Referendum Vote On High School Addition Jan. 18

Another special referendum on the borrowing of \$646,500 for construction of an addition and improvement of the Kewaskum Community High school serving Joint District No. 2 has been called for Tuesday, Jan. 18, in the high school gym. Voting hours will be from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

The referendum was called following circulation of a petition requesting same. The petition, bearing 570 signatures, some of which were reported to be invalid, was submitted, calling for the vote. The referendum will be the third one held on the building project.

The building project was defeated at two previous referendums held in February and July of last year but at a special meeting of the electors held in December the district went on record as favoring the project.

The January issue of the high school Newsletter points out that delay of the construction project has already cost the electorate of the district from \$50,000 to \$60,000 in rising costs of material, interest and labor plus additional rising costs of steel. Initially, when first placed before the electorate, the project would have cost \$633,000, the Newsletter points out.

The proposed additions, remodeling, improvements and equipment would provide facilities for 800 students and should take care of the needs of the district for 10 years under normal growth. The present school, with 530 students, is over-crowded with vocal and Spanish classes held in other buildings.

ROSENHEIMER HAD SERVED AS PRESIDENT 27 YEARS

At a board of directors and stockholders meeting of the Bank of Kewaskum held on Tuesday, Jan. 11, Maurice W. Rosenheimer was elected chairman of the board of directors. Burns R. Nelthorpe was elected president to succeed Mr. Rosenheimer, who had been president for the past 27 years.

Mr. Rosenheimer was elected president of the bank in January of 1939. He has been associated with the bank since 1918, a period of 48 years. Mr. Nelthorpe had been vice-president of the bank since 1960.

Nelthorpe reported that deposits at the bank increased by \$781,124.41 during 1965, bringing total deposits at the bank to \$8,056,566.33 and total assets to \$8,899,508.41.

Other changes and promotions in the bank staff will be made at a meeting which will be held next week, it was indicated by Mr. Nelthorpe.

William Becker Dies on Tuesday

William A. Becker, 66, well known farm resident of R. 2, Kewaskum, passed away early Tuesday, Jan. 11, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. His death occurred unexpectedly after he had been rushed to the hospital.

Mr. Becker was born Nov. 12, 1899, in Kewaskum, a son of the late Ernst and Ida Heise Becker. He lived in the New Prospect area in his younger years, then resided in Milwaukee for 21 years before returning to the town of Kewaskum, where he farmed for the past 19 years. His marriage to the former Hilda Windorf took place in St. Lucas Lutheran church, Kewaskum, on Oct. 20, 1934.

He is survived by his widow, one son, Robert, of Kewaskum; one daughter Diane (Mrs. Gerald Buchel) of Kewaskum; a daughter-in-law, Jean; a son-in-law, Gerald; two grandsons, William Robert Becker and Scott Buchel; two sisters, Mrs. Selma Langenkamp of Milwaukee and Mrs. Clara Dins of rural Campbellsport; three brothers, Walter Becker and Carl Becker of West Bend and Henry Becker of R. 2, Kewaskum; brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nieces, nephews, and a host of friends. One brother, Edgar, preceded him in death.

Mr. Becker served several terms as a supervisor on the town board of the town of Kewaskum and was a former school board member.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 13, at St. Lucas Lutheran church with the Rev. Wayne Bartelt officiating. Burial took place in Lutheran Memorial Park. Friends paid their respects at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

Jeep Breaks Through Ice on River



A Willys Jeep with attached snowplow, owned and driven by Wally Cudnoske of Wally's Mobil station, broke through the ice on the river Saturday afternoon while clearing snow off of the ice skating rink in the village park.

The jeep sank into about six feet of water after breaking through ice five or six inches thick. Fortunately the vehicle did not sink through the ice real suddenly and the driver, his son and another youth who were passengers in the jeep were able to jump clear of the cab before it went under. However, Wally confesses that he didn't believe he could move that fast.

The rear of the jeep had been loaded with sand to give better traction. This part sank through the ice first with only the plow,

top of the hood and part of the cab remaining above the ice, as shown above. With the temperature at about five degrees above zero, the water froze around the jeep. When chopped loose, the vehicle settled down farther with only the tip of the cab still protruding out of the water.

But before this a cable had been fastened to the front of the jeep. With the aid of a wrecker, cables and chains, Wally and his crew, the wrecker crew and a number of volunteer helpers at the scene had to cut a swath in the ice all the way to shore to get the vehicle out. They used chain saws and ice bars to cut and chop the ice. It took them about two hours to remove the jeep.



Indians Lose Big Game at Grafton, Tip Random Lake

In the big battle for first place, Kewaskum lost at Grafton Friday night and quite decisively, 81-63. The win was the fifth straight for

the unbeaten Blackhawks, defending champs, and gave them sole possession of the lead. The defeat was the first for the Indians and dropped them into the second spot with a 4-1 record.

It was Grafton all the way as the Blackhawks roared into a 22-12 lead at the quarter and 46-34 advantage at halftime. The win-

ners out-scored Kewaskum in every period, increasing their lead to 65-49 in the third quarter and ending up 18 points ahead, 81-63.

Both the Indians and Blackhawks had a regular starter sidelined by injuries for the game. Ed Czaja, high scorer and one of the team's best floor men, was shelved with an ankle injury and Grafton's Bob Drake was out with a bad back.

It was a case of too much Jeff Sewell, Grafton sharp shooter and conference scoring leader,

who popped in 20 points in the first half but also was called for four fouls which curtailed his second half action. The 6-3 Blackhawk star finished with 28 points for top honors. Dean Tonn added 15. Bill Backhaus, who was hitting from all angles, paced the Indians with 20 points. Bob Coulter chipped in 17 and Dick Wieter 15.

Hosting Random Lake Tuesday, Kewaskum regained its winning ways, but it wasn't as easy as expected. The Indians won by 6 points, 64-58, to give them a 5-1 record and take over undisputed

second place as North Fondy lost to Grafton the same night.

Despite a 33-point performance by all-conference center Rod Scholz, Kewaskum still managed to outlast a vastly improved Ram squad. The Rams fell behind, 29-23, at intermission but then unleashed a withering barrage of points and trailed only 60-58 in the final quarter at one time. However, Lindy DeNamur's Indians caught the Rams in foul trouble and used the free throw line to ice the game. Kewaskum sank 18 free throws to only 8 for the losers, who lost three players on personals. Bob Coulter with 19 points and Bill Backhaus and Mike Miller, replacement for the injured Czaja, 16 apiece, paced the victors.

Since the plan to enlarge the high school was originally proposed a year ago, the capital needed to do the job has increased from \$633,000 to \$646,500 to allow for increased costs in labor and material. The cost of borrowing money increased sharply in December when the Federal Reserve Board increased its discount rate. The interest cost over 20 years will be nearly \$40,000 more than it would have been had the referendum been approved last February. The cost of holding the referendum election and other related costs will total over \$1,000 after the January election.

2. WE DON'T LIKE THE WAY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION PRESENTED THE PLANS FOR THIS PROJECT.

ANSWER: Several public meetings were held where the program was explained in detail. Attendance at these meetings was small. Members of the Board of Education and interested citizens announced their willingness to speak and explain the project to any interested civic, church, labor, school or fraternal group. Several mailings explaining the program were made to all district residents. Details of School Board meetings and public hearings were publicized in the newspapers.

3. WE DISAGREE ON THE BUILDING DESIGN AND COST.

ANSWER: Well known, qualified, licensed architects designed the building and presented cost estimates. The objectors

Who Requested the Referendum?

An analysis of the petitions requesting the referendum election reveals the following:

- 11 persons circulated petitions. Five of these persons have no school-age children.
- 579 persons signed the petitions. Of these, 261 or 45% have no school-age children.
- A majority of the signers do not have high school age children.
- About 11% of the signatures on the petitions were technically wrong and, hence, null and void.
- Many signatures were those of people who own no property in the district.

have failed to provide valid facts and figures to support their objections. Therefore, it would appear that their objections are no more than personal opinions.

4. WE SHOULD BUILD IN A NEW LOCATION.

ANSWER: Based on the results of numerous studies it is the recommendation of the architects and Board of Education that an addition to the existing school is the most economical and sensible solution to present and future needs. To build in a new location would be very costly. Such facilities as the gymnasium, library, band room, lighted athletic field and track and others would have to be duplicated at a tremendous cost.

One additional mile of streets to service a new school would cost a minimum of \$130,000 for curb, gutter, sidewalk, surfaced streets, storm sewers, sanitary sewers, and water mains. This figure does not include the cost of approximately ten acres of land needed to provide one mile of streets.

Common sense would indicate that a new location should be considered only when the school population reaches a point where another High School or Junior High School is necessary.

AN APPEAL FOR PROGRESS

We support the resolution for erecting, improving and equipping an addition to the existing Kewaskum Community High School building. We believe that delay is contrary to the best interests of the 530 students already crowded into a building designed to accommodate 480; the teachers who have to work with inadequate facilities and under adverse conditions, and to the citizens of this district. Further delay can only affect the educational opportunities for our children and result in unnecessary increased costs.
