Announce Rural Carrier Exam at Local Post Office

APPLICATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED UNTIL NOV. 9

An examination for rural carrier for the post office at Kewaskum, will be open for acceptance of applications until Nov. 9, 1965, the commission announced today.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary limited appointments of one year.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

Town Farmington Electors Approve New \$315,000 School

The borrowing of \$315,000 to construct and equip a new eight classroom elementary school and kindergarten was approved by electors of Joint School Dist. No. 1 of the towns of Farmington and Barton in Washington county and the town of Scott in Sheboygan county last Tuesday. The vote was 148 to 109.

The new school building will replace the old schools at Orchard Grove, Boltonville and Fillmore and will be constructed on a 20 acre tract about 1½ miles south of Boltonville in the town of Farmington.

Construction is expected to get underway early in spring according to Daniel Rodenkirch, director of the school board of the district.

Chief Oppermann Chairman of Local Dystrophy March

FIREMEN ASSISTING IN DISPLAYING CANISTERS

Chief Armin Oppermann has been appointed canister chairman of the 1965 March Against Muscular Dystrophy in Kewaskum. It was announced by Gordon F. Wedel, district director, Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc.

Chief Oppermann will be assisted by members of the Kewaskum Fire Department in displaying canisters in various business places.

Muscular dystrophy is a crippling disease which progressively turns healthy muscles into fatty tissues and eventually renders the victim completely helpless. The majority of the victims are children. There is no known cause, prevention, or cure for MD.

Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc., a nonprofit organization, conducts an annual campaign to provide funds for services to local MD patients and for research.

Two of the 69 MD clinics in the United States are located in Wisconsin. One is at the University hospitals in Madison and the other is at Curative Workshop in Milwaukee. In 1964, MDAA was second among the major health agencies in percentage of all disbursements applied to research. Since the first organized attack in 1951, \$19,469,609 has been expended for research to try to find the answer to this killing disease.

Locally muscular dystrophy patients receive wheelchairs, braces, hospital beds, lifts and other orthopedic equipment. The fees for those patients wishing to attend a summer camp are paid by the association.

In accepting the chairmanship, Oppermann said, "I am pleased to give some of my time because I strongly feel that the time and money that we give today may add an hour, a day or a year to the life of an MD patient."

Edwards for a combination Class "B" fermented malt beverage and intoxicating liquor license.





Indians Give Pewaukee Scare But Lose, 26-19

TACKLE NORTH FONDY IN LAST HOME GAME TONIGHT

Playing one of their best games of the season, the Kewaskum Indians came close to upsetting Scenic Moraine Conference leader Pewaukee in their homecoming game here Friday before finally succumbing to the unbeaten Pirates by a touchdown, 26-19. The loss was Kewaskum's third, while winning one and tying one in season's action to date.

In winning, Pewaukee added a little more booty in preparation for their key game with Grafton this week but had a real tough time of it as the stubborn Indians offered surprising resistance. The Pirates are tied for the lead with Germantown, each with 4-0-1 records, but must get past strong Grafton to maintain their position. Germantown already defeated Grafton (4-1) by a 7-0 score previously.

Except for a couple of tough breaks and momentary defensive lapses, the Indians could have gained a tie or beaten Pewaukee. Kewaskum had a first down on the Pirates' four yard line on a completed pass when the half ended. One more block or time for one more play could have given them the tying touchdown. The breaks also went against them on other occasions. The defensive lapses which killed them were two long touchdown runs right through the center of the line. Kewaskum's offensive unit was especially sharp in the contest.

To the Indians' sorrow, Ed Brandt tallied twice for the Pirates on runs of 50 and 20 yards through the line. Chad Schaefer tossed a 40-yard TD pass to Gene Wilson and also bolted over himself from seven yards out for the fourth Pewaukee score. Kewaskum

had taken a 7-0 lead in the first quarter but the Pirates, who ground out 350 yards on the ground, shot into a 20-7 halftime advantage. The improving Indians came back strong in the second half and had Pewaukee "hanging on the ropes" at the end to pull out a victory.

In other Scenic games last weekend, Germantown romped over North Fondy, 26-6, to maintain its first place tie with Pewaukee; Campbellsport, which has played two ties, broke through for its first win against Slinger, 20-9, and Grafton, right on the heels of the leaders, burned invading Random Lake, 34-18.

Tonight (Friday) Kewaskum hosts North Fondy in its final home game of the campaign and has high hopes of notching its second win and gaining in the standings. The Orioles have won 2, lost 2 and tied 1, and hold down fourth place. The Indians have a less impressive record with 1-3-1, in sixth place, but the two should be pretty evenly matched and a ding-dong battle should ensue.
