Grand Opening At Skybird Paint And Glass Store

Grand opening is being held this Friday and Saturday, April 15 and 16, at the new Skybird Paint and Glass Store, 1208 Fond du Lac ave. in Kewaskum. The owner is Sylvester Keller, who has 30 years experience in the painting business.

The new store building, built during the winter months at the front of the Kellers' home on Fond du Lac ave., is constructed of block with a brick front. It is 44x16 feet in size with 7x10 foot glass windows in front, tile ceiling and floor. The building includes a built-in loading dock which will also be used to install glass and make repairs.

The store will handle a complete line of Hoffer paints, glass doors, window and auto glass, mirrors, aluminum frames, screens, floor wax and other sundry items. The latest selection of Imperial wallpaper, painting supplies and equipment. Store hours will be from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. daily, including Saturdays, and until 9 p. m. on Fridays. Along with operating the store, Keller will also continue to do painting and glasswork.
