The public is invited to attend this performance.


### TWO AUTOS COLLIDE AT INTERSECTION SATURDAY





Cooperate in the  
FFA Safe Corn Harvest Program

One safety rule, if followed by all harvesters, would eliminate most accidents with mechanical corn pickers, says the Kewaskum chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

Most corn picking accidents are caused by the operator trying to unclog the picker while it is running. So the safety rule is obvious: "Never attempt to unclog a machine while it is in motion."

The Kewaskum FFA chapter has joined the Safe Corn Harvest program aimed at increasing harvest-time safety. It is sponsored

by the Farm Equipment Institute and the National Safety Council.

That rule against unclogging a moving picker is true for any kind of work to be done on the machine—oiling, greasing, or adjusting. Always shut off the picker before you leave the tractor seat.

If the picker is properly adjusted, there will be less clogging. This means less grain will be lost in the field, so the yield will be higher.

The machine should be checked, repaired and adjusted before the harvest begins. All shields should be securely in place.

Trying to work too fast cuts the efficiency of the picker and causes clogging. It is more difficult to control the machine if it is forced to work faster than it was designed to do.

Keep shucks cleaned away from the exhaust manifold. Carry a fire extinguisher on the picker. A fire started in dry shucks could spread to the field and destroy the whole crop.

### Indians Buried By Germantown in Finale, 53-0.

#### GERMANTOWN, PEWAUKEE SHARE SCENIC TITLE

The only good thing that happened to the Kewaskum Indians at Germantown Friday afternoon was that the game ended. Germantown's champions, who shared the title with Pewaukee brought another dismal season for Kewaskum to a close by exploding to bury the Indians, 53-0.

Co-titlists Germantown and Pewaukee both ended up with six wins and no defeats but one tie each, which came about when the two battled to a 12-12 deadlock in the meeting with each other. Kewaskum wound up in 7th or second last place. However, the team did improve slightly on last year's record when they failed to win a single game and had only one tie game to show. This year they won one contest, tied one and lost five. Grafton was the defending champion, placing 4th this year with a 4-3 record.

Germantown, which had allowed seven previous opponents only an average of 22 yards on the ground, checked Kewaskum with only 70 yards. Ken Stuetgen, senior halfback, helped beat the Indians with his foot and ball-carrying talents. Stuetgen booted home five extra points and counted once himself on an eight-yard run. Harold Gettleman, 195-pound Warhawk fullback, padded his conference scoring lead with touchdown runs of 30 and four yards. For the season he scored 12 touchdowns for a total of 72 points.

The Warhawks, who rolled to 313 yards on the ground, used the pass only sparingly and measured two completions in seven attempts for 51 yards. Gordie Swinehart took a 34-yard touchdown pass from Don Youse in the first half, among Germantown's other

numerous scores in blanking the Indians.

In other season final games Pewaukee rallied in the second half to overcome a 13-12 Campbellsport lead and win, 25-13. North Fondy's rock-ribbed defense enabled them to upset Grafton, 12-0, and Random Lake dumped Slinger, 12-0.

#### 2 HUNTERS, DEER, CHICKEN SHOT IN WEEKEND HUNTING

Results of the hunt in Washington county this past weekend: One hunter shot himself in the left foot, another was dusted by a friend and taken to the Hartford hospital. A large doe deer was killed by a car on CTH (W) just south of Hwy. 28 Saturday morning, a large buck on Hwy. 41, near CTH (H) Saturday evening and a small buck fawn on Hwy. 141 and the Bonniwell road Sunday evening. A Cedarburg hunter killed an eight point buck with a bow and arrow in the town of Trenton Sunday, and a Milwaukee hunter killed a buck fawn in the town of Barton. In addition, one animal was shot with a 22-rifle and left to rot in

the woods, and a Milwaukee hunter was found in the town of Hartford with a white Leghorn chicken in his game sack. It had been killed with fine shot.
