Lloyd Hron, Jr., 17, Killed In Auto Crash on Wednesday

Fatally Injured Near Eden When Car Strikes Tree

Lloyd R. Hron, Jr., 17, of 366 First st., Kewaskum, was fatally injured at 7:40 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 10, when the car he was driving north on Hwy. 45 left the road north of Eden and struck a tree.

According to Fond du Lac county authorities, Hron was killed instantly when his late model 1965 Mustang car left the roadway on a curve and struck the tree on Hwy. 45 about 500 feet from County Trunk UU, about two miles north of Eden and 4½ miles southeast of Fond du Lac. The youth, who apparently lost control of his car on the curve, reportedly died of a skull fracture.

Hron was alone in the car and witnesses said that the vehicle in rounding a curve struck gravel and traveled onto the shoulder. He apparently lost control and the car went into a skid, going off the roadway and striking a tree. The car, which police said was a wreck, left 100 feet of tire marks on the road and parts of the windshield were found 45 feet away from where the vehicle came to rest. The grill was also dislodged from the auto and hurled into a field. Young Hron was taken from the scene by a Fond du Lac county ambulance. Walter Johnson was the investigating officer.

Lloyd, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Hron Sr. of Kewaskum, was a student at St. Mary's Springs academy near Fond du Lac and was reported enroute to school from his home at the time of the mishap. His father is purchasing agent at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum. The youth was a former student at St. Lawrence seminary, Mt. Calvary.

Hron's death was the 23rd traffic fatality in Fond du Lac county this year as compared to 24 a year ago at this time.

Lloyd R. Hron, Jr. was born Aug. 14, 1948, at West Bend the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd R. Hron, Sr., and resided in Kewaskum all of his life. His mother was the former Florence Gonnering.

An only son, he is survived by his parents, four sisters, Sister Annmary, C.S.A. (Sheila) of New Haven, Ind., Candidate Louise Hron, C.S.A., of Fond du Lac and Monica and Ann at home; aunts, uncles, and many other relatives.

Lloyd was a member of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church.

Friends may call at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Friday. Funeral services will be conducted at 10 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 13, at Holy Trinity church with the Rev. Father Jude of St. Lawrence seminary, Mt. Calvary, the Rev. F. C. La Buwi of St. Mary's parish, Racine, former pastor at Holy Trinity here, and the Rev. John T. Budde, present pastor, presiding. Burial will take place in the new church cemetery.

Champion at four of the five area stock car tracks this past season, Billy Johnson will be the top award recipient at the MSCRA Awards Night party at the Nightingale ballroom Saturday night. Johnson, of Slinger, won his second area crown in three years. "Etchie" Biertzer of rural West Bend took top honors in 1964.

Johnson won the 1965 modified stock car area championship according to figures released by Midwest Speedways, Inc., operators of the Hales Corners, Cedarburg and State Fair Park speedways; the Slinger speedway, the Beaver Dam Raceway, and the Milwaukee Stock Car Racing association. The MSCRA compiles the points earned at the five racing centers to determine the area modified crown.

Two area farmers, Leo Bodden of R. 1, Theresa, and Paul Pamperin of Allenton, were honored at a dinner by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club. These men were selected as having done an outstanding job in applying soil and water conservation to their farming practices.

This is the eighth consecutive year that the Kewaskum Kiwanians have honored two outstanding soil conservation cooperators from the Kewaskum school district.

Pamperin operates a 197-acre farm in Wayne township. In past

years he has established 3,100 feet of diversion terraces, 2½ acres of grass waterways, and 50 acres of stripcropping, and has a protected woodlot.

Also a Wayne township farmer, Bodden operates a 158-acre farm and his conservation practices include 38 acres of stripcropping, one acre of grass waterways, and 700 feet of surface drains, and he also has a protected woodlot.

Both of these farmers have had conservation plans for several years and have applied most of the planned practices.

These farmers are selected by a

committee of the Kiwanis club each year. Harold Ryan, local soil conservation scientist, introduced the men. The awards were presented by Al Hron, president of Kiwanis.

Dale Smith, acting Washington county agent, gave a slide presentation of the relationship between rural and urban people.

Social Security Day in Kewaskum Thursday, Nov. 18

CLAIMS MAY BE FILED,
OBTAIN INFORMATION

Thursday, Nov. 18, will be Social Security Day at Kewaskum and West Bend. This was announced by Stephen J. Schneider, district manager of the downtown Milwaukee social security office. Schneider explained that such a day would provide the people in this area with a convenient chance to file claims and take full advantage of the recent changes in the social security law. The 1965 social security amendments have made important changes in the social security program. One of the most significant changes is Medicare. Beginning July 1, 1966, nearly all Americans 65 and over will become eligible for two kinds of health insurance protection: hospital insurance and additional voluntary medical insurance for those who choose to take it.

Schneider further explained that people getting social security or railroad retirement benefits would receive instructions in the mail and would not need to contact the office. Those people receiving public assistance will be notified by that agency about filing for medical insurance. But many other

ers who are 65 and have never applied for social security should file on Social Security Day.

Since special personnel from the downtown office will be available, residents can also inquire and file for other benefits. Widows can file for reduced benefits at age 60. Benefits may be paid to students up to age 22 if the student is the unmarried son or daughter of a person receiving old-age benefits. Persons 72 or over who have not been able to qualify for social security because they have not worked long enough possibly now may be eligible for payments up to \$35 a month. There is also a change in the optional method of reporting for farm income.

Schneider urges area residents to take full advantage of this special arrangement so inquire and file on Nov. 18, thus avoiding any loss of benefits or entitlement to Medicare. Bring along your birth or baptismal certificate, as well

as your social security account number if one has ever been assigned to you. Social security representatives will be on hand for Social Security Day at the American Legion hall in Kewaskum from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and at the West Bend public library from 9 a. m. to 3:30 p. m.

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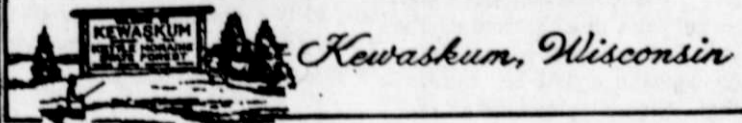

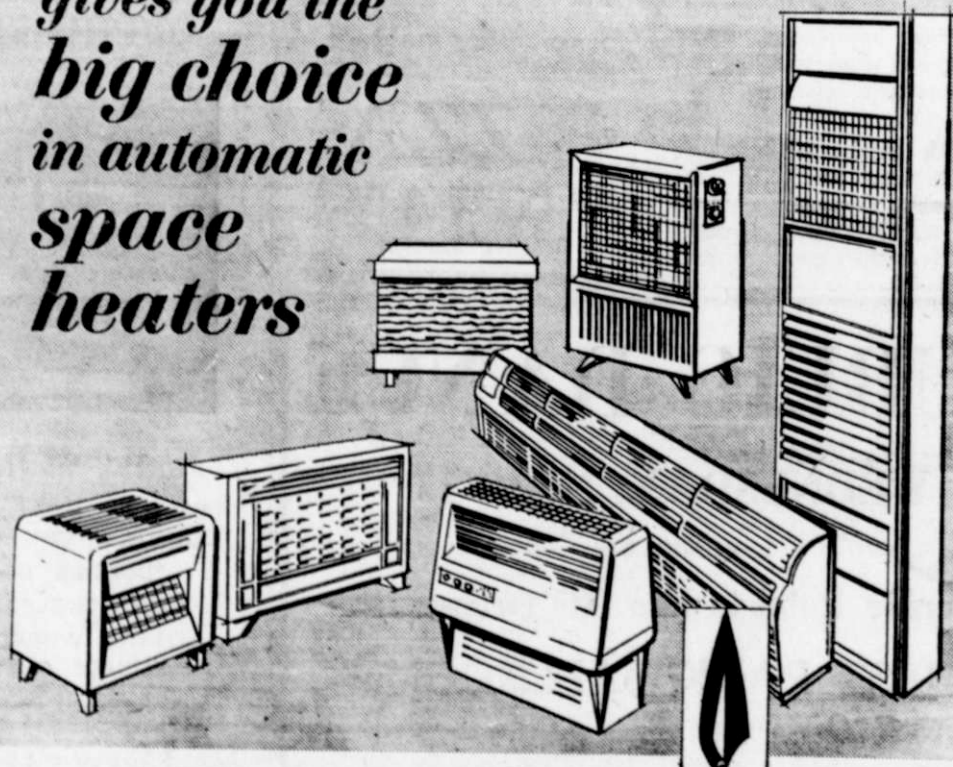
