

Wisconsin Heart association's 1966 Heart Fund campaign will officially open on Tuesday, Feb. 1. Kewaskum will join cities and villages throughout Wisconsin and the nation in the annual drive according to Mrs. Jack Tessar, who heads the campaign here.

Mrs. Walter Dei is campaign chairman for the town of Kewaskum and her co-workers include Arnold Amerling, Mrs. Byron Klein, Mrs. E. A. Norton, Mrs. Allen Reindl, Arnold Bier and Mrs. Ray Kircher.

Mrs. Tessar urged Kewaskum residents to support the Heart Fund drive again this year. "Your gifts and your neighbor's have already won dramatic victories, but diseases of the heart and blood vessels are still America's biggest killer.

"In the past year more than a million Americans died from heart diseases. Almost 250,000 of those were persons under 65—fathers in their prime of life, mothers and school children and young adults were among the victims," she said.

### Former Residents' Bar Held Up by Masked Bandits

**TWO ARMED MEN ROB LYLE SWARTHOUT'S TAVERN AT MAYVILLE OF CASH, LIQUOR**

The Rainbow Bar, two miles north of Mayville on County Trk. V, operated by Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Swarthout, former residents of Kewaskum, was the scene of a holdup early last Thursday, with two masked gunmen netting \$225 and six bottles of liquor, according to a report by Dodge County Sheriff Robert Schultz. Mrs. Swarthout is a sister of "Bud" Korth, proprietor of Hon-E-Kor Country club in Kewaskum and is also employed in Kewaskum as a personal secretary to L. N. Peterson at Regal Ware, Inc.

The men, both carrying pistols and wearing Aztec-type winter stocking caps pulled down over their faces, entered the tavern at about 12:30 a. m. They ordered Lyle Swarthout, 49, who was in the process of closing the bar and alone at the time, to lie face down on the floor behind the bar. They then took the money from the cash register, the liquor and fled. The bandits were allegedly in their mid-twenties and were white.

Swarthout told authorities that he was sure the men had been in the bar earlier in the evening and that one of the two appeared to have had a speech impediment.

Swarthout reported that the bandits drove south on V toward Mayville in a red car. Swarthout went to the Milwaukee police station Thursday afternoon where he viewed "mug shots" in an attempt to identify the robbers. Police still are investigating.



## Herbert Justman Dies 2 1/2 Weeks After Wife's Death

Herbert L. Justman, 57, of R. 2, Kewaskum, well known painter residing a short distance southwest of the village, passed away at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, on Saturday evening, Jan. 22, after suffering a heart attack earlier the same day. His death occurred just 17 days after that of his wife, who succumbed on Jan. 5 of this year.

Mr. Justman was born July 2, 1908, at Theresa, a son of the late August and Ernestina Wengatz Justman. He lived in the Theresa area until coming to Kewaskum 26 years ago, and resided here since. He was in the painting and decorating business all his life. He and the former Lucille Keding were married in Kewaskum on April 30, 1927.

Mr. Justman was the father of 14 children, four sons having preceded him in death, namely Harvey, Herbert, Jr., Hilary and Herman. Surviving are eight sons and two daughters, Harold of rural Kewaskum, Hilbert and Harry of Kewaskum, Howard of West Bend, Laura (Mrs. Frank Hechimovich) of Sturtevant, Lilly (Mrs. Harold Westerly) of rural Allenton, Sp5 Henry with the U. S. Army in Germany, Sp4 Herbert with the U. S. Army in Vietnam, Homer and Hiram of Kewaskum. He also leaves 18 grandchildren, three sisters, Mrs. William Ehlers of Theresa, Mrs. August Ehlers of Milwaukee and Mrs. Raymond Schultz of Theresa, and two brothers, Paul Justman of West Bend and Walter Justman of Theresa.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Jan. 26, at St. Lucas Lutheran church, with the Rev. Wayne Bartelt officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park. ## Judge Tom Merriam Heads County March Of Dimes Chapter

The Washington county chapter of the National Foundation-March of Dimes announced this week that Judge J. Tom Merriam, appointed as judge of county court branch I in October, has been named the new chairman of the chapter. He succeeds the late Judge Lester A. Buckley of Hartford as chapter head.

The National Foundation, well on the way to meeting the vast challenges presented by birth defects, has already proved in the conquest of polio that an aroused public, working with science, can speed victory over disease. Locally, the chapter now provides financial help in the correction of birth defects and continues to meet the costs of treating and equipping polio victims within the

county.

Judge Merriam, a lifetime resident of West Bend, is a past director of the March of Dimes.



## Indians Upset By Bells, Also Lose to Dalers

The Kewaskum Indians hit rock bottom at Campbellsport Friday night and the upset of the season resulted as the lowly Bells, who had not won a game this season and were nestled in last place with an 0-7 record, humbled Kewaskum's second place holders with ease. 73-55.

In entering the winner's circle for the first time, the Bells threatened the Indians' grip on second place and they are now only one game ahead of North Fondy. Campbellsport easily broke the Indians' press with their sharp passing and never trailed after falling behind, 4-2, early in the contest.

Using only six players in the game, Coach Hibue Diakvoss' team surprisingly outscored Kewaskum in every quarter. Without a doubt the Indians played one of their poorest tilts of the campaign while the hungry Bells reached their peak performance. Campbellsport led at the quarter by two points, 12-10, and the game was still close at the half, 31-28. But Kewaskum hit the skids in the third period to be outpointed, 21-12, and the Bells added to their margin in the last stanza to bring the final result to 73-55.

The Bells' big advantage from the free throw line hurt. They sank 17 compared to the Indians' 7. The loss of star Bob Coulter on fouls also caused some pain. Kewaskum's ace floor man and scorer, Ed Czaja, who has been out the past several games with an ankle injury, did not see any action until the final minute and this hurt Kewaskum's cause considerably.

On the other hand, forward Dave Weiland, who had been shelved by a bad ankle sprain, moved out of sick bay to score 23 points for the Bells. Don Miller added 18 and Marty Oस्पowski hit 16. Mike Miller paced Kewaskum with 16 points and Bob Coulter contributed 12, while Bill Backhaus was held to 9.

In other contests Friday Grafton increased its grip on first place with an 88-60 thumping of visiting Pewaukee as "Mr. Terrific" of the Grafton team, Jeff Sewell, broke his own school scoring record of 44 points set a year ago against Random Lake by firing in 50 points on 18 of 19 free throws and 16 field goals. North Fondy survived a determined Slinger effort to win, 79-78, and Germantown rallied to trip Random Lake, 69-64.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians have another toughie, playing at North Fondy, which team they beat earlier here. A win for the Orioles would give them a second place tie with Kewaskum.

### Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

### SEASON ON RABBITS AND SQUIRRELS ENDS JAN. 31

The season on rabbits and squirrels in Wisconsin will close on Jan. 31, 1966. The bow and arrow hunter may if he wishes hunt pheasants in Milwaukee county ONLY thru Feb. 15, 1966. The bag limit is two per day, of either sex.

Any person wishing to hunt game in Wisconsin (and this includes all birds and animals, protected or unprotected) must have a current hunting license.

Complaints are coming in of dogs chasing deer in the county. A black labrador and a small police dog were observed chasing a small doe southwest of St. Michaels this past Saturday. Three mongrels ran a herd of five across the Soo line tracks of Ther-

esa Station one day last week. Observers indicate the dogs had no collars or tags. Owners should tie these animals up before they become lost.

In the event the cold weather continues, the pheasant hunter should begin feeding birds at his favorite hunting area. They will need it before spring.

Calls are coming in requesting information on the number of lines that a fisherman may operate. The law has not changed, it remains as it was last year.

The price of red fox skins is moving up. A town of Addison trapper received \$7.50 for one skin that he shipped to a fur house in St. Louis.

Fishing on local lakes is still slow. However, where large numbers of fishermen operate, they are able to catch a fair number of perch, northerns and walleyes. Pike lake near Hartford is an example.

An item of interest. A total of 3,958 deer were taken during the early September - November bow season. To date, information received shows that 435 deer were registered during the December season. This is about 1,600 more animals than were killed in the 1964 season. Total bow and arrow bear harvest of 1965 was 51 animals.

In excess of 8,000 deer were killed on Wisconsin highways in 1965.

Have you checked your windshield wipers lately? They're mighty important for safe driving in bad weather, advises the Wisconsin motor vehicle department. Dead wiper blades, dried out from summer heat, should be replaced with "live" rubber blades, declares the department's safety division. Wiper arms should exert sufficient pressure to clean windshield glass effectively.
