instruction and the motor vehicle department are conducting a series of 28 school transportation meetings.

The annual "school bus safety clinics" are held for school bus drivers, school bus fleet operators, school board members and school administrators.

Moderator for the sessions will be Theodore A. Sorenson, director of pupil transportation of the department of public instruction.

Also on the program for each meeting will be a state patrol officer or vehicle inspector representing the enforcement division, motor vehicle department, and a supervising driver license examiner from the driver control division, motor vehicle department.

The safety division, motor vehicle department, has worked with the department of public instruction to prepare for each delegate an eight-page booklet on school bus transportation safety.

Meetings scheduled include one at West Bend High school at 9 a. m. Thursday, Aug. 19.

Wisconsin has 5,047 school buses of 12 or more passenger capacity, and 990 station wagons are authorized for contract use in carrying school children.

State figures show 329,696 students last year depended on school busses for transportation. This total included 39.7% of all students in Wisconsin. The cost of bus transportation last school year was more than \$19 million. Last year's school bus mileage exceeded 51,000,000 miles.

In the 1963-64 school year school busses were involved in 193 accidents in Wisconsin, resulting in two fatalities and 164 injuries. These and other facts will be brought home to those attending the school bus clinics.

Later this month and in September, all school busses will be subject to their annual safety inspection by men from the enforce-

ment division, motor vehicle department.

Complaints are coming in of boat owners blocking the public access on the east side of Drickken's lake. At present there are four foats there (all locked) which prevents one from unloading his boat and using the lake for fishing. This access was donated thru the combined efforts of the West Bend-Barton Sportman's club, the town of Barton, Washington County Highway Department and private property owners. It is a launching site for all fishermen, not just a few.

Just a reminder for you who hold sportsmen licenses, they expire Aug. 31, 1965. They still are the bargain buy of all licenses required by the conservation department.

Not only is it cheaper to buy, but it is also much more convenient because it takes the place of four other licenses, namely resident small game, resident big game, resident fishing and resident trapping; so you can see it is a bargain.

So don't forget to renew your sportsmen's license prior to Aug. 31.
