A sister and a brother predeceased him.

Funeral services were held at 11 a. m. Wednesday at Holy Angels church, West Bend. Father Edward Theisen, a son, was celebrant at the solemn funeral High Mass. ## Medicare Benefit Blanks Available At Post Office

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced today that fifteen blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the service window of the Kewaskum post office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the Kewaskum post office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are pre-addressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

## Three Injured in Crash in Fog - Here

A Kewaskum couple and a West Bend woman were injured in a two car collision in heavy fog on the crest of the Kewaskum hill at the south limits of the village at 11:26 p. m. Friday. The mishap occurred when a car driven by Edward C. Backhaus, 43, of West Bend collided with a car operated by Norman M. Jaeger, 57, of Kewaskum, at the intersection of CTH H and Hwy. 45. The accident occurred in the right lane of travel, going south on Hwy. 45.

Injured in the mishap were Backhaus' wife, Virginia, 42, of West Bend, who suffered a bump on the head; Jaeger's wife, Gladys, 53, of Kewaskum, possible chest and right leg injuries, and Jaeger, who suffered lip and possible chest injuries. The Jaegers were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.



### 60 Contributions To Memorial Fund Of Cancer Society

Contributions made in memory of a family member or friend are acknowledged by the American Cancer Society and a memorial card is sent by the society which

gives the name of the donor and states that a memorial gift has been received.

The contributions may be made in any amount and are tax deductible.

More people are recognizing every day that they can contribute in the name of a loved one toward ultimate victory over the dread disease of cancer, Mrs. Neese said.

## Grafton Makes it All the Way to State Tournament

### FIRST SCENIC TEAM TO REACH STATE MEET

How about that Cinderella Grafton High school basketball team? Who said the Blackhawks weren't a great team and wouldn't go far?

Grafton, undefeated champions of the Scenic Moraine conference (14-0), survived all sub-regional, regional, sub-sectional and sectional tournament play to advance all the way to the state tournament in Madison, in which they are now participating. They are one of only eight teams out of more

than 400 in the entire state to reach the state meet. It is the first time any Scenic Moraine team or any school from this area of the state has ever advanced to the state tournament.

Grafton began its tournament trail in Kewaskum and won six straight games to make it to the state. They defeated Kewaskum in the opening game of the sub-regional tournament here and then beat Slinger in the sub-regional finals. Then they bested Cedar Grove, champion of the Cedar Grove sub-regional, in the regional finals in Kewaskum. Next they defeated Hartland Arrowhead, champion of the Cedarburg regional, in a sub-sectional playoff at Grafton. The Blackhawks continued on by beating Wauwatosa West and pre-

viously undefeated and state ranked New Holstein in the Brookfield East sectional meet. This advanced them to the state finals at Madison.

Other teams from throughout the state to reach the state meet are Milwaukee Lincoln, Alma, Neenah, Eau Claire Memorial, Wisconsin Rapids, Madison East and Green Bay West.

Grafton's outstanding performance and enviable record have brought much publicity and prestige to their team and the Scenic Moraine conference in the daily newspapers, on radio and television. Coach Bliese and his Blackhawks were shown on TV Wednesday night on the sports news

on Channel 6, Milwaukee, and members have been pictured several times in the Milwaukee and other daily papers. In addition all the state tournament games are on the radio network and the semi-finals Friday and Saturday nights will be televised. A number of Kewaskum fans are attending the state tourney games.

In their last conference game with Grafton, the Kewaskum Indians lost to them by only five points. This is as close or closer than any team in all of the tournament games came to the Blackhawks and speaks well for the Indians. Comparing scores with those of Grafton's opponents in the tournament games would put

Kewaskum on an even basis with such teams as Cedar Grove, Hartland, Arrowhead, Wauwatosa West, and New Holstein, all of whom lost to the Blackhawks by five points or more, as well as West Bend, which lost to Wauwatosa West.

In the opening game of the state meet Grafton was paired with one of the toughest teams, Madison East, which had a perfect 23-0 record for the season and was ranked No. 1 in the state.


