Local Graduate Is Mrs. America State Finalist

JOANN KIECKHAFFER ONE OF 3 NAMED IN STATE

Mrs. James Kieckhafer, 534 N. Indiana ave., West Bend, the former Joann Ferber, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Ferber, R. 2, Campbellsport, and a 1955 graduate of Kewaskum High school, received word that she was selected as one of three finalists in the state for the Mrs. America pageant which will be held in San Diego, Calif. from April 29 to May 8.

Inquiries will be made throughout the community and out of this will come the state contest winner, who will be notified by April 12. The 28 year old contestant was amazed that she was chosen as a finalist. Mrs. Kieckhafer was notified by Marilyn Adams, contestants coordinator, Chicago. Miss Adams' letter came from the Mrs. America, Inc. office in Chicago and was received Saturday.

Mrs. Kieckhafer resided on a Kewaskum area farm, located north of this village, before her marriage. She has a sister, Mrs. Leroy (Donna Mae) Bier of Kewaskum and a brother, Edward, Jr., a senior at Platteville State university.

Mrs. Kieckhafer is the mother of five young children. Her husband is an accountant for Eldor Kammerberg, CPA, of West Bend. She was selected on the basis of content, clarity and presentation in an eight page questionnaire, along with her photo.

Outside of her home she is employed with the West Bend Credit Bureau and types a credit bulletin one day a week at the Washington county courthouse. She is a member of the West Bend Junior Woman's club and the Christian Mothers organization of Holy Angels church, West Bend.

Two Local Youths Injured in Crash

Two local youths were hurt in an auto accident on County Trunk Hwy. V about 1½ miles north of the village at 9:23 p. m. Sunday, March 27.

Injured were the driver, James Rindt, 19, R. 2, Kewaskum, who suffered mouth lacerations and complained of back pains, and his passenger, Paul Kohler, 19, 1443A Parkview dr., Kewaskum, who incurred shoulder and elbow injuries, bruises and lacerations.

According to the sheriff's department report, Rindt was traveling south on Hwy. V when he lost control of his vehicle, which left the road on the right side, struck an embankment and rolled over several times in a plowed field. Rindt was thrown clear of the car while Kohler was pinned underneath the overturned auto and was released by those at the scene. The car was demolished.

Both of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance and their condition was reported as good earlier in the week.

On March 5 her home town, Gisborne, had an earthquake which lasted 45 seconds and brought down 900 chimneys and the post office, Harbour Board offices and one school have been declared unsafe. The chimney on her home was one which was affected. The people there have routine earthquake drills like we have fire drills.

Marion sends a big "hello" to all her friends and acquaintances and is ever grateful for such a happy stay here, also for everything the school and community did for her.

3 TRUSTEES, SUPERVISOR TO BE ELECTED LOCALLY

Spring election will be held next Tuesday, April 5, and the polls in the village will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. at the municipal building.

Five candidates, including two incumbents, are in the race for the three trustee offices to be filled in the village. Oscar Hirsig and Myron Perschbacher are the incumbents. They will be opposed by Raynor Herriges, Roger Strack and Elmer Yoost. Arvin Merwin, a third incumbent, is not a candidate for re-election.

A race also exists for the supervisory position on the county board in the village where E. M. Romaine, the incumbent, will be opposed by Francis N. Bohn. They are supervisory candidates in District 9 (village of Kewaskum). Supervisors will be elected in all of the 29 districts in which the county has been divided under new law. Candidates in District 8 (townships of Wayne and Kewaskum) are John Oelhafen and Ed Campbell.

In addition, Kewaskum electors will be voting for a justice of the state supreme court with Thomas E. Fairchild unopposed for the position, and for county judge of Branch I with recently appointed J. Tom Merriam. West Bend attorney, now holding this position and unopposed for election.

Three state referendum issues will also appear on the ballot at Tuesday's election.

Much effort has been put into planning, organization and training of volunteers for what is expected to be the American Cancer society's most successful Crusade. "Tell Your Neighbor" is a major theme of the society's 1966 Crusade, in which volunteers will go from house to house.

All assignments have been made and the volunteers are ready, according to Warren Coultas, chairman of the society's 1966 education and fund-raising Crusade in Washington county.

"We are extremely gratified by the enthusiasm our volunteers are showing," he said. "They are out to establish a record and make this the best Crusade yet."

The keynote of the educational

part of the Crusade will be early detection and prompt treatment.

The fund-raising aspect will emphasize the need for more funds for research, education and service.

Education and services can save one out of two instead of the present one out of three cancer patients. Only future research can save half of those who now develop cancer. Yet each year the society has to turn its back on research projects approved by various committees of the society for lack of funds.

In anticipating success, the chairman quoted former President Eisenhower: "The concept of neighbor, good neighbor, is part of the American heritage. We are a nation of neighbors and we live in a world of neighbors. And the way we give testimony to this principle is by freely sharing our skills and resources with others needing them."

"I am sure," Coultas continued, "that the people of Washington county believe this and live by it."



Conrad Bier Dies Sunday

Conrad Bier, 87, prominent retired dairy farmer of the town of Kewaskum, passed away at his farm home on Sunday, March 27, following an illness of several days. He farmed all of his life, many years on the Bier homestead about a mile south of Kewaskum.

Mr. Bier was born on Dec. 9, 1878 at Warenburg, Russia, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Bier, Sr., and came to America with his parents at an early age. His marriage to the former Hattie Bothke took place on June 23, 1906, in the town of Ashford. She preceded him in death on Dec. 20, 1957.

Survivors include one son, Arnold Bier, on the homestead in the town of Kewaskum; one daughter, Mrs. Edna Henderson, of 1710 Washington ave., Racine; one daughter-in-law; three grandchildren, Leroy C. Bier, R. 2, Kewaskum, Carol (Mrs. Gerald Zimmer), R. 2, Kewaskum, and Ralph at home; one granddaughter-in-law, Donna (Mrs. Leroy Bier); one grandson-in-law, Gerald Zimmer; five great-grandchildren, Robin, Julaine and Jeri Lynne Bier and Angela and Michelle Zimmer; one sister-in-law, Mrs. Ed Bothke, and one brother-in-law, Louis Bothke.

Mr. Bier was a past president of St. Lucas Lutheran congregation, Kewaskum, in which capacity he served for 29 years.

Funeral services were conducted

at 2 p. m. Wednesday, March 30, at St. Lucas Lutheran church with the Rev. W. Bartelt officiating. Burial took place in Lutheran Memorial Park. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

Pruning currants and gooseberries helps improve the quality of fruit. Prune in late winter and early spring before growth begins, says Malcolm Dana, horticulturist at the University of Wisconsin.




